### **BACKGROUND**

Each month the EHO will present to Council the activities, issues at hand and progress on matters undertaken by the officer to inform Council.

#### COMMENT

#### Shire of Narembeen Health Local Law 2016

At the Ordinary Meeting of Council held in May 2016 the Shire of Narembeen Health Local Law 2016 was 'made'. This Health Local Law is currently awaiting the Shire Seal and the signatures of the Shire President and the Chief Executive Officer. When the Health Local Law is signed and sealed it will be sent to the Executive Director for Public Health who will sign to consent to the Health Local Law. Gazettal of the Health Local Law will occur when the Shire of Narembeen receives back the fully signed Health Local Law. Cost for Gazettal is estimated at \$3,713 for a Special Gazette and when Gazetted a further \$500 to advertise a Notice in the Western Australian newspaper to announce the 'making of the Shire of Narembeen Health Local law 2016'. After, gazettal copies will be furnished to the Joint Standing Committee on Delegated Legislation of the WA Parliament along with an 'Explanatory Memorandum' of the local law within 10 days of Gazettal.

### Shire of Narembeen Animals, Nuisance and Environment Local Law 2016

At the Ordinary Meeting of Council held in May 2016 the Shire of Narembeen Animals, Nuisance and Environment Local Law 2016 (Law) was resolved on to re-advertise. Readvertising requirement was due to significant changes made to the original Law in order to accommodate the activity of broadacre farming practices. Advertising was done in the weekend edition of the West Australian newspaper on the 21-22 of May 2016. Notices were placed on public notice boards and the website updated to reflect the changed Law. Both the Hon. Minister for Local Government and the Executive Director for Public Health were sent copies for their consideration. The closing date for all submissions is Friday the 15 of July 2016. It is expected that the Law will be presented to Council at the July Ordinary Meeting of Council to 'make' the Law.

### **Shire Housing Inspections**

The EHO assisted the Finance Officer and Building Supervisor to inspect housing properties owned by the Shire of Narembeen. Issues identified are to be placed in a schedule and presented to Council for budget allocation. As part of the housing inspections the EHO also conducted an asbestos materials review and has completed the forms for inclusion into or updating of the Shire workplace asbestos register.

### **Bendering Landfill Inspections**

The EHO conducted a review of earth moved during the construction of the three trenches at the Bendering landfill site. Initial calculations revealed that there was only around 9,000m3 removed instead of the required 10,500m3. The EHO requested Corrigin CEO and EHO if a more formal inspection could be done and two shire workers with laser level experience were sent out and recalculated the removed earth to around 9,857m3 of an adjustment of 643m3 required. Venice Pty Ltd has been contacted and is currently being resolved to mutual terms.

### **Community Bins and Recreation Ground Building**

The matter of the placing of the tactile indicators has been resolved with the Building Supervisor playing an important role to ensuring the tactiles are placed in accordance with the applicable Australian Standard.

Community bin grant organised by EHO L Pitman has been completed with Narembeen Shire opting for one formal designed bin receptacle for waste and recycling to be placed at the recreation grounds. With the left over funding it was decided the most economical option would be to replace the old 22 gallon yellow drums with municipal waste and recycling bins in three sets of pairs. The aim of the grant funding was to give people the choice through appropriate advertising on the bins to either place in the waste bin or recycle bin.

### **Waste Water Recycling**

The Regional Co-ordinator for Water Corporation and senior staff from the Leederville Water Corp office plan to attend the Narembeen waste water treatment system in early June 2016 to assess the current system in place. Whilst the EHO has identified the system as not fit for purpose which has been acknowledged by the Water Corporation staff it would be prudent to Water Corporation to see what is in place currently and look at the options. The preferred option for the Shire of Narembeen is that Water Corporation take control of a waste water reuse system and provide the Shire waste water for reuse that's meets the standards dictated by the Water Unit at the Department of Health.

#### **SUMMARY**

### **BACKGROUND**

Each month the Works Manager prepares a report for Council on Projects and Activities for that month.

### **COMMENT**

### Storm Damage - Gravel Roads and Shoulders on Sealed Roads

Opening-up of the Shires` gravel roads, gravel shoulders on sealed road and floodways have been a major undertaking since the Abnormal Event during March this year. The costs have been significant and have left the Shire short in its budgeted maintenance fund. A flood damage claim has been submitted and is still being assessed.

Damage to the deep drain systems on farming properties is becoming a problem for the Shire. In some cases the drains have completely silted up allowing water to pool on either side of the road causing damage to the road pavement. The Shire is only responsible for drainage on its road reserves, there doesn't seem to be an Authority that takes charge of the drainage maintenance. Water Corp, in conjunction with the AG Dept, is currently conducting a study of the deep drainage system. GHD are accompanying them.

Main Roads have very strict policies covering the direction of water onto the road infrastructure from privately Owned / Leased land. Example; when contour drains are directed to a fence line and onto a road reserve.

#### **Road Maintenance - Winter Grade**

The winter grade program is on hold because the opening up of many water damaged roads has left the Shire short of funds for this work. We are missing an excellent opportunity to make use of the moisture needed to successfully carry out sealed road shoulder maintenance. Your regular Works Manager is reluctant to carry out gravel road maintenance in May and June, arguing that until seeding is finished it is a waste of time as there are many occasions where seeding bars have torn up the road surface for many kilometres. (One recent example, the distance was for 14 kms). See attached photos of seeding bar indentations on Cramphorne Road.

### **Grain Freight Program - Latham Road Realignment**

Main Roads Northam has given the OK to commence some work on this Project. Clearing of the new intersection with the NB - Merredin Rd will possibly be delayed for some months due to the vegetated area containing some TEC.

Final approval from the land owners is currently being sought to allow us to carry out Surveying, Fencing and buried Asset locating (potholing). Removal of topsoil and sub-base compaction will follow. Gravel for the sub-grade and base course has been stockpiled.

Gravel sheeting of an existing temporary access road will begin immediately, this is on PTA land and care must be taken not to expand its parameters. An application to move two power poles has been made to Western Power. The poles are within the design of an upgraded entrance to CBH.

Leon Fallon of CBH has given written approval for the Shire to take a small corner off their property in Narembeen. This forms part of the new Fricker Rd into the north east of the CBH property, to tie into their existing road.

The Shire is keen to commence planting of shrubs and trees in designated spots as part of our "offsets" agreement in our Clearing Permit Application. Students from Curtin University who arrive in town on the 9<sup>th</sup> of October could be involved in this project.

### Bruce Rock - Narembeen Rd - RRG funded seal widening program

The last of the gravel has been put in place. Work will recommence in October/November when the weather is suitable for the sealing of the shoulder widening.

### **Corrigin – Narembeen R2R funded full reconstruction**

This 2015/16 project has been held up waiting for DEC approval to clear vegetation which unfortunately contains areas of a TEC.

#### **Town Street Maintenance**

Due to frequent heavy rain, it has been necessary to build up the crossovers/ footpaths with gravel to stop water from running into private properties. In some cases a concrete mountable kerb has been added to prevent erosion of the footpaths.

The concrete slab footpath in Thomas St, in front of the Old Club, has been removed and levelled with gravel for the time being.

A lack of Regulatory Signage around town has been noted and an application to Main Roads Northam will be made to have the faded and missing signs replaced.

### Oval Dams and Reticulation - Water transfer pump from CBH runoff dam to town dam

The 18.5kw Southern Cross transfer pump has been repaired following an impellor failure due to cavitation as a result of the incorrect installation of the unit. A flow switch and trash filter will be put into the system along with a larger suction line and foot valve. These improvements will result in less time wasted by staff who are required to continually check on its operation.

### **Worksafe Visit and Inspection**

A recent visit by a Worksafe Officer resulted in several work orders being issued. Most had been identified on previous visits. We are now addressing each issue, from the more serious down.

Local Government work places are becoming over regulated, with the amount of paper records overwhelming.

#### Wilson Road – Resheet required

At the mid-year budget review, this project was deferred to 2016/17. However, since that time, the March rain events and subsequent rains has resulted in Wilson Road being significantly damaged and it is bordering on being unfit for traffic. It is not a road listed on the WANDRRA claim.

Council is asked to consider reinstating this project so that urgent repairs to this road totalling 2 kilometres can be carried out. The original budget amount was \$40,000 and the amount required to do this work is approximately \$15,000.

As requested by Lloyd Pringle from MCG Architects, I have completed a defects report to be passed onto Wauters Enterprises. A copy of the defects report is attached. Carpet issues at the time of the report are still unresolved.

### **Roads Board Building**

In May we had a brief visit from Stephen Carrick, the Heritage Architect to inspect and walk me through the discussions that he had with Kyle in regards to the building. As a result we are now putting an action plan together to document and monitor the following:-

### **Rising Damp**

- Confirm the effectiveness of the air bricks.
- Make contact with the damp proof provider to see its effectiveness and if it should be monitored on a regular basis.
- Investigate the drainage, storm water and reticulation is working correctly.

### Cracking

- We are working an effective way to monitor the movement of the building and document changes.
- There will be an inspection pit dug on the south-east corner of the building where we can access the footing to ascertain the construction method and condition of the footings.
- A property inspection report is to be completed with a scope of works for urgent repairs needed.

A copy of Mr Carrick's report is attached for Council's information.

Council is requested to consider allocating funds in an appropriate reserve account for future maintenance and repairs to Council's State registered Civic Precinct.

