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
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

EULOGY - BILL BAILEY

Good morning everyone and thank you all for coming today to celebrate the life of Bill – our brother, our father, our father in law, our grandfather, our great grandfather and "our friend".

Each of you here today have your own relationship, your own set of memories of my father. How lucky we all are to have known him, to have had him in our lives. My father was a gentleman ... in all manner of the word.

He fulfilled every obligation he ever took. His word was his bond and everyone knew it.

I never heard him utter a lie nor intentionally deceive.

William Edward Bailey was born on 30th April 1929 in St Annes Hospital Mt Lawley. He was the first born followed by Bob, Anne, Jennifer, Helen and the baby of the family, Peter.

My Father was self-made and self-reliant, from his education to his career, from his skill with everything agricultural, machinery, soil cropping and to breeding some of the best merino sheep in the district.

Bills schooling was at the Graball school, opposite the farm gate. Being the oldest, it was Bills job to unhitch the horses from the sulkies in the morning at school and take them down to the dam for a drink. Likewise, just before school finished, he would water the horses again and hook the sulkies up to the horses for everyone to get home. The school eventually closed down due to lack of numbers so correspondence was done at home. The school bus started, then it was a six mile ride to Yeomans to catch it. Bob used to ride dinky on Bills handlebars. On one occasion they missed the bus so Bill rode into town — with Bob on the handlebars. At the conclusion of the day the principal said you might as well ride home, which they did — with Bob on the handlebars.

After finishing school in Narembeen, Bill spent three years of high school at Northam, boarding with the manager of Easywalking shoes. It was there that he developed a distaste of pumpkins, as the managers wife grew nothing but pumpkins – for breakfast, lunch and dinner. So, if anyone wondered why Bill left the pumpkin on his plate, you now know why.

While at high school he was a member of both the football and cricket teams.

Dad left school at fifteen and went back on the farm where he worked together with Pop and Bob for ten years. During this time Pop lent Bill £4,000 to buy his first block which he duly paid back. At the time, anyone under the age of twenty one could not own land in their name so it had to be put in Pops name, transferring it later when Bill was of age.

While working with Pop and Bob he was determined to get away from pulling two A1 Sunshine Harvesters in tandem so he persuaded Pop to by the first International Harvester from Moppetts. A new GL200. Now this was a mighty machine....but the grain box was only nine bags so he did away with the grain box and designed a forty five bag bin that was towed behind the large rear wheel ... no easy feat considering the tools and materials at hand.





It was about this time, 1955, at a weekend in Perth with Eric Berry, they met two ladies from Bruce Rock, one of those ladies was the very attractive Lydia Jean Mitchell. They would go on to meet again at football matches and dances until the 3rd March 1956 when they were married in St Peters Victoria Park.

Things moved quickly after that. Greg was born, I followed eighteen months later then Karen three years after that.

During this time the family home was established and more land was purchased from brother Bob at Mt Walker. Then with Greg and I home from school, Dad went alone and started gradually expanding, eventually owning 13,000 acres.

My father was a great family man. He was proud of his children ... most of the time

Family holidays were always looked forward to as this was the time we all had his undivided attention. Trips to North Fremantle to visit grandparents with the mornings at Port Beach, swimming and jumping off his big shoulders in the surf, turning into whole day events at the beach. He didn't seem to mind. Probably because at the end of the day, he and Harry (Pop) would head down to the Rose for a couple of cold ones.

Other holidays include Busselton and an epic 1965 trip inland to Roebourne in an EH Holden station wagon, brave move with three kids in the back. I think even dad didn't realise how many gates there were.

As grandchildren came along his focus shifted to them and he was always enquiring as to their whereabouts, and, what they were doing, whether it be sport, travel or studies.

All during his time Dad participated in all sports.

My father was a gifted cricketer who played County Week. It was Bill, who along with Bob and others who set up the Mt Walker Cricket Club. They spent twelve months clearing a site and preparing a pitch and outfield, to only have to close after twelve months due to not being able to stay in the competition.

Bill was also a solid golfer playing for many years. He was also involved in the Narembeen Tennis Club, He played bowls for many years, winning all championships except for singles.

