



Eulogy of Betty Price

Mum

Mum was the third child and 1st daughter of Kathleen and Ernest Bray.

She was born in Northam on November 28th 1932, preceded by Peter and David and followed by Wendy 5 years later.

Early years were spent in Glenn Forrest at the family shop. The children had a good home life wandering the hills area. Apparently Grandpa possessed a legendary whistle which he used to get the to kids to come home. On Sundays they would often head for the beach as Grandpa was a keen fisherman. Granny and the kids would spend time swimming or if it was inclement weather sheltering in a limestone cave on the beach while Grandpa fished. Hence their move in later years to Gull Street Marmion.

Mum went away to PLC for high school years where she gained her leaving certificate before going nursing at RPH. She graduated a Register general nurse before marrying Brian. Her brother Peter was farming at Narembeen and had become good friends with Dad and obviously realized it was a match made in Heaven. How right he was.

They married in South Perth in January 1954. That was the beginning of a 60 year partnership – one filled with love, laughter, family and many friends from all walks of life.

Barry was born at the end of 1954 and I followed 3 years later.

Mum settled into country life becoming part of many organisations and sporting clubs, tennis at Mount Arrowsmith, bowls and golf, and as is often the case, taking various positions such as Secretary or Treasurer, not one to want to be President of Captain. Always on the catering team for all the different organization she could whip up a feast without breaking a sweat. Mum became quite adventurous with her cooking after visiting different restaurants while on our annual holidays in Perth. I bet not may kids in the country got dishes like sukiyaki or chop suey served up for dinner.

Mum returned to nursing when Barry went away to Wesley. She did a nursing refresher and started working at the local hospital forging many very special relationships with the people she worked with and those she cared for. She was, from all account, an excellent nurse. Jutta, who cared for Mum in her last days, worked her first night shift with Mum at 16, and recalls she was thinking she was going to have a quiet night. Not one to waste time Mum had her up cleaning out cupboards amongst other things to do on night shift.

Mum did further training with the SES at Mt Macedon in 1970 and then an Extended Care course. After that as the Extended Care Nurse for the district she cared for many people on the farms and in their home. She also took particular pride in helping set up and run the "Senior Cits" with her good friends. My kids particularly looked forward to Senior Cits because they got to play bingo with the oldies, and of course they would win.

Mum was on the Aged homes committee for about 35 years and therefore was part of the working party to get aged care in Narembeen – firstly within the hospital and then Koolberrin Lodge and the Aged Homes Units. In the last 7-8 years she and Dad took advantage of these wonderful services. Mum spent her final years being lovingly cared for by the exceptional staff in Koolberrin Lodge and Lakeside. How fitting!!

Mum was a Carer. Whenever we needed her, even as adults she and Dad would be there. When our children were born Mum was there to look after us when we came home, very unobstrusive, and when she

felt that we were doing ok, she would go home to Dad, leaving fridges and freezers full, clothes washed and ironed and the house clean and tidy – no thanks asked for.

As the kids grew Mum and Dad would regularly take a couple back to the farm with them to relieve the chaos at home. The kids loved being with them on the farm. Mum didn't stand for any nonsense and I was always confident that they weren't being allowed to get away with too much, but she did spoil them cooking their favourite foods. Nans custard, apple cake, grilled chops and raw vegies, which they preferred to cooked vegies. As long as they ate them they would get sweets.

She introduced the Grandkids to Hairy McLarey, they would have her read it so often that they all knew it by heart.

Mum never mentioned any faux pas the kids made while up at the farm, which is why I was absolutely astounded when I heard via a third party that the house at Dodgaroo had been fire damanged while Mykel and Andrew had been staying with them when we had Callum in July 88 – apparently a smouldering stick had been put in the woodbox before they went up to the golf club to pick up Dad and when they returned smoke was billowing out of the windows. All Mum said when questioned was " Oh yes but its not too bad. A bit of paint will fix it" It took a lot more that a bit of paint that is for sure.