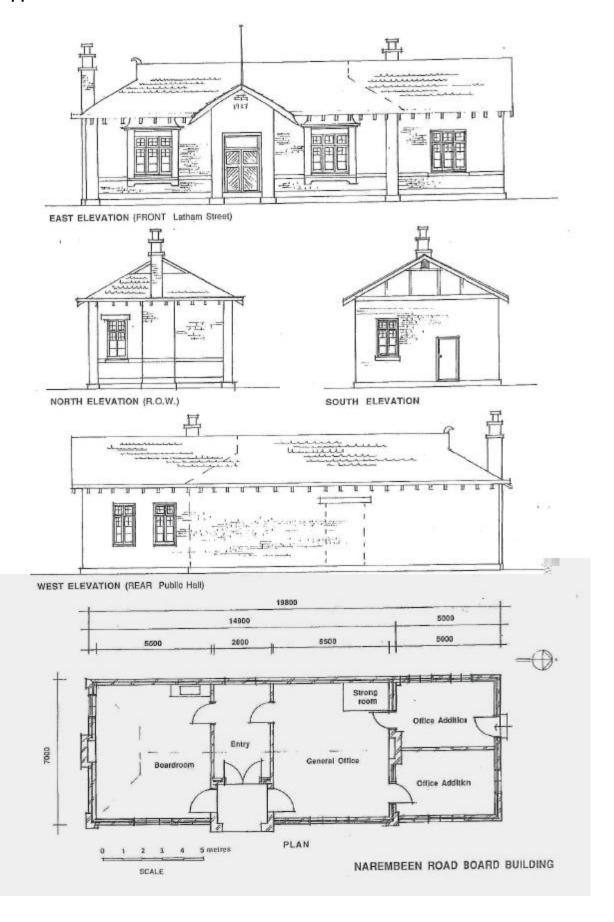

The original face bricks have been painted up to the string course on all sides except the rear elevation(west). The external corner quoins are rendered on all facades except the back wall. The roof is tiled with terracotta clay tiles on a pitch of approximately 30 degrees. The domestic hip roof with gablets was balanced either end with tall chimneys prior to the extension roof which finishes in a full gable on the north end. The entry porch is recessed under the main roof with a gable detail informing of the entry to the building. The entry pillars are a continuum of the walls forming the recessed space of the entry. They are rendered and extend uninterrupted into the gable front. The year of "1927" is embossed in raised lettering. The soffit is lined in tongue and groove boards and painted white. A flag pole rises unobtrusively from the ridge of the porch gable. Balanced either side of the entry are two sets of casement windows. The sets of three timber framed casement windows were originally stained jarrah but have been painted. Rendered concrete lintels form a continuum to a rendered string course at eaves height. The extension on the north side in 1956 provided a library facility and another office space adjoining

The walls in all the rooms are a hard plaster finish with a recessed banding at dado height and a picture rail non-continuous along each wall. Decorative air vents are situated high on the walls in each room. Fireplaces are central within the south wall of the "Boardroom" and the north wall of the "General Office", both been flush boarded over with no evidence of mantle piece. Each of the three rooms have high flat ceilings with a different finish. The "General Office" has a pressed metal ceiling with a square detailed pattern. The "Boardroom" has a plaster ceiling

with a different and larger square pattern. The foyer has a pressed metal square pattern with a geometric detail. The original light fittings remains insitu in each room. A sink has been a very recent intervention into the "Boardroom". Two Boardroom tables from different eras of the Narembeen Road Board administration are still in the building. A number of Board room chairs are also evident, some of which have been donated by prominent citizens. There is a foundation plaque on the front wall south side of the entry

The original symmetry of the front facade was interrupted with the extension which while responsive in terms of the proportions, the classical proportion and balance is gone. The street view obscured by the trees offers the suggestion of the original symmetry of the front facade.

district, the Greenhills Road Board had jurisdiction until 1913 when the East Avon Road Board
was created, and subsequently became the Bruce Rock Road Board in 1918.

After Connolly and Hale purchased 30 acres of Tom Savage's land at the railhead in 1922, and subsequently gained a hotel license, the town of Narembeen was created. In July that year the farmers from within the Narembeen area formed a Progress Association, one of the aims of which was to establish a Narembeen Roads Board. As the predecessor to the Narembeen Road Board, the Narembeen Progress Society was proactive in developing the facilities and infrastructure of the new "private" town of Narembeen. In June 1924 the Narembeen Road Board

was formally proclaimed, and the Narembeen Progress Association disbanded.

At the Narembeen Road Board elections on 23 August 1924, seven board members were elected from the ten nominations. Charles Latham was elected as the first chairperson of the Narembeen Road Board and remained in that position until 1926. During that time he was a member for York in the Legislative Assembly, a position he held from 1921 until 1942 when he was appointed to the Senate. Latham's knowledge of governmental procedures, his leadership abilities and his enthusiasm for the Narembeen district forged a progressive beginning in local government. All the board members were pioneers of the area, and equally committed to the prosperous development of Narembeen. Having proven their ability to survive the land, they gave of their precious time to establish the Road Board. The foundations established in the formative years of the district were essential to the development of the district.

The land on which the hall is situated was donated by Connelly and Hale for civic purposes. The building was officially opened by Mr Charles G Latham on 13 August 1927. From the very beginning the south ward lobbied for greater representation, and in 1926 they gained two representatives making a nine member board. In 1938 a Town Ward was established, and the

south lost one of its members. The nine member board has been in place ever since.

Interestingly, the establishment of the Town Ward and the post depression prosperity coincided, and the Narembeen Road Board set out to implement large scale civic planning. The new Public Hall was built in 1939, the State School was upgraded to become an area school, new staff quarters were constructed at the Narembeen Hospital, an automatic telephone exchange was installed at the Post Office and a District Library was established in the Road Board Building.

In 1946 an Infant Health and Welfare organisation was formed with the first visit to Narembeen taking place on 15 October 1947, in the foyer of the Roads Board office. This arrangement continued until the spotters post was converted specifically for the Infant Health Clinic in 1948.

The advent of World War Two changed the focus of the Road Board activity. The release of extensive areas of land in the eastern sector of the Narembeen Shire in the late 1940s, and the settlement of a new generation of soldier settlers gave a new impetus to the Narembeen Road Board. Infrastructure and community facilities were required. The Road Board operations expanded considerably, and by 1956 it was necessary to extend the office facility with the addition of a library and extra office.

In 1961 legislation changed the name of the local governing bodies from Road Boards to Shire Council. From then on the Narembeen Shire Council occupied the Roads Board building. The 1960s was a time of prosperity, the Narembeen School was elevated to the Junior High School in 1962 and the swimming pool was constructed in 1963. The Shire had notions of a new civic facility, but the general community services development was a greater priority, the airfield

site was resumed in 1967, a drive-in theatre was built in 1968.

The Narembeen Shire Council carried on the tradition and the social, cultural and welfare facilities they provided in the community and are ever responsive to the progress of Narembeen. When the Shire did have new premises built in Longhurst Street in 1975, the Library moved too, and the Roads Board Building was vacated. The Historical Society approached the Shire. They had established a separate organisation to deal with tourism, enabling them to qualify for funding programs and grants. The other section of the Road Board Building, the Boardroom was for the use of anothe community function, the community newspaper "The Fencepost".

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Associated People:

One of the original pioneers of the district, Charles Latham settled the land along side his friend Thomas Savage. Charles Latham was a member, and foundation Chairman of the Bruce Rock Road Board. He was the Minister of Lands and Health in the Mitchell Government (1930-1933) He led the Country Party between 1930 and 1942 as a member of the Legislative Assembly for York. In 1946 he was elected to the Legislative Council as a member for Central Province. In 1948 he was knighted. He was President of the Legislative Council for two years until 1960.

The Chairmen of the Roads Board, and Council Presidents gave direction in the progress of the Narembeen community. Recognition of exceptional service is rewarded with the Local Government certificate for 15 years or more service. Mr AW Latham (35 years), A Roach (31 years), R Cheetham(26 years), M Sloss(24 years), W Currie(22 years) and Richard K Cheetham. Mr A W Latham and Mr Richard (Bob) K Cheetham both have the privileged distinction of having

been made "Freemen" in recognition of their significant contributions to Narembeen.

Richard (Bob) K Cheetham was a local government member for 27 years and served as the Shire President from 1973 to 1980. He represented the Great Eastern ward on the Executive of Local Government for ten years. His father, R Cheetham was one of the foundation members of the Narembeen Road Board and a significant figure in the development of Narembeen.

In 1981 Arthur William Latham received the Australia Medal in recognition of his civic work. During his 35 consecutive years on the Narembeen Council from 1938, 16 years were spent as Chairman or President. He was also a director of Co-operative Bulk Handling Ltd, and an office bearer of the Council of Grain Pool of WA. He was associated with the numerous cultural and civic projects in Narembeen including the Historical Society, the Hospital Board, the Anglican Church, and was the association President or patron of most of the sporting clubs in the district.

Statement of significance: The Road Board building represents a diversity of civic functions and responsibilities in the community development of the town and region. The place demonstrates a close association with the pioneers and civic leaders of Narembeen. The place contributes to a cohesive streetscape within the "civic precinct" and is an important townscape element in Narembeen. The Road Board building demonstrates the community's sense of place for its pivotal civic role. The Road Board Building is the only example of public architectural style in Narembeen and represents the foundation of the civic development of the town and region.