But it was as a footballer that he shone. Bill played for Rovers and many a battle he and Chook Currie had on derby days. He also represented the Association on many occasions.

My father had a sense of civic duty. He served as a councillor for eight years. His time at the council coincided with the purchase of Walkers farm by the shire, which he considered on of the best decisions made while he was serving.

It has been mentioned to me by a past president that Dad was one of the most learned councillors he had come across, not only of local issues but worldly issues as well. Although he didn't speak a lot at meetings, very rarely was he spoken against. To the best of my knowledge he never missed a meeting and you would never have to ask him twice to do anything.

He was always very keen to go on trips to other shires as a councillor to gather ideas to improve all things Narembeen, but also very keen to show the visiting councillors the way things were done here so that they could take on board ideas to improve the running of their shires

He was very involved, and participated in the setting up of the Aged Care Facilities in the town.

He was also involved in the Historical Society.

My father had a quiet dignity, respecting himself the way he respected others.

In his final days he occasionally lost his good humour but never had one moment of self-pity.

In life, and now in death he wouldn't want us to focus on the sadness and the sorrow.

My father lived Life to the full ... from start to finish

We are extremely grateful to the Shire Council for allowing us to use their chambers and old library area during our renovations.

The meeting was opened with one minutes silence to pay respects to Bill Bailey, one of our very valuable members. His knowledge of the area will be greatly missed by the Society.

The main business matters discussed were as follows:-

There is still a lot of re shuffling of furniture and display items to go through yet before the Centre is open to the general public. Funding has been supplied and we are taking delivery of new glass display cabinets later this week. Some items are still to be moved back from the railway shed.

Our Billericay information bay is still to be finished.

Historic facts are being sourced by the group developing the information bay at the Wadderin Precinct. Hazel Toovey has been able to supply details on the early days while the dam was being built. Discussion was had on when the dam roof was taken off, in the 1970's or 1980's. IF YOU KNOW WHEN THE DAM ROOF WAS TAKEN OFF PLEASE LET ONE OF OUR MEMBERS KNOW.

The 100 years of local government will be celebrated in 2024 and the members are asked to add to the information already listed.

Kings Tours are planning to come through the town on a Tour early in September. We are pleased to be able to show the visitors what we have in the museums and in the town. The Grain Discovery centre is on their agenda and we hope to show them our newly renovated building as well as showcase the town.

Several visitors have passed through the town and have been given a tour of our museums. Many thanks to those members who offer their time to these visitors. Many of them are delighted with the information that we have in our files.

The machinery and buildings have been tidied up at AVOCA farm thanks to Chris Bray. Some extra machines have been moved out to the buildings. Discussion was held in regards to the implications of moving the machinery around, from shed to shed, further research needs to be done in this regard.

IT'S A WRAP! JULY COUNCIL MEETING

RFQ 03/2020 - Supply and Delivery of Aggregate

Council resolved for the CEO to obtain eQuotes for the Supply and Delivery of Aggregate with a supply only option for a three year period with an option to extend for two years. All eQuotes received are to be presented at the August 2020 Ordinary Meeting of Council.

RFQ 02/2020 - Supply, Delivery and Spraying of Bitumen

Council approved that Bitutek Pty Ltd of Ellenbrook WA, based on the recommendation of the evaluation panel, local knowledge as the current provider and their company experience be awarded the contract for the Supply, Delivery and Spraying of Bitumen (RFQ 2/2020) for a period of three years, from July 2020 to June 2023. With an option to extend for a further two years, depending on satisfactory performance and service provided.

Narembeen Volunteer Fire & Emergency Services (Narembeen VFES) Vehicle Transfer

Council approved that two Narembeen Bush Fire Brigade vehicles, being a Toyota Landcruiser fast attack (NB025) and an Isuzu 2.4 fire truck (NB393) be disposed of to the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) as part of the establishment of the Narembeen Volunteer Fire and Emergency Services.

It was resolved that in accordance with the signed Memorandum of Understanding between DFES and the Shire of Narembeen, DFES will as per section 4.2 of the MOU take full responsibility for these assets and ensure that this standard of fire appliance and or above will remain in the Shire of Narembeen in the future.

