



PAST RESIDENT UPDATE

The death occurred on the 17th June 2020 in Perth of Austin Smith at age 92 .Austin was an employee of the Bank of NSW in Narembeen in 1945. Nigel Moffat being the Manager at the time. Austin remembered well the end of war celebrations in '45 at Narembeen. Austin made a nostalgic trip to Narembeen in 2007 with his daughter Robyn Murray (formerly from Beverley but now retired in Albany).

He noted at the time that the old boarding house he stayed in with Mrs Moffat was gone and that Mrs Parrott's store building was still there. He was impressed how neat a town Narembeen was and bought a collection of history books about Narembeen at the time.

While in Narembeen back in 2007 he caught up with Bert Lethlean and Iris and Mel Bristow.

Austin always had very fond memories of Narembeen according to his daughter Robyn. It was his first posting as a bank teller. He involved himself in community activities while in Narembeen. He had attended Scotch College in the same year as Norm Cheetham.

KONDININ POLICE STATION SHOULD STAY, DAVIES

Central Wheatbelt MP Mia Davies has thrown her support behind the Kondinin community in an effort to keep their local police station open and staffed locally.

At a town meeting held last week, a well-attended community meeting was briefed by WA Police on a proposal to close the Kondinin police station and relocate to Hyden.

Ms Davies said Kondinin locals were extremely concerned at what the closure of the police station could mean for their community.

"The Kondinin community have been quick to express their concern at the potential loss of a station and officers based in their town," Ms Davies said.

"Everyone that has contacted me has said they aren't opposed to a new station being built in Hyden, but not at the expense of Kondinin and their community."

The community have put forward a sensible case as to why a local police presence in Kondinin is necessary, including the interaction with the local school and district hospital.

"The district hospital has had cause to contact police when dealing with violent or out of control patients on more than one occasion," Ms Davies said.

"The school also relies on a local police presence from time to time and if there's a longer wait or response time when these issues are raised there could be serious implications for students and staff welfare."

Ms Davies has written to the Minister for Police raising the concerns of the community.

"If there's an operational imperative to have a police presence in Hyden then we should be arguing for additional resources, rather than shifting them from one town to another," she said.

A petition is being circulated to demonstrate the support for the retention of the Kondinin Police station, housing and officers in Kondinin.

Ms Davies will present the petition to Parliament when it returns from the winter recess in coming weeks.

DAVIES WELCOMES COMPLETION OF NORTHAM HEALTH CAMPUS REDEVELOPMENT

Member for Central Wheatbelt Mia Davies MLA has welcomed the official opening of the \$42 million Northam Health Campus redevelopment.

The new and improved health facilities were part of a \$600 million injection into Wheatbelt health under the Royalties for Regions funded Southern Inland Health Initiative, delivered by The Nationals in Government.

"I am exceptionally proud to have been part of the previous Governments that fought for and committed this funding to improve health services in our region," Ms Davies said.

"Regional communities deserve modern hospital and health facilities so they can access treatment close to home.

"The new and improved facilities in Northam mean patients now have the convenience of staying in their community for surgical procedures, chemotherapy, pharmacy and renal services."

In February 2019 the Northam Health Service opened its newly refurbished emergency department allowing for greater privacy during treatment, and in June of this year two fully integrated operating theatres featuring state-of-the-art technology became operational.

The redevelopment also includes a central sterile services department with high tech equipment, specialist consulting rooms, an upgraded kitchen and an outpatient area for child health, mental health and occupational therapy services.

Nationals WA spokesperson for Health Martin Aldridge MLC said the Northam hospital redevelopment was part of the State's single biggest investment in regional health care in WA history.

"Projects like the Northam Hospital redevelopment were only made possible because The Nationals fought for and delivered Royalties for Regions," Mr Aldridge said.

"We knew that without significant investment health services would continue to be centralised back to Perth and further exacerbate the poor health outcomes country people have compared to their city counterparts.

"These are the types of projects we fight for every day, to make sure regional Western Australia gets a fair deal when it comes to health, education, and other critical services."

AUTUMN CLUB GUEST SPEAKER

Last Thursday Narembeen Autumn Club had the pleasure of welcoming Des Smoker as their guest speaker and appreciate him giving up his morning.