# **SUMMARY**

Council is requested to determine which roads are to be nominated as preferred collector roads for the proposed Wheatbelt Freight Plan and endorse the proposed timelines to aggregate each local government's collector roads submissions.

# **BACKGROUND**

In late 2014 Wheatbelt South Regional Road Group (WBS RRG) requested WALGA to facilitate a workshop to discuss and identify ways to address a number of cross-Shire border RAV access issues with the aim of creating a clearer continuous freight network in the Wheatbelt. The workshop in the South was replicated by a similar workshop for Wheatbelt North Regional Road Group (WBN RRG). These workshops were also attended by managers from Main Roads Wheatbelt Region and Heavy Vehicle Services.

At these workshops sub-groups marked up maps indicating issues with the current freight network and identifying aspirational freight routes for the future.

WALGA compiled the data gathered at these workshops and it was passed onto Main Roads Wheatbelt in February 2016.

WALGA, Heavy Vehicle Services and Main Roads Wheatbelt have been discussing what actions need to be taken to clarify and rationalise the freight network in the Wheatbelt and discussions have been held with both the Department of Transport and Wheatbelt Development Commission.

## COMMENT

It has been agreed to proceed with three workstreams:-

# Workstream 1 – RAV assessment backlog

The Main Roads Wheatbelt structure has sufficient officers trained in RAV assessments to assist HVS in dealing with new enquiries, but there is a significant backlog of RAV assessments that needs to be addressed.

HVS has worked with WALGA to streamline the RAV assessment process and produced new guidelines. HVS is also seeking to secure additional resources to clear the backlog of RAV assessments.

# Workstream 2 – The Final Mile

Wheatbelt farmers are likely to continue to utilise larger truck configurations in the future to take produce from paddock to grain bin or port to abattoir. Given that not all Local Government roads are on the RAV network a mechanism by which farmers can legally transport produce from paddock to the approved RAV network needs to be determined.

HVS will work with WALGA to identify options for the last mile access.

<u>Workstream 3 – Produce a Plan for a Secondary Road Freight Network in the Wheatbelt</u> When the RAV system was created individual Shires took different approaches to which roads/routes should be on each RAV network. This has resulted in the discontinuous RAV routes across Shire boundaries and a complex RAV network for freight companies to negotiate.

Given that Workstream 2 will identify a way to enable produce to be brought to the RAV network it is necessary for Local Governments to identify and agree on which Local Government roads should be the main collector roads to bring freight traffic to the Main Roads Network and what RAV rating those collector roads should be.

These collector roads would be open for use by all suitable RAV vehicles without permit with Workstream 2 providing the method by which RAV vehicles could get from paddock to the collector road.

These identified and agreed collector roads can then form an aspirational secondary road freight network and if all 43 Wheatbelt Local Governments endorse the plan funding will be sought to identify and design improvements to attain the relevant RAV rating for the route and then construct the improvements. This plan can be shared to enable industry to base investment decisions on the Wheatbelt freight network.

This approach would attract all freight traffic onto a finite number of Local Government roads enabling the relevant Shire to focus investment and maintenance effort on these routes and dramatically reduce the maintenance necessary on other routes.

Workstreams 1 and 2 are being taken forward by HVS and WALGA.

Workstream 3 has been progressed with Main Roads Wheatbelt reviewing the feedback from all eight sub-groups at the workshops and producing maps showing what each sub-group proposed. Main Roads Wheatbelt has also created an overall Wheatbelt map showing the output from the workshops and a spreadsheet commenting on the proposals from each sub-group. This assessment has identified some clashes between sub-groups and Main Roads Wheatbelt has identified these in the comments.

In order to progress Workstream 3 we now need shires to confirm which routes in each subgroup are to be regarded as collector roads/routes and to address any of the clashes identified in the Main Roads comments. To this end Lyn Baker and Ricky Storer have been asked to co-ordinate Local Government feedback. Main Roads Wheatbelt will then represent the Shires' wishes on an overall Wheatbelt plan for endorsement by all Local Governments.

To provide guidance on identification of the proposed collector roads;

- Each route must connect to the Main Roads network;
- Each Sub-Group must identify no more than 10 collector routes;
- Parallel collector routes must be at least 20km apart.

In order to enable Main Roads Wheatbelt to compile and submit a business case in September/October to seek funding to develop the identified collector routes it is requested that this approach be tabled at Council meetings in May and June with sub-groups meeting to agree their collector freight routes in June. Special RRG meetings can then be held in July to endorse the joint road freight plan.

Attached are the maps marked up by each sub-group, the overall Wheatbelt map and spreadsheet for discussion.

This is a great opportunity to work together for the overall benefit of the Wheatbelt with the possibility of securing funding for a programme of improvements to our road network which will be over and above normal RRG funding. Timelines need to be met to enable the business case to be submitted in time for the budgeting process.

It is proposed that each local government nominate their preferred collector roads at their June meeting of Council. Main Roads Wheatbelt sub group meetings will then be held to finalise the collector roads by the end of June. The sub-group maps will then be presented to Reginal Road Group meetings to endorse the maps so that Main Roads can make funding submissions.

#### **SUMMARY**

Council is to consider the letter from Merrick and Dianne Latham, Directors of Hythe Farm Trust and Company.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Grain Freight Townsite bypass project is the last Grain Freight Network project in the Shire of Narembeen to be done.

Originally budgeted at \$1.8million, the project, with support from Main Roads WA, is budgeted at \$3.5million.

The proposed bypass starts on the Merredin – Narembeen Road at the south west corner of Lot 202 and crosses into Lot 500 as shown on the attached drawing (201608-SP01) and continues on to the CBH property.

# COMMENT

Design works for this project are almost complete and, at the time of writing, land dealing plans should be completed by early June 2016 after which consent papers will be sent to the landholders authorising access to the two properties so that preliminary works for the townsite bypass can commence.

Lot 500 is owned by G C Latham and the Shire has been negotiating with him in relation to the bypass. Council's policy in relation to compensation is that compensation will be paid to landholders who lose land for the purposes of Council related activities at the rate of \$1,250 per hectare.

As Mr G C Latham is the owner of the lot, it could be contended that any claims for compensation by Merrick and Dianne Latham should be made against G C Latham. However, it would be prudent for Council to seek legal advice in order to properly ascertain the legal relationship between Merrick and Dianne Latham, G C Latham and Hythe Farm Trust and company before decision pertaining to the payment of compensation and/or future loss of earnings, or otherwise, is considered by Council.

With regard to the Merrick and Dianne Latham's assertion that Lot 500 will become an island paddock", discussions with the Works Manager confirm that there will be no loss of access to Lot 500. A gate already exists at the eastern end of Lot 500 adjacent to CBH and it is part of the planning to ensure there is no loss of access.

It has been brought to our attention by Gaynor Latham that the Narembeen Shire in conjunction with Main Roads will be starting proceedings developing a new bypass road, on our farm paddock north west of the wheat bin and so I am writing to address a few concerns we have surrounding this development.

As you are aware we have seeded our wheat crop into this paddock and are concerned over the process that will be carried out in order to value our loss through development of the area. 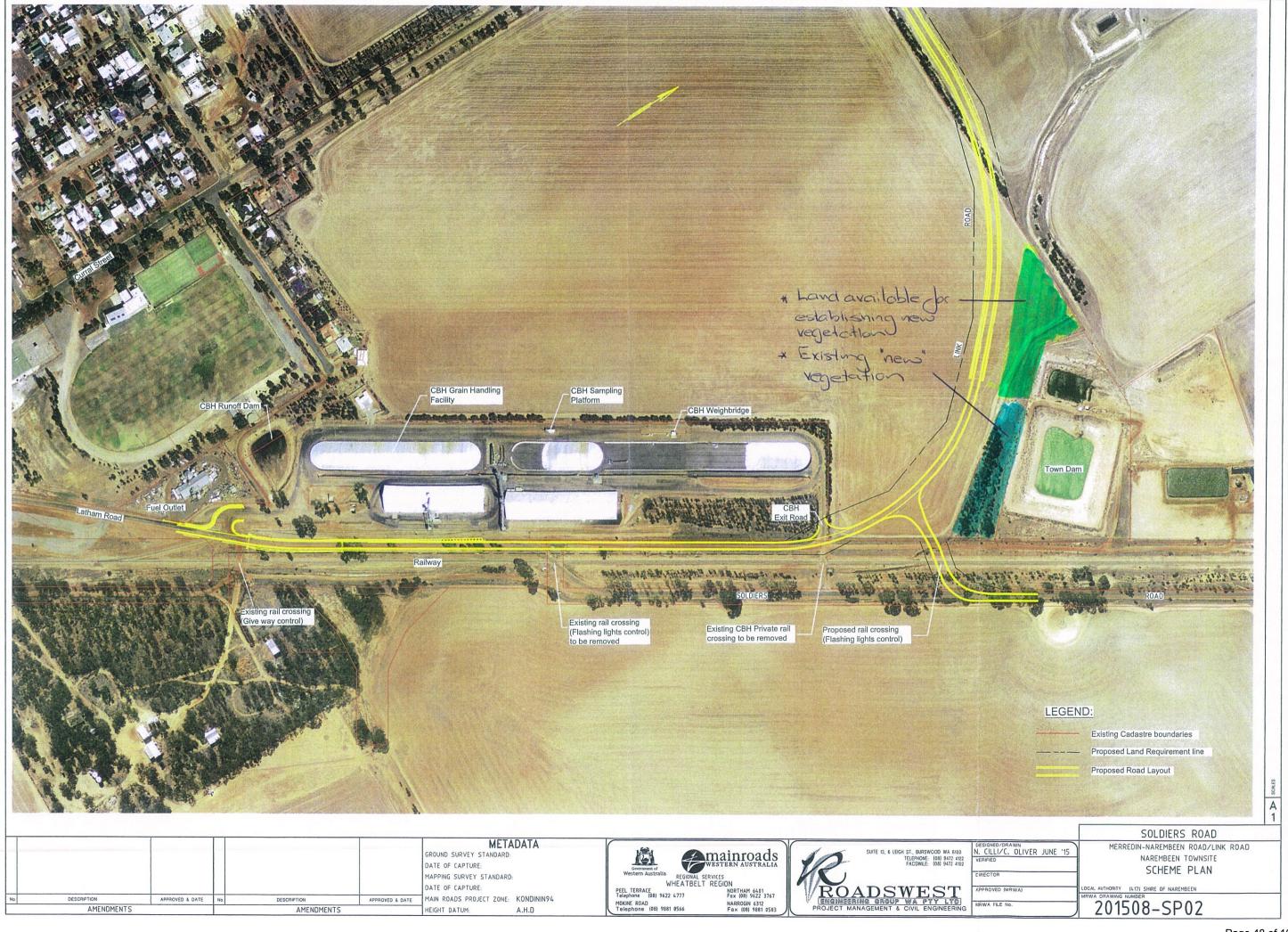

