

Wadderin Bushwalk project Can You Help?

Volunteers are needed for to assist with further work to be done on Thursday 20th and Friday the 21st of August with the help of local building contractor Chris Batty. Work will probably start at 8am on these days, but any help at any time would be welcome.

- At least 2 people will need to help Steve Fry and Chris with constructing the pavilion.
- There are two walks leading from the pavilion; 1km and 1.6km following kangaroo trails, and Michael Mortimore will use a bobcat to clear logs and bushes. At least 3 people, possibly with chainsaws, will need to stack the cleared material along the sides of the trails.
- Three posts should be concreted in place, which 2 people could do.
- To mark the walks there are 30 stainless steel animal cut-outs which will be bolted onto star pickets along the way. Peter Hall and the Men's Shed will fabricate these, and at some stage these will be put in place.
- The Burgin Road access gravel road has been widened and graded by the Shire, volunteers will need to clear the sides.
- The walks may have litter from the past which volunteers could clear.

The meeting place will be at the pavilion site which is located on the gravel road to the left as Cusack Drive changes from bitumen to gravel.

If anyone has any photos of the Wadderin Dam from many years ago Steve Fry would be keen to hear from you.

Missing the point.....

So last weekend did not see the fortunes of the Narembeen Footy Club change much. Although the juniors did have a win the two senior



sides were beaten again and beaten well again. I understand the fact that we live in a success driven society. Believe it or not I am one of those parents who does not believe in participation ribbons for kids at carnivals. However, as I tried to articulate last week with the help of the thoughts of a man much smarter than me anyone who, at this stage, is judging the Narembeen Footy Club on the scoreboard is just missing the point.

Let's start with the juniors. Juniors are an obviously vital part of any sporting club and the work done to promote and develop the game at this level is of the upmost importance. This year that responsibility has been taken on by Tim Cusack and Sheldon Miller. These two have put together fun and well organised training sessions and the kids have responded in kind. While their focus is clearly stated as not being about winning they did have their first win on the weekend and it was testament to the quality of work they have been doing. Plus it was nice for the kids.

Now let's consider the two senior sides. Last week I spoke about the fact that a vast majority of the players were of Narembeen origins and this was still true. This week I want to speak about age, about experience. Across the 36 players who pulled the jumper on for the club on the weekend only five were above the age of thirty. A further five were above the age of twenty five and seven were teenagers. The club is young, very young and this needs to be seen as a positive. There is something there that, if given the chance, could grow into a club of sustainability, success and enjoyment for years to come.

Let's consider some of the players. Levi Duffy first. Levi is fifteen years old. He has been thrust into a vital midfield role in a Ressies side that is under the pump. He is a kid who has grown two feet in the last five or so years. He has gone from a small little bloke to a young man of size and stature such physical change needs time to be grown into. His football needs to be given the same consideration. He is developing a work ethic that is going to set him in good stead. He is learning how to defend a player and ball movement by running hard not only when his team has the ball but when they don't. Levi gets it, he understands that he, and his team, are young and inexperienced, he understands that while footy may be tough now it won't always be because of the footballer he is becoming. Levi is an example of why the Narembeen Footy Club is succeeding.

Ben Gill doesn't tend to say all that much. He is a big bloke who, through an affection for shifting big heavy things, has a rig that would put most country footballers to shame. After copping one in the face in round one and missing round two Ben has returned with two games in the ruck of the highest order. He has rucked most of the day in both games and put in a display or competitiveness and commitment. He has taken contested marks against bigger opponents and often given his midfield a chance at first use. Ben is showing character and commitment which is setting the tone for the club. Plus he's only 23. Cody Duncan is a good footballer. He is the captain of the side and is leading it well. He sets the tone on the ground by the way he is playing and also off the ground for the way he conducts himself with his teammates. Duncan is having a season where he is looking to step up whenever he can. He breaks lines with the ball and back himself in under pressure. It is this kind of leadership that will see the Hawks come out the other end and be a strong club in years to come. And he's only 26.

The greatest mistake so many country footy clubs, country footy supporters and perhaps even country footy players make is they look for the instant hit. Each season is a boom or bust operation where clubs look to put together a group which will achieve the ultimate success then and there. If that success isn't achieved then and there quite often the toys are thrown out of the cot and we go back to square one. The Narembeen Footy Club needs to not be like this. The Narembeen Community needs to not look upon their footy club with this kind of approach. For if they do were and if they did they would all be missing the point.

The point is two fold. Our country towns need footy clubs. Inspection of this year's planned projects included Roads to Recovery projects—Soldiers Road, Sloss Road, Yeomans Road and Dixon Road. Regional Road Group projects—Cramphorne Road, Narembeen South Road and Kondinin-Narembeen Road. Wheatbelt Secondary Freight projects including Mount Walker Road and the Merredin-Narembeen Road.