Mum was quiet, but determined, not easily swayed when she made up her mind. As kids we knew that no meant no and not maybe. Both she and Dad were always on the same page when it came to parenting although Dad could be a bit of a soft touch. What wonderful role models they were for us with our Kids.

Mum had a particular way of getting you to help with jobs around the house – no yelling or bribery needed. She would quietly ask once, if you said no or made excuses, she would just reply "OK, I will do it myself" – it took about 2 minutes and you would be right there along side doing that job without any complaints.

Mum and Dad were married 60 years and in later years became more dependent on each other – 2 halves of a whole – together they managed in the safe and supportive environment of the Narembeen community. Neither wanted to ever leave here so it was unfortunate when Dad required transfer to Perth – we almost had him home but sadly he didn't make it. Mum bravely carried on alone for about 12 months until it all got too much and she moved into the Lodge and then into Lakeside.

We have spent many happy times with Mum and Aunty Tom in Tommy's little unit and then with them both in the Lodge and Lakeside. Bill and I had our routine down pat – Up early to pack up the car with the thermos, food stuff and treats. Bill would organize lunch in the kitchen at the Lodge and I would put rollers in Mums hair and file and paint Aunty Toms nails. We would then eat lunch, chat about the kids and everything going on in town, finishing with desert and chocolates. Then we would head home leaving them to have their arvo nap.

We have missed those lunches with them since covid hit. Mum and Aunty Tom had too I am sure.

We couldn't have done this without the never ending help of Wendy and the amazing staff at the Hospital.

I think last week Mum probably felt like her job was done, we were all doing ok and she could go home to Dad, leaving our hearts full of wonderful memories.

On behalf of my family, I want to thank each and everyone of you in Narembeen for the love, care and respect that have shown to Mum and Dad over many years. We will miss our visits here, but you are always welcome in our homes in Perth and Mandurah.

We would love you to join us after this for light lunch and refreshements in honour of Bet and Pricey too.

Grain Brokers Australia Weekly Market Report

September 1, 2020

The record convoy of grain cargos bound for China set to continue...

The constant flow of grain cargos into Chinese ports continues unabated after Beijing embarked on an agricultural commodity buying spree, the magnitude of which has rarely, if ever, been previously seen.

The rate of grain buying from abroad in the first eight months of 2020 has some analysts speculating that, for the first time, China may use up its entire annual tariff-rate quota for both corn and wheat imports.

The demand is being driven by a remarkable recovery in the Chinese economy following the COVID-19 pandemic, a rebuilding of the pig herd following the outbreak of African Swine Fever (ASF) in 2018 and rebuilding of stocks that were drawn down over the course of the trade dispute with the United States.

According to recently released customs data, China imported 10.09 million metric tonne (MMT) of soybeans in July, up from 8.63MMT in July 2019, but below the June 2020 record of 11.16MMT. July corn imports were reported to be 910,000 metric tonne (MT), 133 per cent above the same period in 2019 and up from 880,00MT in June.

Wheat imports in July were reported to be 930,000MT, up a mammoth 323 per cent year-on-year, sorghum imports were up 148 per cent to 520,000MT and barley imports climbed 37 per cent to 410,000MT.

Year-to-date import figures reflect the staggering pace of this year's purchase program. Soybean imports surged 18 per cent in the first seven months of the year to 55.14MMT and corn arrivals were 4.57MMT, 31 per cent higher than the same period last year.

By the end of July, wheat imports were running 116 per cent ahead of 2019 at 4.28MMT, sorghum discharges were a staggering 941 per cent higher at 2.29MMT and barley was 16 per cent ahead of last year's imports at 2.86MMT. And the unprecedented pace of grain purchases continued in August.