POLICY TITLE: LAND ACQUISITION (COMPENSATION) POLICY

## **POLICY**

Council is to compensate land owners an amount of \$1,250 per hectare in exchange for land acquired for public or civic works undertaken by the Shire of Narembeen.

# **OBJECTIVES**

Where Council needs to acquire land (compulsorily or by agreement) for public or civic works, this policy provides for fair and reasonable compensation for affected land owners.

# **SCOPE**

This policy is not limited to road works, and may include acquisition for other purposes.

Application of this policy for works other than stated above is to be presented to Council for consideration.

# **PRINCIPLES**

The guiding principle for this policy relates to recognition by Council that property owners will be fairly compensated for land exchanged that will be used for Council purposes.

# **GUIDELINES**

Council and staff are to consider this policy when programming construction works and setting annual budgets.

The amount of compensation payable will be \$1,250 per hectare. For part hectares, the amount payable will be pro-rated based on square metres.

# **POLICY REQUIREMENTS**

Staff will pay affected land owners the compensation amount for land acquired, whether compulsorily or by agreement. The total amount payable will be determined by mutual agreement between the Chief Executive Officer, or his delegate, and land wner based on the total area of land acquired.

# **DELEGATED AUTHORITY**

Chief Executive Officer or the Chief Executive Officer's delegate.

## **SUMMARY**

Council is to consider confirming the location and design of the playground at the Recreation Centre.

#### **BACKGROUND**

On 18 November 2015, Council resolved the following:

MIN 6084/15 MOTION - Moved: Cr. Cowan 2<sup>nd</sup>: Cr. DeLuis

# That Council:

- 1. Approve that new playground equipment at the Narembeen Recreation Centre be located off the north/east corner of the recreation centre building behind the cricket nets as shown on the attached plan.
- 2. Confirm that the design of the playground is to minimise any impact on views from the building and use a soft fall material on the base.
- Request that staff now proceed with an application to Lotterywest to assist with funding the project.

CARRIED 6/1

LotteryWest has subsequently approved the Shire's application for grant funds, the amount being \$75,840.

# **COMMENT**

As a result of an on-site meeting with Stuart Yandle representing the Narembeen Cricket Club and the author of this report, alternative locations for the playground were considered that might involve the relocation of the cricket nets.

If the cricket nets were to be relocated, siting the playground where the nets currently are would be unsuitable as it would be very close to the hockey field, and result in a significant increase in risk of injury to children using the playground during the hockey season.

Identifying alternative sites to the south for the playground are limited due to proximity of the football oval boundary and which would impede access to the change rooms by footballers. This location would also result in the playground being too far from parents for acceptable supervision.

The already approved site remains the best option, although it is noted that design of the playground should minimise any impact on the viewing of cricket matches by players, spectators and scorers.

Although Council is reluctant to include a fence on the perimeter of the playground, it is a condition of the LotteryWest grant that a fence be built. Information provided by Kidsafe on fencing playgrounds is attached for Council's information.

The provision of a fence will provide parents with improved supervision capability while at the same time reducing the risk to Council where children are in a safer play environment.

Design concepts will be presented to Council for consideration.

# **FENCING PLAYSPACES**

# **Public Playspaces**

A fence around the outdoor playspace may assist with the containment of children, preventing them running out into a hazard such as a busy road, and keeping animals and undesired traffic out.

While it is not required that a playground has a fence, the playgrounds that do have fences should follow guidelines and meet design requirements for playground safety and consider local government codes.

The need for fencing in public playspaces is determined by conducting a risk assessment to AS/NZS ISO 31000:2009. Some factors to consider:

Is the playspace adjacent to a busy road? Is the playspace near a water way? Is a cycle way included in the playspace? Is a dog park located near the playspace? Is the design of the playspace for younger children?

Are full or partial barriers required? Is there an opportunity to design garden beds/hedges as barriers?



Where it has been assessed that a fence is preferred around a public playspace, the fence is usually installed around the boundary of the playspace. This enables the children to use the playground equipment and the surrounding open space without fear of injury by misadventure outside the perimeter of the designated play area.

Designers should assess the most appropriate form of protection. A boundary can make a playground appear tidier and more defined, though this of course may not necessarily be a fence. Possible measures include simple one or two rail fences, bollards, landscape planting, garden beds, hedges, mounding, stone/brick wall or combinations of these.

It is important to consider that the selected fence type does not introduce an additional hazard. Kidsafe WA recommends the fence meets (as a minimum requirement) AS 2423:2002 Coated steel wire fencing products for terrestrial, aquatic and general use or AS 1926.1-2007/Amdt 1:2008 Swimming pool safety - Safety barriers for swimming pools.

Many fence contractors will be familiar with these standards. It is important to note that playground fencing is NOT the same as swimming pool fencing and may have a different opening threshold between vertical or horizontal members. Most fences are not designed to withstand the force of an automobile gone astray.

# **Children's Services**

Minimum height requirements for fencing in children's services is not defined in the Education and Care Services National Regulation 2011.

Kidsafe WA recommends a minimum height of 1200mm for perimeter fencing, however it is best to check with your local council for requirements for fencing including minimum and maximum height, type of fence, construction material and method.

Where fences are used to divide play areas or surrounding veranda's etc. the minimum height recommended is 900mm.

Avoid horizontal rails less than 700mm apart as rails may provide unintended access to the top rail. To prevent unintended access to the top of the fence by children, it is recommended to place items/equipment a minimum 1000mm from the fence.

# **Schools**

Many WA schools have provided security fencing surrounding the perimeter of the school. Schools may have requirements for internal fences, mainly for playgrounds and/or sports pitch surrounds.

Schools should assess for the most appropriate type of fence for these areas and consider recommended fencing specifications on this fact sheet.



# **Recommended Fencing Specifications**

**Fence Height:** It is recommended that the fence be at least 1200mm – 1800mm in height.

**Fence Material:** The fence can be constructed of a variety of materials such as timber, colourbond, metal bars or chain link. The chain-link versions can be covered with a polyvinyl coating that gives the chain link a softer feel. Select materials that are less likely to be climbed/scaled by children.

Gates: It is recommended that playground fence gates have self-closing hinges on the gate certified to AS 2820:1993. Gate units for private swimming pools. The latch must also automatically catch when the gate closes. Ensure that a gap of at least 12mm is present at each side when in use to avoid finger crush hazards. Monitor in ongoing maintenance inspections to ensure gates remain in sound working order.

Rails: Kidsafe WA recommends the lower horizontal rail be positioned at the bottom of the pickets or panel to reduce the likelihood of tunnelling under the fence and preventing unintended access to the top horizontal rail. Avoid a mid-horizontal rail where possible.

**Top rail profile:** A flat top rail is recommended. Loop top or rod top may potentially create a hanging point for a child's head between the pickets protruding above the top rail. For existing fences with protruding loops or rods at the top, ensure that climbing access is not provided for children to the top of the fence.

# **Road Rail Interface Agreements**

I write to you following communications sent to the Shire of Narembeen from this office regarding the current status of Road Rail Interface Agreements between the Shire of Narembeen and Brookfield Rail.

I thank you for the information the Shire of Narembeen has provided to date. I note that the Shire has not entered into an interface agreement with Brookfield Rail and has not to my satisfaction demonstrated a reason for not doing so.

I am concerned that the requirement to enter into an interface agreement has existed in Western Australia since 2010 and that efforts to negotiate an agreement were substantially reduced in 2014 without a plan to finalise the agreement. I strongly encourage the Shire of Narembeen to resume negotiations with Brookfield Rail with a view to finalising the outstanding agreement within three months of this letter.

Should this request not be met, I may form an opinion that the Shire of Narembeen is unreasonably failing to enter into an agreement or unreasonably delaying entering into an agreement. Should I form this view I intend to explore further regulatory action as described at section 110 of the Rail Safety National Law (WA) Act 2015.

# Letter from the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator dated 30 May 2016 – Interface Agreement with Brookfield Rail

I refer to the letter dated 30 May 2016 you may have received from Peter Cumming, Branch Director (WA), Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator (ONRSR). In the letter, Mr Cumming, among other things, strongly encourages that negotiations be resumed with Brookfield Rail with a view to finalising the outstanding agreement within three months of the letter.