Des who had travelled to Port Hedland a few years ago, became involved with the Port Hedland Seafarers and explained what they do and how we can help the seamen who pass through the port.

Port Hedland Seafarers – Mission to Seamen, is a non profit organization run by the Anglican Church and is overseen by Garry South, Anglican Minister and his wife. Garry's wife is tour guide of Seafarers facilities and the Port. There is also a shop for the sailors to get provisions.

When the ships arrive in Port Hedland they sit off shore and wait anywhere between 2 to 7 days at sea before coming into the Port. At times there could be from 20 to 30 ships waiting, taking 36 hours for each ship to be loaded and fourteen days to sail from Port Hedland to China, then turning around to come back. Each ship has 23 workers contracted for nine months. Some of them have been on the ships for 14 months now because of the CoronaVirus pandemic.

Mining companies including BHP and Fortescue Mining (Twiggie Forrest) and our own "Dorcas" support them monetarily. But money alone cannot fill the gap. They rely on organisations like Autumn Club who support the group with knitted beanies. The Seafarers are out at sea for many months, and they just love our beanies over the top of their caps during the freezing northern winter months. These beanies are added to the Christmas gift bag for those that are in Port Hedland at Christmas time.

Around 2000 beanies are given out each year.

The Autumn Clubs wishes to thank Des for his informative talk and helping us to extend a helping hand to another needy organisation.



We would often wax lyrical about results and players and as I opined about reason for result Ray would often bring me back by saying 'Well Mr G, the most important thing is you had 40 young men playing footy'. I would smile and nod and then we would keep going in our conversation. I miss my friend Ray, I miss our conversations and I miss his sayings. The Narembeen Footy Club got beaten by two better sides yesterday and I'll fill you with scores later but right now I just want to consider the importance of the fact that we had 40 young men playing footy.

Something that the small Narembeen community should be very proud of is the fact that yesterday their footy club fielded two senior teams with 39 blokes pulling on a jumper. Of that 39, 35 of them were either living in Narembeen or from Narembeen. In a time where money and player recruitment has become a feature of country football the Narembeen Footy Club is still able to compete without going down very far down that path. This is a win and something I hope my old friend Ray looks down on with a sense of approval.



After their win against Geelong on the weekend Adam Simpson spoke about the West Coast Brand. What he was really defining then was what he believed was the way that West Coast played, all the time. You see good sides and good clubs have a way of doing things that is not determined by their place on the ladder or indeed by the numbers on the scoreboard. It may seem silly to some to talk of a 'brand' of football for a small country club but the Narembeen 'brand', built over many generations, came to the fore on Saturday.

The Ressies were chasing tail all day and were beaten by a far better side. However, to the eternal credit of the players they never gave up. They, to a man, looked to step up when they realised that their mates and therefore their team was

under the pump. The leaders looked to instruct and stay calm. The mid range players looked to bring effort because they knew that's what you do in a Narembeen jumper. Then, as a result of this direction on the ground, the teenagers, of which there were six, just kept pounding away at trying to play their role. They did all this, all day and then were still able to smile at the end of it. They lived up to the Narembeen 'Brand'.

The League game was more competitive than the earlier one but once again the Cats were worthy winners. They jumped the Hawks early with a highly impressive first quarter. They were fast, had a big target forward of the ball and smart in the back half. The Hawks were once again outgunned. The next three quarters however showed a group that were willing to also live by the brand. The midfield worked hard to get into the game with a young ruckman becoming more and more dominant. While the forwards and backs kept working throughout to give their team opportunities. Adam Miolini is a great example of what living by a brand can create. Adam was thrust into league footy at a young age and is your quintessential late developer. He is however Narembeen through and through and on Saturday he played his best game of league footy yet. He was tough and fearless, often flying for marks two on one across half forward and he was rarely beaten in doing so. He chased hard and never let his effort drop. Adam will develop into a fine Narembeen footballer and is something that the Narembeen brand is capable of producing.

The Hawks were beaten by a better side on Saturday and have been doing it tough since the start of this truncated 2020 season. However, they played by a brand that means they can hold their heads up and they have a positive future ahead of them. They also made sure they hung around after the footy to enjoy what is perhaps the best part of the Narembeen Brand. After all as someone I used to know once told me we've got 40 blokes playing footy and that's the main thing.