China has been selling corn from its state reserves since May 28 in a bid to douse a very heated domestic market. Total reserve sales currently stand at 56MMT with the weekly program expected to continue until October when new-crop supplies come online. Last week's auction cleared 89 per cent of the corn tendered for sale, the first time in 14 weeks that 100 per cent of offered stocks failed to clear.

Cumulative international purchases of corn for the 2020/21 season are now estimated at more than 11MMT. This is comprised of 8MMT from the US, including 1.2MMT over a two-day window last week, and 3MMT from Ukraine. However, despite the substantial reserve sales and the import purchases, corn is still trading close to contract highs on the Dalian Commodity Exchange, suggesting deeper issues with the corn balance sheet in China in 2020.

The Middle Kingdom has been draining corn reserves since Donald Trump took office three and a half years ago. It is almost impossible to determine stocks in China, but some recent analysis suggested that ending stocks could fall to as low as 95MMT by the end of the 2020/21 season. That is less than 40 per cent of the stockpile in early 2017.

The recent auctions have been from the country's temporary reserve, and it is said to be nearly empty. So too the strategic reserve, and the national reserve stocks are also down sharply. Recent flooding is reported to have destroyed stockpiles in some low lying warehouses in the Yangtze basin, downstream of the Three Gorges Dam.

And with demand from the livestock sector increasing China now has the highest priced corn in the world at around US\$100 above import parity.

In their August update, the USDA pegged Chinese corn imports for the 2020/21 marketing year at 7MMT. But purchases have already surpassed that estimate, so a significant increase is expected in the September report. Most analysts are expecting imports to be at least 15MMT, some are as high as 20MMT, and even 25MT is considered a possibility if the strong demand continues and global prices remain low relative to domestic values.

The Chinese were also forced to draw down soybean stocks when the tariff war began with the US. This was diluted somewhat by lower soybean meal demand as a result of ASF. But the pig herd is recovering strongly, and that means increased demand for stockfeed inputs.

The relentless soybean purchasing program out of Brazil this year has been phenomenal. In just four months they have essentially milked that country dry of their exportable surplus, despite record production. With the strong Chinese demand and a plunging Real, Brazilian farmers have already sold 40 per cent of their forecast 2020/21 soybean production before the crop is even in the ground; up from 20 per cent at the same time last year.

Some interesting directives from the government in August have added to the market confusion. Early in the month, the state agency in charge of its strategic grain stockpiles moved to ban all photo-taking devices from its granaries, raising anxiety over the quality of national reserves. And then mid-month President Xi Jinping sparked concern of a food crisis when he announced the "Clean Plate Campaign" aimed at reducing the country's food waste.


The restocking program has now turned firmly to the US, with frequency and size of purchases of soybeans, corn and sorghum going to a new level in the last month, as it should at this time of the year. In terms of barley, China has reportedly been buying from Argentina after the imposition of exorbitant tariffs on Australian barley imports.

Chinese purchases of US wheat have been less aggressive with elevation capacity limited due to the massive row crop export program. China's appetite for US wheat is also limited as they prefer quality from other origins if competitively priced. This led to a spate of purchases from France in recent months.

However, a much smaller exportable surplus and rising export values in France are expected to turn Beijing's focus to other origins. With a big crop in the making and a substantially increased exportable surplus, Australia should figure prominently in second half 2020 wheat transactions and first half 2021 wheat shipments to China.



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



A True Leader

As the Narembeen Football Club puts another season results would suggest that little credit for effort needs to be delivered. The league struggled to even come close to winning a game while the Ressies won three but missed out on the finals again. We give credit for results don't we, and fair enough too for that breeds competitiveness and one of the reasons so many love footy is because it gives us a chance to be competitive. There are however many reasons why 2020 wasn't a failure for the Narembeen Footy Club and people who deserve credit for the success that was achieved. None though deserve more credit than Mitchell Miolini.

He got his club through the season and he and his club will be the better for it. 2020 wasn't a failure for the Narembeen Footy Club. There are many who deserve credit for that. Mitchell Miolini is at the front of the list.