WALGA was unaware that this letter was being sent to Local Governments despite being given an undertaking by representatives from the ONRSR in March 2016 that WALGA will be kept informed of progress.

In response to this letter, I spoke with Adele Matthews, Rail Safety Officer at the ONRSR on 3 June 2016 and informed her that up until now, WALGA was negotiating with Brookfield Rail on behalf of Local Governments in Western Australia. Ms Matthews stated this arrangement was acceptable to the ONRSR.

The purpose of this email, therefore, is to:

- Seek your consent for WALGA to continue negotiations on your behalf with Brookfield Rail with the objective that an Interface Agreement is presented to you that meets your requirements. This is on the understanding that ultimately it is a decision for your Local Government regarding signing the Agreement.
- 2. Seek your agreement on the content of the attached letter that is intended to be sent to the ONRSR informing them of this arrangement.

Should you not agree and decide to negotiate with Brookfield Rail yourself, can you please advise me so I do not include your Local Government in the attached letter.

Please contact me if you wish to discuss this matter or if there is any other arrangement you wish to make.

- (c) by adopting the identification and assessment of those risks carried out by the other person.

# 110. Regulator may give directions

- (1) This section applies if the Regulator is satisfied that a rail transport operator, rail infrastructure manager or road manager referred to in this Subdivision
  - (a) is unreasonably refusing or failing to enter into an interface agreement with another person as required under this Subdivision; or
  - (b) is unreasonably delaying the negotiation of such an agreement.
- (2) The Regulator may give a written notice to the rail transport operator, rail infrastructure manager or road manager (as the case requires) and the other person that
  - (a) warns of the Regulator's powers under this section, including the power to issue a direction under subsection (3) at any time after a specified date; and
  - (b) includes a copy of this section; and
  - (c) may contain suggested terms for inclusion in an interface agreement.
- (3) If the Regulator gives a notice under subsection (2) to a rail transport operator, rail infrastructure manager or road manager, the Regulator may, in writing, require the operator or manager to provide such information as the Regulator reasonably requires for the purposes of making a direction under this section.
- (4) If a notice is given under subsection (2) and an interface agreement has not been entered into by or on the date specified in the notice, the Regulator
  - (a) may determine the arrangements that are to apply in relation to the management of risks to safety referred to in section 106, 107 or 108 (as the case requires); and

- (b) may direct any of the persons to whom the notice is issued to give effect to those arrangements; and
- (c) must specify the time within which a direction is to be complied with.
- (5) A direction under subsection (4)—
  - (a) must be in writing; and
  - (b) must set out any arrangements determined by the Regulator under that subsection.
- (6) A person to whom a notice or direction is given under this section must comply with the notice or direction within the time specified in the notice or direction.

Maximum penalty:

- (a) in the case of an individual \$20 000;
- (b) in the case of a body corporate \$100 000.

# 111. Register of interface agreements

- (1) A rail transport operator must maintain a register of
  - (a) interface agreements to which it is a party; and
  - (b) arrangements determined by the Regulator under section 110,

that are applicable to the operator's railway operations.

Maximum penalty:

- (a) in the case of an individual \$5 000;
- (b) in the case of a body corporate \$25 000.
- (2) A road manager must maintain a register of
  - (a) interface agreements to which it is a party; and
  - (b) arrangements determined by the Regulator under section 110,

that are applicable to any road in relation to which it is the road manager.

Maximum penalty:

- (a) in the case of an individual \$5 000;
- (b) in the case of a body corporate \$25 000.

# Rail Road Interface Agreements – Local Government and Brookfield Rail

# **State Emergency Management Committee**

Council is advised that the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC) has advised that they have launched a new emergency management website and new emergency management documents that come into effect on 24 May 2016. A copy of their letter is attached.

Of interest to local governments, former State Emergency Management Policy 2.5 (Emergency Management for Local Government) is now covered in the State EM Policy, State EM Plan and State EM Procedures. The attached matrix (page 4) identifies the local government and Local Emergency Management Committee elements of these documents.

# **New Water Pipeline to Narembeen**

Attached for Council information is formal advice from Water Corporation advising that construction of the new water pipeline will commence on 3 June 2016. The project is expected to be completed by end of November. Also attached is a copy of the proposed route the new pipeline will take.

The contractors carrying out the works has booked 2 x 2 bedroom cabins for 3 months (5 days per week).

# **Worksafe Inspection**

On Tuesday 24 May 2016, Worksafe inspected the depot and workshop. As a result of the inspection, 13 Improvement Notices were issued. A summary of the notices is attached. Action to rectify the matters raised by Worksafe have commenced and almost all of them can be attended to without impeding operations.

# **WANDRRA Claim**

Notification has been received that the Shire's WANDRRA claim for the March rain events has been activated (attached) and the Director – General, Department of Premier and Cabinet has approved the activation. Action to commence reinstatement works for the affected roads will commence in conjunction with Main Roads. It is understood that all reinstatement works are to be carried out by contractors and use of Shire staff and equipment is not permitted. Council will be informed as soon as approval is received.

For Council information, the following road works are planned for 2016/17:

- Narembeen Bruce Rock Road reconstruction (2SLK) Regional Road Group
- Narembeen Corrigin Road upgrade Roads to Recovery
- Narembeen Kondinin Road upgrade Roads to Recovery
- Narembeen Townsite bypass Grain Freight
- WANDRRA reinstatement works
- Routine maintenance grading unsealed roads

# **WALGA Group Advertising Services - update**

The attached letter from WALGA is provided for Council information and it outlines how local government has and will spend advertising funds. The letter identifies a movement towards a more digitally based advertising environment, analysis of local government spending, advertising contract negotiations with The West Australian and the Community Newspaper Group. In the past, local governments have received year end rebates for the West Australian discounts. These will no longer be issued.

# Student letters to Hon Mia Davies MLA

As part of their studies into politics and government, Year 8 Narembeen High School students were asked to write to the Hon Mia Davies MLA outlining what recreational facilities they would like to see in Narembeen.

A range of suggestions were provided and they are attached for Council's information. Hon Mia Davies sent the Shire a copy of the letters as a courtesy and the Chief Executive Officer has written to each student acknowledging their views and that they would be presented to Council for their information.

# **Narembeen Recreation Centre Carpet**

As a result of feedback from Councillors regarding options to resolve the carpet issue, a letter was sent to MCG Architects informing them that the only outcome Council will support is the complete replacement of carpets and that Council will now only deal with MCG Architects. This is considered necessary because the carpet manufacturer has voided the warranty on the carpets due to non-compliance with their installation instructions and guidelines. Partial relaying of the existing carpets will not result in the reinstatement of the warranty. At the time of writing, no feedback has been received in relation to these instructions.

# **Local Government Week**

# LAUNCH OF STATE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE WEBSITE AND STATE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DOCUMENTS

I am writing to advise you of two key initiatives recently undertaken by the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC).

Firstly, we are very pleased to announce the launch our re-designed website www.semc.wa.gov.au. This new website has a stronger platform, an innovative design and a layout aimed at making the site user-friendly and easier to navigate.

As the peak body for emergency management in Western Australia (WA), the SEMC wanted to create a website to provide our stakeholders with useful and relevant information on emergency management in WA. We also want to foster the sharing of knowledge, so I encourage you to visit the website and familiarise yourself with the wealth of emergency management information that is available.

Secondly, the SEMC has approved the suite of State emergency management (EM) documents for WA that will come into effect on 24 May 2016. These documents will be available on the SEMC website on the effective date and consist of:

- the State Emergency Management Policy (State EM Policy);
- the State Emergency Management Plan (State EM Plan);
- Hazard Specific Plans (Westplans);
- State Emergency Management Procedures (State EM Procedures);
- State Emergency Management Guidelines (State EM Guidelines); and
- State Emergency Management Glossary (State EM Glossary).

This achievement signifies the completion of an important phase in the State EM Policy and Governance Review Project. The suite of State EM documents are an amalgamation of current documents and replace the State Emergency Policies (SEMP policies) and Administration Procedures (ADPs), Operational Procedures (OPs) and Training Procedures (TPs).

It is recommended that local governments insert the attached State EM Policy Documents Mapping Sheet into the front of their Local Government Emergency Arrangements (LEMA) as an addendum. This will ensure the appropriate sections within the State EM Policy, State EM Plan and individual procedures can be located when required. Alternatively, if local governments are currently in the process of reviewing their LEMA, reference should be made to the relevant sections within the State EM Policy, Plan and individual procedures.

I would also like to draw your attention to some matters of note with the new documents, in particular:

- they highlight the roles and responsibilities given by the SEMC to public authorities, including local government refer to the State EM Policy;
- the documents contain the same policy statements and operational arrangements within the former SEMP policies but with statement of fact (factual) amendments;
- Westplan Freight Subsidy (Isolated Communities) has been revoked; and
- the current Westplans have been updated to reference appropriate sections within the State EM Policy and State EM Plan, except in relation to the following Westplans:
  - Westplan Recovery Coordination has been incorporated within the State EM Policy and State EM Plan;
  - Westplans Emergency Public Information, Health, Welfare, Reception, Registration and Reunification and Telecommunications have been included in the State EM documents and also, as applicable, in:
    - the new State Emergency Public Information Plan;
    - the Department of Health's new State Health Emergency Response Plan;
    - the Department of Child Protection and Family Support's new State Emergency Welfare Plan and its annexes on Reception and Registration and Reunification; and
    - State Emergency Telecommunications Plan.