Council are required to give local public notice in accordance with section 3.58 of the Local Government Act 1995 of its intent to dispose of this property to DFES.

If no submissions are received by the closing date, the CEO is authorised to progress the transfer process. If submissions are received, the matter is to then be referred to Council's August 2020 Ordinary Meeting for further consideration.

Local Roads & Community Infrastructure Program (LRCI Program)

Council nominated the following projects to utilise the LRCI Program funding during the 2020/21 financial year and upon confirmation of funding adopt them for inclusion within the 2020/2021 Annual Budget:-

- Bows Road Culvert (estimated \$200,000);
- Town Hall External Restoration (estimated \$100,000);
- Town Oval Improvements [new water source] (estimated \$80,000); and
- Townsite Improvements Currall St Lighting Upgrade and Churchill St Beautification.

If the Town Hall Oval improvement (new water source) project was classed as an ineligible project, Council agreed to allocate the \$80,000 from this project towards an internal restoration of the Town Hall.

2020/2021 Budget Summary

The Shire of Narembeen 2020/2021 Annual Budget was adopted by Council and this year's budget will bring an exciting stage of development to the district with a few major projects and revitalization initiatives set to take place. Summarised below are some of the major focus points in the budget:

Roads

Utilising Roads to Recovery funding the Shire intends to conduct major works on Soldiers Road over the next few years and this is set to begin in 2020/2021 with a \$500K reseal program.

Regional Road Group funding will be used to partially fund a \$510K project on Kondinin Narembeen Road.

The Shire will continue with the redevelopment of the main entry intersection utilizing Federal Blackspot funding to deliver this \$570K body of works, aimed to make the area safer and more user friendly.

The big news for 2020/2021 is that the Shire has been able to secure funding through the Wheatbelt Secondary Freight Network of just over \$2m to undertake major works on the Merredin Narembeen Road, widening and improving the road surface to better service the freight movements.

Around the Town

The Shire will be undertaking several projects around the townsite in a bid to refresh and revitalize the area to provide a more attractive and welcoming district centre for all.

The Shire is utilizing \$500K of Drought Communities funding to fund two thirds of a major renovation of the Apex Park and Caravan Park precinct. This project is set to include improved landscaping, new public toilet facilities, improved amenities at the caravan park and more in a bid to improve this focal point at the entry to the townsite. It is hoped that improvements in this area will improve its useability for the community and encourage tourists to stay and spend money in our district as opposed to travelling through.

To link in with the above mentioned renovation and the intersection redevelopment, the Shire plans to construct a Shared Pathway on Currall Street to provide safe and smooth access from Churchill Street towards the Recreation Centre for wheelchairs, people with prams, cyclists and those walking or jogging. The Shire is hoping this is just the beginning of a series of footpath upgrades across the townsite. This project will be 50% funded by the Department of Transport.

Rates

So far 2020 has been somewhat turbulent because of COVID-19 and thankfully so far, our community has been mostly insulated from its impacts. The Shire is aware that the virus has caused disruption to many businesses and service providers and in June 2020 the Narembeen Council adopted a Council Policy – Financial Hardship that provides a mechanism by which people and businesses who have been significantly affected by COVID can apply to the Shire for concessions relating to rates and other debts. The Policy and application form are available on the Shire's website - https://www.narembeen.wa.gov.au/the-shire/public-documents/policies.aspx The Shire has worked hard in the 2020/2021 Annual Budget to keep operational spending at a level similar to that of 2019/2020, however in order for the Shire to maintain its long term sustainability a rate increase has been applied for 2020/2021.

Considering the uncertain economic conditions at the moment, the Narembeen Council has taken a practical and equitable approach to this year's rate increase applying a three-step approach.

- 1. Minimum rates have increased by a modest amount \$10 from \$455 to \$465
- 2. The discount for on time payment of rates has reduced from 4% to 2% as always it is the cheapest option to pay rates in full on time regardless of the discount but as the economic conditions may see more ratepayers choosing the instalment option the discount in fact comes at a cost to those suffering most. Council also hopes that by having a reduced discount it will be able to reduce potential rate increases in future years.
- An increase to the rate in the dollar of 0.5% for all property types. The Narembeen Council has applied a minimal increase to the rate in the dollar applied to GRV and UV properties across the district.

