New Doctor to Commence 1st November 2023

Dr Michael Livingston, his wife and business partner Rachel and their two girls Lillybelle and Tallulah are delighted to announce that they are relocating to Narembeen and commencing running the Medical Practice on 1st November.

All patient records that are currently held at the practice will remain there and there is no need to organise any transfer paperwork.

The practice will be open Monday – Friday 8.30am – 5pm and Dr Livingston will be providing a full Emergency Doctor service to the Narembeen Hospital.

Dr Livingston is originally from Scotland and has an extensive background in Emergency Medicine before relocating to Australia 11 years ago to fulfil his dreams of becoming a Rural Generalist (RG)

The Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine describes the competencies of a Rural Generalist Medical practitioner as:

Providing expert medical care in all rural contexts

Providing primary and secondary care

Respond to medical emergencies

Applying a population health approach

Work with Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and other culturally diverse communities to improve health and wellbeing

Practice medicine within an ethical, intellectual and professional framework; and Provide safe medical care while working in geographical and professional isolation

This is and will be a protected Specialist title with the Australian medical board within the next 12 months.

Over the years Dr Livingston has delivered babies in the bush, performed advanced anaesthetic airways, done emergency surgery and advanced sonographic procedures. He was also the first doctor to deliver chemotherapy and immunotherapy locally instead of 1200km round trips to Perth and manages complex trauma locally and managing patients in town avoiding the need to fly patients out unless absolutely necessary.

Dr Livingston has trained 6 registrars and taken hundreds of students over the years that he has been in Australia. His family has lived remotely in Southern Cross, Gunnedah and Ravensthorpe and they love everything about bush life.

He holds the advanced Diploma in Skin Cancer Surgery and can perform advanced procedures such as flaps and grafts. He also attends courses at CTEC at the University of Western Australia where he works with Dr Olga Ward on advanced specialist skills in Skin Cancer, General Surgery and Trauma.

He can't wait to bring all of these skills and services to the Narembeen area.

In 2021 Dr Livingston was awarded the Distinguished Service Award from the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine for his service to Rural and Remote Medicine.

Such is their passion for rural generalism (RG), Michael and Rachel have been political advocates for improving rural health and have worked with many MPs and campaigned at state and federal parliament.



Rachel and Michael both regularly speak at conferences and seminars and have used their passion for rural health to grow from one practice to nine practices with multiple Doctors, Nurses, admin and visiting allied health professionals.

Rachel's background is in corporate marketing and media where she was CMO and Director level in multiple multi-million dollar companies in the UK. Rachel has transitioned into a career of running their medical business in order to fulfil their dream of improving rural health outcomes for people in rural Australia as well as sitting on multiple tech company boards and being a local government councillor.

Through her passion for the business Livingston Medical was nominated for and won the FBN Business of the Year award in 2021

Michael and Rachel both love Hiking, Formula one, motorsport, bike riding, travel and are both passionate foodies.

Michael is also a private pilot and enjoys flying and racing his motor vehicle in the TARGA.

Successful Outcomes - Round 4 Community Benefit Fund

The RRSNCBF, a community benefit fund was established in 2021 through a collaboration between Ramelius Resources and the Shire of Narembeen, has recently expanded it reach by welcoming Go Narembeen as a major contributor in 2023. This increased funding pool will further empower and provide the community with enhanced opportunities for both individuals and groups, paving the way for a brighter future.

Round 5 is now open, and community members are encouraged to apply for funding to support their respective projects, events, or initiatives that align with the grant criteria outlined on the Shire of Narembeen website at https://www.narembeen.wa.gov.au/the-shire/community-grants.aspx.

The success of Round 4 resulted in a total allocation of \$15,765 to support seven diverse projects. Notable among them was the Narembeen Community Resource Centre's 'Cheese Chatter an Canvas' event, which aimed to raise awareness of mental health issues, particularly post-childbirth self-care, among women, The event demonstrated the positive impact of community gatherings on wellbeing, especially in rural areas where isolation is a concern.

The Mt Walker Golf Club was another beneficiary, receiving funding for prized at the annual Mt Walker Golf Club Cup, enhancing the community's social fabric through sports and camaraderie.

The Narembeen Golf Club use the \$6,000 grant to construct a shed to secure golf buggies, ensuring that older members could continue to enjoy the sport. Likewise, the Narembeen Hockey Club received \$4,000 to carry out design preliminaries and costings to improve the lighting capacity.

The Narembeen District High School and Perth Ladies College collaborated on interactive leadership and team-building workshops, helping students develop values and leadership skills whilst fostering community bonds. 

STORM WATER HARVEST PROJECT



It's almost done and ready to collect, and make use of, our rainfall run-off.

The school would like to pass on our sincere thanks to all those involved in this wonderful project. In particular, we would like to thank Diana Blacklock, the Narembeen Shire Economic Development Officer, who not only had the foresight to see merit in the project, but has also been responsible for overseeing it from start to finish. Diana has completed a tremendous amount of work including successfully completing the Department of Water and Environment grant application, gathering financial and in-kind support from the Narembeen Shire, the Narembeen DHS P&C Association and local businesses, as well as coping with the complex logistics of such a project.

In addition, we would like to thank Wheatbelt Tank Services, Willway Plumbing and Gas, James Kennedy, Craig Kennedy, Chris Bray Electrics and the outside crew of the Narembeen Shire for their outstanding work and preparedness to complete their tasks safely, and with consideration of the needs of the school.

As reported by the Narembeen Shire:

The Shire of Narembeen and NDHS successfully collaborated to obtain a grant from the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation to install four 2,854m2 water tanks to capture up to 913,280 litres of rainwater from the 2,854m2 school building roof space.

This collection and utilisation of rainwater to irrigate the school oval during the summer months reduces the reliance on the scheme water supply during dry times and helps save costs. The initiative also serves as a valuable teaching tool for students, raising awareness about sustainable practices and the importance of water conservation.

Thanks again to all those involved, we're now just waiting on some rain, when it suits the farmers of course.