On behalf of the SEMC, I would like to express my appreciation for local governments' contribution to the State's emergency management arrangements. The SEMC looks forward to working with local governments in the next phase of the Policy and Governance Review Project, during which a review will be undertaken to enhance the State EM arrangements.

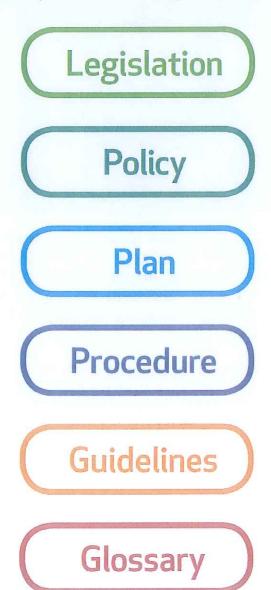

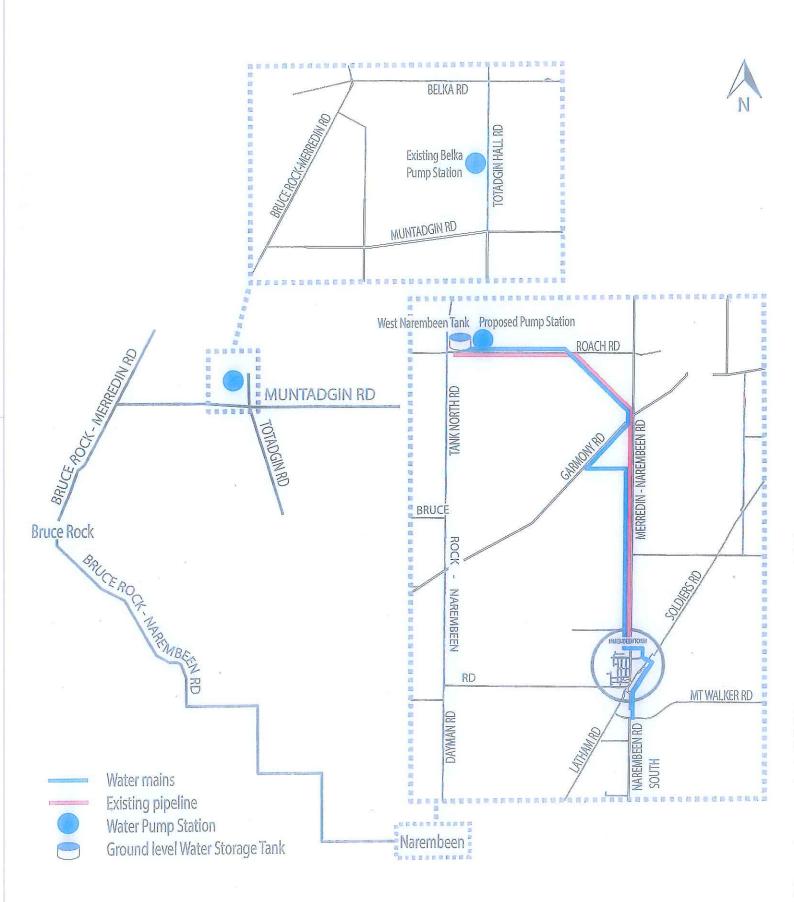

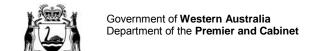

# 2015/16 WANDRRA ELIGIBLE DISASTER PROCLAMATION NOTIFICATION Heavy Rainfall & Flooding in the South West Land Division (19-27 March 2016)

The above event has been proclaimed an *eligible disaster* under the Western Australia Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (WANDRRA) on 7 June 2016, pursuant to Section 4.2 of the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements Determination 2012 Version 2.0, issued by the Commonwealth Government Attorney-General. The State Government will provide immediate financial assistance to those people who have been affected through joint State and Commonwealth disaster relief and recovery arrangements.

A surface trough near the west coast and an upper level trough produced areas of heavy rain and severe thunderstorms over the Mid-West and Central Wheat Belt districts early on 19 March, 2016. In addition, on 26-27 March 2016, a surface low of tropical origin interacted with a mid-level trough to produce heavy rainfall across the South West Land Division over two days. Rainfall levels ranged from 50 mm to 86 mm over the area.

Pursuant to Section 1.1.1 of the NDRRA Determination 2012 Version 2.0, 'flood' is deemed to be an eligible *natural disaster* event.

For the purposes of the Western Australia Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (WANDRRA) this event will be referred to as 'Heavy Rainfall & Flooding in the South West Land Division (19-27 March 2016)'

WANDRRA is jointly funded by the State and Commonwealth Governments and administered by the Department of the Premier and Cabinet (DPC), with assistance from other agencies. Through WANDRRA, the Western Australian and Commonwealth Governments provide help to people who have suffered the direct impact of a proclaimed natural disaster event.

The Local Government districts subject to this proclamation are as follows:

- Shire of Chittering
- Shire of Dalwallinu
- Shire of Lake Grace
- Shire of Narembeen
- Shire of Northam

- Shire of Perenjori
- Shire of Sandstone
- Shire of Victoria Plains
- Shire of Yalgoo
- Shire of York

If information becomes available that identifies other local government districts as potentially having been directly impacted by this natural disaster event, subject to further assessment these local government districts may, at a later date, be included in the affected area.

The eligible costs for this event are anticipated to be largely associated with the restoration and replacement of essential public assets, mainly the local and state road network infrastructure. It is also anticipated that some costs may be incurred for the clean-up of local and state government owned property.

Assistance may be available for the following measures (where appropriate) typically covered by the WANDRRA:

- For individuals and families Personal Hardship and Distress grants which are
  administered by the Department for Child Protection and Family Support (CPFS).
  Potential measures include emergency food, accommodation, clothing,
  temporary living expenses, replacement of essential household contents and
  housing repairs to return housing to a habitable, safe and secure condition. Note
   some of these measures are subject to income and/or assets testing.
- For small businesses interest rate subsidies on 'new' loans approved by Authorised Deposit-taking Institutions.
- For Primary Producers Assistance may be available toward freight costs, materials for boundary fences (<u>only</u> where it is demonstrated that public safety is at risk), professional advice grants and interest rate subsidies on 'new' loans approved by Authorised Deposit-taking Institutions. These eligible measures are administered by the Department of Agriculture and Food.
   Important Note Claims should be lodged before 7 December 2016.
- For Local Governments & State Government Agencies Clean-up costs and the restoration or replacement (to pre-disaster standard) of essential public assets including local road damage. State road damage is also included through Main Roads Western Australia (MRWA). Only costs incurred that are 'additional' costs, and are directly related to the event, will be eligible for reimbursement. Important Note - The allowable time limit for eligible claims expires on 30 June 2018.

Claims in respect of any other *eligible measures* may also be considered.

It should be noted that assistance under the WANDRRA is not designed to supplant, or operate as a disincentive for self-help by way of commercial insurance.

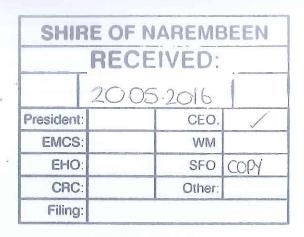

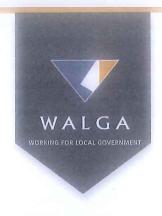

# **Group Advertising Services 2016**

WALGA is pleased to provide this update on whole of sector Group Advertising activity.

# **Advertising Spend Analysis**

Current year activity is tracking towards \$600,000 of quantifiable media rate savings on whole of sector advertising spend, and further allocations of space and value added products. Coupled with the efficiencies associated with direct and tender exempt access to this contract, there has been an overall value benefit to the Local Government sector of approximately \$1 million over the past year.

There is a continuing trend towards online recruitment advertising, locally focussed promotion of Local Government services, festivals and events, and greater use of composite advertising across multiple media channels. New media options are constantly evolving resulting in greater use of digital media, social media, and targeted reach. Examples include an upcoming new online presence by Community News with a "digital first" approach and a stronger focus on hyper local content, and advanced talent search options from Seek that proactively identify prospective job candidates.

Nonetheless the overall Local Government spend has remained at a constant level, but the way in which this spend is being directed is changing, to deliver more effective use of the advertising dollar. WALGA anticipates this trend to continue.

#### 2016 Media Rate Negotiations

Annual media rate negotiations for the forthcoming financial year are currently progressing. WALGA anticipates that The West Australian contract will be renewed under its current structure with minimum impact on rates and values add initiatives including discounted opportunities for features.



Some changes are anticipated to the Community News contract, namely the current full page allocation arrangement will not be retained. This initiative has been in place for six years and it is now time to revisit and evaluate its relevance in the constant evolving media landscape. In its place, new online and digital initiatives will be introduced to continue delivering best practice value add incentives as part of the contract. We will also continue to negotiate other existing value add components such as no loadings for preferred page positioning, value add space where available, a best rate approach as well as potential mayoral columns as editorial content.

# Rebate Structures

From the start of the current financial year WALGA restructured the billing system associated with the group advertising services. Invoices are now sent by Marketforce as the service provider. Negotiated media discounts are now delivered at source, so WALGA Members are reminded that year end rebates for the West Australian discount are no longer issued.

#### **SUMMARY**

Council is to consider approving the final draft of the Narembeen Civic Precinct Interpretation Plan.