The State Government has chosen to apply UV property revaluations in 2020/2021 even though they have applying significant pressure to Local Governments to minimise rate increases. As such although the Shire of Narembeen has applied a very minimal increase to its rate in the dollar, some properties will still experience an increase in their rates above 0.5% as their property values may have been increased by the valuer general. Increases will vary from property to property and some properties may also experience a reduction if their properties values have reduced.

Rates notices have been issued and should be in your mailbox over the next couple of weeks, if you haven't received your notice by the start of August, please get in touch with the Shire office so we can help track the notice down.

Overall, the Shire is expecting to receive \$1.79m in income from ratepayers in the 2020/2021 financial year. As always, the Shire aims to deliver significant community outcomes and provide essential services across the district with expected expenditure by the Shire in 2020/2021 set to exceed \$10m.

Sport and Recreation

The Shire is currently working on the development of a Sport and Recreation Plan to help guide decisions and investments across the district over the next 10 years.

In 2020/2021 the Shire is supporting the Narembeen Bowling Club with the provision of a selfsupporting loan to facilitate the resurfacing one of the bowling green surfaces.

The Shire has a strong understanding of the positive influence sport and recreation can have on the health and wellbeing of the community and in response to the significant disruption caused by COVID-19 the Narembeen Council has waived all sporting club ground usage fees for the 2020/2021 financial year.

The Shire of Narembeen is on a positive trajectory and is using its Strategic Community Plan and Corporate Business Plan to drive initiatives across the district. Included with this year's rate notice is a Rates Information Flyer and ESL Flyer that provides images and details around projects completed in 2019/2020 and where money will be spent in 2020/2021.

Council Policy - Continuing Professional Development of Council

Council adopted the new Council Policy - Continuing Professional Development of Council Members. The CEO was directed to advertise the new Policy for 14 days in line with the public consultation period in the Council Policy - Strategic Policy Framework and report significant comments back to Council.

Council agreed that if no comments were received the CEO be authorised to complete the policy adoption process including posting the document on the Shire of Narembeen website.

COVID-19 ESL Penalty Interest Concession

Council endorsed the modification of unpaid ESL penalty interest rate to 0% from 1 April 2020 until the 2020/2021 rates fall due on 31 August 2020 – essentially writing off any charges that have accrued during this period.

Council adopted the application of the default penalty interest charge of 8% for the 2020/2021 financial year.

Council authorised the Chief Executive Officer to waive and write off ESL penalty interest charges for excluded persons under the Council Policy – Financial Hardship.

Volunteer gag order on Central Wheatbelt volunteers unacceptable

Leader of The Nationals WA and Member for Central Wheatbelt Mia Davies says a new Department of Fire and Emergency Service's (DFES) code of conduct gagging volunteers from communicating with State and Federal Members of Parliament must be ditched.

The mandatory code of conduct was announced earlier this month by the Emergency Services Commissioner and requires all the State's 26,000 emergency services volunteers to sign up to it within four weeks.

Ms Davies said preventing volunteers from communicating with Members of Parliament was undemocratic and may stop them seeking support for equipment, infrastructure or any other challenges they may face.

"Preventing volunteers, who play a vital role in Wheatbelt communities, from engaging with Parliamentarians will be detrimental for their organisations and individuals," she said.

"Blocking their communication channel to raising issues impacting them or their brigade, group or unit essentially renders them voiceless in State and Federal Parliament.

"That could have negative consequences in the communities they serve, because one of their key pathways for raising concerns has been blocked."

There are dozens of emergency service groups, brigades and units in Central Wheatbelt whose members regularly put their own safety on the line to protect others in the community.

Ms Davies said the code of conduct was a severe overstep and needed to be addressed.

"Quite rightly many in the volunteer community are boiling mad about this and I don't blame them for feeling the way they do," she said.

"The Nationals WA have been vocal on behalf of volunteers and the need for the Premier to step in and intervene with this draconian code."