#### **BACKGROUND**

For many years, Council and the Narembeen community have wanted to demolish the Lesser Hall as its usefulness to the district no longer exists. In 2015, heritage architect Stephen Carrick was engaged to prepare a Heritage Impact Statement (HIS) outlining the history and current use of the Lesser Hall with a view to its demolition. The HIS was considered by the Heritage Council and on 21 August 2015, the State Heritage Office (SHO) advised Council that the Heritage Council supported the demolition of the Lesser Hall subject to 2 conditions: that a detailed Archival Record of the Lesser Hall be prepared for Heritage Council approval and that an Interpretation Plan be prepared for the Narembeen Civic Precinct be submitted for review by the State Heritage Office Executive. It should be noted that the Interpretation Plan must include a commitment from Council to implement the Interpretation Plan within acceptable implementation timelines. A copy of the SHO's letter is attached.

Since that time, an Archival Record was prepared and submitted to the State Heritage Office for consideration. The SHO advised that the Archival Records meets the requirements of the Heritage Council. The first of 2 conditions associated with the Heritage Council's support for the demolition of the Lesser Hall has been met.

#### **COMMENT**

In order to comply with the Heritage Council's support for the demolition of the Lesser Hall, the second condition, the Final Draft of the Interpretation Plan, has been prepared for Council consideration and which is attached. Also attached is a covering letter from Stephen Carrick which provides an overview of the process required for acceptance, reporting and implementation of the Interpretation Plan.

Thank you for your letter of 2 July 2015 regarding the Shire's proposal to demolish the Narembeen Lesser Hall, which is situated within the registered curtilage of the Narembeen Civic Precinct.

The Heritage Council considered the matter at its meeting on 14 August 2015, and resolved to advise the Shire of Narembeen that the proposed demolition of the Narembeen Lesser Hall has been considered in the context of the identified cultural significance of the registered place and the following advice is given:

# **Findings**

- The future of the Lesser Hall has been an unresolved issue since 2005.
- The 1995 Civic Precinct Master Plan did not recommend entry of the Lesser Hall in the State Register. The place was registered in 1998.
- The recommendations of a 2008 Concept Plan were beyond the means of the Shire to implement.
- Use of the building has declined since the 1990s due to population decline and it is now largely disused, dilapidated and unsafe. However, the remaining Civic Precinct buildings are in good condition and are actively used and maintained.
- The Heritage Council notes the thorough and balanced approach taken to the preparation of the Heritage Impact Statement, which included engagement with key stakeholders in the community.
- The Lesser Hall is part of a precinct that will retain buildings of cultural heritage significance. The significance of the Hall as part of the precinct can be maintained through interpretation.

#### Advice

The proposed demolition is supported subject to the following conditions being fulfilled prior to demolition:

- A detailed Archival Record of the Lesser Hall shall be prepared and submitted to the Heritage Council in accordance with the State Heritage Office's 'Guide to Preparing an Archival Record'.
- 2. An Interpretation Plan, with implementation time frame, shall be prepared for the Narembeen Civic Precinct to ensure that the story of the development of the civic buildings is accessible and understood. The Interpretation Plan, together with a commitment from the Shire to implementation shall be submitted for review and to the satisfaction of the State Heritage Office Executive.

# Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 (FMR)

#### Reg 11. Payment of accounts

- 1. A local government is to develop procedures for the authorisation of and the payment of accounts to ensure that there is effective security for and properly authorised use of:
  - (a) cheques, credit cards, computer encryption devices and passwords, purchasing cards and any other devices or methods by which goods, services, money or other benefits may be obtained; and
  - (b) Petty cash systems.
- 2. A local government is to develop procedures for the approval of accounts to ensure that before payment of an account a determination is made that the relevant debt was incurred by a person who was properly authorised to do so.
- 3. Payments made by a local government
  - (a) subject to sub regulation (4), are not to be made in cash; and
  - (b) are to be made in a manner which allows identification of -
    - (i) the method of payment;
    - (ii) the authority for the payment; and

- (iii) the identity of the person who authorised the payment.
- 4. Nothing in sub regulation (3) (a) prevents a local government from making payments in cash from a petty cash system.

### Reg 12. Payments from municipal fund or trust fund

- 1. A payment may only be made from the municipal fund or the trust fund
  - (a) if the local government has delegated to the CEO the exercise of its power to make payments from those funds by the CEO; or
  - (b) otherwise, if the payment is authorised in advance by a resolution of the council
- 2. The council must not authorise a payment from those funds until a list prepared under regulation 13(2) containing details of the accounts to be paid has been presented to the council.

## Reg 13. Lists of accounts

- If the local government has delegated to the CEO the exercise of its power to make payments from the municipal fund or the trust fund, a list of accounts paid by the CEO is to be prepared each month showing for each account paid since the last such list was prepared
  - (a) the payee's name;
  - (b) the amount of the payment;
  - (c) the date of the payment; and
  - (d) sufficient information to identify the transaction.
- 2. A list of accounts for approval to be paid is to be prepared each month showing:
  - (a) for each account which requires council authorisation in that month -
    - (i) the payee's name;
    - (ii) the amount of the payment; and
    - (iii) sufficient information to identify the transaction; and
  - (b) the date of the meeting of the council to which the list is to be presented.
- 3. A list prepared under sub regulation (1) or (2) is to be -
  - (a) presented to the council at the next ordinary meeting of the council after the list is prepared; and
  - (b) recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of Accounting

This statement comprises a special purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (as they apply to local governments and not-for-profit entities), Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the Local Government Act 1995 and accompanying regulations. Material accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this statement are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

Except for cash flow and rate setting information, the report has also been prepared on the accrual basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and liabilities.

#### **Critical Accounting Estimates**

The preparation of a financial report in conformity with Australian Accounting Standards requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that effect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses.

The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances; the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

#### (b) The Local Government Reporting Entity

All Funds through which the Council controls resources to carry on its functions have been included in this statement.

In the process of reporting on the local government as a single unit, all transactions and balances between those funds (for example, loans and transfers between Funds) have been eliminated.

All monies held in the Trust Fund are excluded from the statement, but a separate statement of those monies appears at Note 12.

### (c) Rounding Off Figures

All figures shown in this statement are rounded to the nearest dollar.

#### (d) Rates, Grants, Donations and Other Contributions

Rates, grants, donations and other contributions are recognised as revenues when the local government obtains control over the assets comprising the contributions. Control over assets acquired from rates is obtained at the commencement of the rating period or, where earlier, upon receipt of the rates.

#### (e) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST receivable or payable.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, cash at bank, deposits available on demand with banks and other short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and bank overdrafts.

Bank overdrafts are reported as short term borrowings in current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

#### (g) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from ratepayers for unpaid rates and service charges and other amounts due from third parties for goods sold and services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Collectability of trade and other receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts that are known to be uncollectible are written off when identified. An allowance for doubtful debts is raised when there is objective evidence that they will not be collectible.

### (h) Inventories

#### General

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

#### Land Held for Resale

Land held for development and sale is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes the cost of acquisition, development, borrowing costs and holding costs until completion of development. Finance costs and holding charges incurred after development is completed are expensed.

Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss at the time of signing an unconditional contract of sale if significant risks and rewards, and effective control over the land, are passed on to the buyer at this point.

Land held for sale is classified as current except where it is held as non-current based on Council's intentions to release for sale.

### (i) Fixed Assets

All assets are initially recognised at cost. Cost is determined as the fair value of the assets given as consideration plus costs incidental to the acquisition. For assets acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration, cost is determined as fair value at the date of acquisition. The cost of non-current assets constructed by the local government includes the cost of all materials used in the construction, direct labour on the project and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead.

Certain asset classes may be revalued on a regular basis such that the carrying values are not materially different from fair value. Assets carried at fair value are to be revalued with sufficient regularity to ensure the carrying amount does not differ materially from that determined using fair value at reporting date.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (i) Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

All non-current assets having a limited useful life are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner which reflects the consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in those assets.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis, using rates which are reviewed each reporting period. Major depreciation rates and periods are:

Buildings	25 to 50 years
Construction other than Buildings (Public Facilities)	5 to 50 years
Furniture and Equipment	4 to 10 years
Plant and Equipment	5 to 15 years
Heritage Assets	25 to 50 years
Roads	25 years
Footpaths	50 years
Sewerage Piping	75 years
Water Supply Piping and Drainage Systems	75 years

#### (k) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Council prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Council becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services. The amounts are unsecured, are recognised as a current liability and are normally paid within 30 days of recognition.

#### (I) Employee Benefits

The provisions for employee benefits relates to amounts expected to be paid for long service leave, annual leave, wages and salaries and are calculated as follows:

- (i) Wages, Salaries, Annual Leave and Long Service Leave (Short-term Benefits) The provision for employees' benefits to wages, salaries, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled within 12 months represents the amount the Shire has a present obligation to pay resulting from employees services provided to balance date. The provision has been calculated at nominal amounts based on remuneration rates the Shire expects to pay and includes related on-costs.
- (ii) Annual Leave and Long Service Leave (Long-term Benefits)
  The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provi

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits and measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the project unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows. Where the Shire does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months, the liability is recognised as a current liability.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (m) Interest-bearing Loans and Borrowings

All loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs.

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fees paid on the establishment of loan facilities that are yield related are included as part of the carrying amount of the loans and borrowings.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Council has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the balance sheet date.

#### **Borrowing Costs**

Borrowing costs are recognised as an expense when incurred except where they are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset. Where this is the case, they are capitalised as part of the cost of the particular asset.

#### (n) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when: The council has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events; it is more likely than not that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and the amount has been reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one of item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

#### (o) Current and Non-Current Classification

In the determination of whether an asset or liability is current or non-current, consideration is given to the time when each asset or liability is expected to be settled. The asset or liability is classified as current if it is expected to be settled within the next 12 months, being the Council's operational cycle. In the case of liabilities where Council does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months, such as vested long service leave, the liability is classified as current even if not expected to be settled within the next 12 months. Inventories held for trading are classified as current even if not expected to be realised in the next 12 months except for land held for resale where it is held as non current based on Council's intentions to release for sale.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (p) Nature or Type Classifications

#### Rates

All rates levied under the Local Government Act 1995. Includes general, differential, specific area rates, minimum rates, interim rates, back rates, ex-gratia rates, less discounts offered. Exclude administration fees, interest on instalments, interest on arrears and service charges.

#### **Operating Grants, Subsidies and Contributions**

Refer to all amounts received as grants, subsidies and contributions that are not non-operating grants.

#### **Non-Operating Grants, Subsidies and Contributions**

Amounts received specifically for the acquisition, construction of new or the upgrading of non-current assets paid to a local government, irrespective of whether these amounts are received as capital grants, subsidies, contributions or donations.

#### **Profit on Asset Disposal**

Profit on the disposal of assets including gains on the disposal of long term investments. Losses are disclosed under the expenditure classifications.

#### **Fees and Charges**

Revenues (other than service charges) from the use of facilities and charges made for local government services, sewerage rates, rentals, hire charges, fee for service, photocopying charges, licences, sale of goods or information, fines, penalties and administration fees. Local governments may wish to disclose more detail such as rubbish collection fees, rental of property, fines and penalties, other fees and charges.

#### **Service Charges**

Service charges imposed under Division 6 of Part 6 of the Local Government Act 1995. Regulation 54 of the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 identifies the These are television and radio broadcasting, underground electricity and neighbourhood surveillance services. Exclude rubbish removal charges. Interest and other items of a similar nature received from bank and investment accounts, interest on rate instalments, interest on rate arrears and interest on debtors.

#### **Interest Earnings**

Interest and other items of a similar nature received from bank and investment accounts, interest on rate instalments, interest on rate arrears and interest on debtors.

#### Other Revenue / Income

Other revenue, which can not be classified under the above headings, includes dividends, discounts, rebates etc.

#### **Employee Costs**

All costs associate with the employment of person such as salaries, wages, allowances, benefits such as vehicle and housing, superannuation, employment expenses, removal expenses, relocation expenses, worker's compensation insurance, training costs, conferences, safety expenses, medical examinations, fringe benefit tax, etc.

#### **Materials and Contracts**

All expenditures on materials, supplies and contracts not classified under other headings. These include supply of goods and materials, legal expenses, consultancy, maintenance agreements, communication expenses, advertising expenses, membership, periodicals, publications, hire expenses, rental, leases, postage and freight etc. Local governments may wish to disclose more detail such as contract services, consultancy, information technology, rental or lease expenditures.

#### Utilities (Gas, Electricity, Water, etc.)

Expenditures made to the respective agencies for the provision of power, gas or water. Exclude expenditures incurred for the reinstatement of roadwork on behalf of these agencies.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (q) Nature or Type Classifications (Continued)

#### Insurance

All insurance other than worker's compensation and health benefit insurance included as a cost of employment.

#### Loss on asset disposal

Loss on the disposal of fixed assets.

#### Depreciation on non-current assets

Depreciation expense raised on all classes of assets.

#### Interest expenses

Interest and other costs of finance paid, including costs of finance for loan debentures, overdraft accommodation and refinancing expenses.

#### Other expenditure

Statutory fees, taxes, provision for bad debts, member's fees or levies including WA Fire Brigade Levy and State taxes. Donations and subsidies made to community groups.

#### (r) Statement of Objectives

Council has adopted a 'Plan for the future' comprising a Strategic Community Plan and Corporate Business Plan to provide the long term community vision, aspirations and objectives.

Based upon feedback received from the community the vision of the Shire is:

"A wonderful place to live, work, invest and visit with the community working together to achieve shared objectives"

The Strategic Community Plan defines the key objectives of the Shire as:

"Economic: A strong, resilient and balanced economy.

Environment: Our unique natural and built environment is protected and enhanced.

Social: Our community enjoys a high quality of life.

Civic Leadership: A collaborative and engaged community."

#### (s) Reporting Programs

Council operations as disclosed in this statement encompass the following service orientated activities/programs:

#### **GOVERNANCE**

Expenses associated with provision of services to members of council and elections. Also included are costs associated with computer operations, corporate accounting, corporate records and asset management. Costs reported as administrative expenses are redistributed in accordance with the principle of activity based costing (ABC).

#### **GENERAL PURPOSE FUNDING**

Rates and associated revenues, general purpose government grants, interest revenue and other miscellaneous revenues such as commission on Police Licensing. The costs associated with raising the above mentioned revenues, eg. Valuation expenses, debt collection and overheads.

#### LAW, ORDER, PUBLIC SAFETY

Enforcement of Local Laws, fire prevention, animal control and provision of ranger services.

#### **HFAITH**

Health inspection services, food quality control, mosquito control and contributions towards provision of medical health services.

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### (s) Reporting Programs (Continued)

#### **HOUSING**

Provision and maintenance of rented housing accommodation for pensioners and employees.

#### **COMMUNITY AMENITIES**

Sanitation, sewerage, stormwater drainage, protection of the environment, public conveniences, cemeteries and town planning.

#### **RECREATION AND CULTURE**

Parks, gardens and recreation reserves, library services, television and radio re-broadcasting, swimming facilities, walk trails, youth recreation, Shark Bay World Heritage Discovery and Visitor Centre, boat ramps, foreshore, public halls and Shark Bay Recreation Centre.

#### **TRANSPORT**

Construction and maintenance of roads, footpaths, drainage works, parking facilities, traffic control, depot operations, plant purchase, marine facilities and cleaning of streets.

#### **ECONOMIC SERVICES**

Tourism, community development, pest control, building services, caravan parks and private works.

#### **OTHER PROPERTY & SERVICES**

Plant works, plant overheads and stock of materials.

#### **SUMMARY**

Council to consider the Fees and Charges Schedule for the coming budget period, financial year.

#### **BACKGROUND**

When Council is imposing or adopting fees and charges, they are included in its annual budget process. Fees & Charges can be imposed at any time during the year or amended from time to time during a financial year provided it advertises the proposed changes accordingly. (Absolute Majority required)

Council would also be aware that the Narembeen Community Resource Centre was formally included as a Council function from 1 July 2014. Given this, the fees and Charges of the CRC are now also reviewed in line with statutory regulation.

A list of the Draft 2016/2017 Fees & Charges for the Shire of Narembeen is attached for Council's information and review.

## **COMMENT**

Each year staff undertake a thorough review of Council's Schedule of Fees and Charges. Attached is a list of suggested changes to the schedule on items that are NOT statutory. Any statutory changes have been amended however; these are not at the discretion of Council.

Council also need to consider the following matters in the relation to the Schedule of Fees and Charges for the Shire of Narembeen;

- Rubbish collection charges. To date we have not received notification form Avon Waste regarding their charge increase for 2016/2017. This will pay a part in allocating a price for the rubbish collection.
- Commercial property rent. Council is encouraged to review the amounts currently set for leasing commercial properties and advise if they would like them increased. If so, by how much. These rates were last set in 2013/2014.

## Subdivision 2 — Fees and charges

## 6.16. Imposition of fees and charges

- (1) A local government may impose\* and recover a fee or charge for any goods or service it provides or proposes to provide, other than a service for which a service charge is imposed.
  - \* Absolute majority required.
- (2) A fee or charge may be imposed for the following
  - (a) providing the use of, or allowing admission to, any property or facility wholly or partly owned, controlled, managed or maintained by the local government;
  - (b) supplying a service or carrying out work at the request of a person;
  - (c) subject to section 5.94, providing information from local government records;
  - (d) receiving an application for approval, granting an approval, making an inspection and issuing a licence, permit, authorisation or certificate;
  - (e) supplying goods;
  - (f) such other service as may be prescribed.
- (3) Fees and charges are to be imposed when adopting the annual budget but may be
  - (a) imposed\* during a financial year; and
  - (b) amended\* from time to time during a financial year.

## 6.17. Setting level of fees and charges

- (1) In determining the amount of a fee or charge for a service or for goods a local government is required to take into consideration the following factors
  - (a) the cost to the local government of providing the service or goods; and
  - (b) the importance of the service or goods to the community; and
  - (c) the price at which the service or goods could be provided by an alternative provider.
- (2) A higher fee or charge or additional fee or charge may be imposed for an expedited service or supply of goods if it is requested that the service or goods be provided urgently.
- (3) The basis for determining a fee or charge is not to be limited to the cost of providing the service or goods other than a service
  - (a) under section 5.96; or
  - (b) under section 6.16(2)(d); or

<sup>\*</sup> Absolute majority required.

- (c) prescribed under section 6.16(2)(f), where the regulation prescribing the service also specifies that such a limit is to apply to the fee or charge for the service.
- (4) Regulations may
  - (a) prohibit the imposition of a fee or charge in prescribed circumstances; or
  - (b) limit the amount of a fee or charge in prescribed circumstances.
