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
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



NAREMBEEN - 1836

Well worth going out to have a look at -


In 1836 John Septimus Roe, Surveyor general of the colony, led an expedition eastwards from the new settlement of York in the Avon Valley. J S Roe expedition made note of the native people in the region. He noted near here he passed five huts entirely constructed of sticks bent together and thatched with bush. J S Roe observed also "the almost total absence of watercourses in the land throughout many miles leads one to conjecture that all the rain is absorbed by the land itself". He did not know of course that this area has an average rainfall of only 13 inches, nor that the salt lakes in heavy winters become virtually a river. Located near here is the camping spot No 7 of the surveyor general and on OCTOBER 11 he saw emu tracks and later that day disturbed a family of two large emus and three small ones. This no doubt was the reason he gave the name Emu Hill to this large granite outcropping at 5.30pm that afternoon.

- This is the inscription on a plaque at what we call Roe Lookout but really should be called Emu Hill.

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

EULOGY NANCY HELEN THOMAS

2 October 2020

Good afternoon everyone, thank you for coming today to help celebrate the life of Nancy, Tommy, Aunty Tom, Mum Thomas. The reason all of us are here today is because of our Mums. There may occasionally be some conjecture as to who our Fathers are, but our Mums are non-negotiable.

Mum always enjoyed a laugh. She had a great outlook on life and could always find a little one liner or a dry witted comment to slip in at the end of a conversation, just to make you smile.

A child born in the depression, perhaps that's what made Mum always feel things could be worse. She was an eternal optimist. Born in 1930 to Richard and Jessie (Mort) Cheetham, Nancy spent all her childhood in South Kumminin on a farm with older sister Marj and brothers Bob and Norm. Mum was the youngest.

South Kumminin in those days had a shop, houses, a golf course, cricket oval, tennis courts and a university. Mum went to the University of South Kumminin until she was 13, then continued her secondary school at MLC in Perth. Carol and Julie later followed in Mum's footsteps by attending MLC, but Maxine and I were deemed not worthy to go to a private school – but we're not bitter about that are we Maxine?

South Kumminin must have been a great place for a child to grow up on a farm all within a kilometre of these facilities. Mum was a Cheetham and a country kid so therefore she played sport. She was accomplished at most things she tried – tennis, hockey, bowls and golf. Mum won many bowls, tennis and golf championships, she was a bowls league president and in 1982 became a life member of the Narembeen Hockey Club. She had three great hockey playing daughters and would never miss a game to help look after the grandkids or adopted grandkids while the girls played hockey. One of Mum's biggest regrets was that as her eyesight deteriorated in her 80's, she could no longer watch her beloved Narembeen Hockey Club.

Mum was a very active member of the community, always involved and in particular played an integral role in setting up the Senior Citizens organisation and was still helping out the "oldies" as an 80 year old. We were always very proud of her.

I may have skipped forward a little, so maybe we should go back to when she batted her eyes at Ralphy Hooks Thomas. We think it was around her 18th year, but we are not really sure when she met Hooks. Hooks was a young fella from Perth working north of Narembeen at Cusacks. So will assume that at a dance, as there was one every Saturday, Hooks managed to get his name on Nancy's dance card and there began a lifelong friendship, they were great mates.

They were married in 1951 and purchased a farm just south of Arrowsmith Tennis Club. It was a modest farm house with mud brick walls and dirt floors. In 1952 their first child Carol was born. In 1958 they sold Arrowsmith and purchased 800ha in South Kumminin. They lived on an adjoining property "Cattle Gate" whilst the house was built in South Kumminin. Julie and Maxine joined the family in 1955 and 1958 respectively. In 1960 they moved into the new farm house.

Nance often said with some pride, "Hooks never wanted a snotty nosed little girl with her nappy hanging down and I gave him three of them". In 1965 I rolled up! The family's childhood memories are largely built around the place that Sheree and I still live in today.

Our house and farm always had family around. There were the rellies from Perth, Mum's brothers Bob and Norm lived in adjoining farms, so there were plenty of nephews, nieces, cousins and friend staying on a regular basis. Uncle Bob was unwell for a time and Deli, Feathers, Jen and Mandy were welcome visitors when Bob was in Perth. There was Mrs Owen from up the road dropping in most days, Alan Barrett who worked with us raising a young family and Tommy Miller – all had to be fed and no one went hungry.

Nance was no gourmet chef, she had two spices – pepper and salt. But there was an endless supply of cakes – pumpkin, chocolate, apple pies and biscuits and pikelets, although the chicken giblets in the soup we could have all done without! All coming out of a small wood oven. Always something to eat after a trip home on the bus and perhaps a wooden spoon to lick or a cake dish to clean out, the wooden spoon will be alluded to later!

Mum loved animals, there was always a pet magpie, cockatoo, a sheep called Molly who could only drink out of a hose and lived till she was 104, Molly was the bain of every shearer in the district. There were dogs and cats, but never inside the house. Nance cared for them all with the exception of Hooks's pigs, housed about 1km away who conducted daily covert operations to break into the backyard.

This showcased Nance's bush engineering skills – she could knock up a chook yard, make a cockies cage from an old fridge, repair or build a fence with a pair of pliers, a screw driver and some wire. I remember a raft she made once for me out of two 44 gallon drums, a couple of planks and all of the above.

Our childhood was full as they tend to be on farms, work hard during the week and play sport on the weekends. The one non-negotiable was that every year we had a holiday. The house at north beach was always booked and occasionally if harvest wasn't finished we would head off with Ella & Bert, our grand parents whilst Mum and Dad finished harvest, they would they quickly follow.

Another great love of Mum's was a New Year's Day Party after the New Year's Eve Cabaret supplying food to a good number of the young, hungover population of Narembeen.

Tommy loved the simple things in life. Two of her favourites came in a bucket – yabbies and paddock mushrooms. If us kids were struggling for a birthday present, we often went for a jar of yabbies, the mushies being a bit harder to find lately. Our family has great memories of catching yabbies with a chop on the end of a piece of string.

Anyone who knew Mum would tell you she called a spade a shovel. I don't think I ever heard her use the words chicken manure. She didn't have to tell us that she loved us, as it was a given.

She did have compassion. A memory we have is of Julie, a 9 year old (now Mum and Julie could clash a little) decided that she had been hard done by on one too many occasions and informed Mum she was leaving. As Julie set off up the driveway with her bags, Mum was heard shouting "Hey Jul have you got any clean rammies (undies)?" Mum then watched Jul pop her head out from behind the silo every two minutes to see if anyone was coming to bring her home. Jul must have taken this on board and when a young Damon Hayter informed her he was going to live with Aunty Carol, Jul yelled out "have you got any clean undies?".

Mum taught Maxine quick thinking in the face of adversity, one morning they were heading off in the truck to drop smoko to Hooks who was tailing lambs. Now Hooks's maintenance could be a tad lax and as they go to the end of the driveway they discovered there were no brakes on the truck. They went across the road, through the gutter and into Owen's paddock.

Nance wasn't about to allow the boys to miss smoko and quickly ran 1km down to the house, phoned the local South K store and asked if they could drop some iced vovo's to the boys on the Kondinin Road. There was a mystery however which was a huge bruise on Nance's bum, Hooks solved the mystery a few days later when he came in with a crushed cake tin.

Subtlety wasn't one of Nance's strong points. A young John Currie who at the time was working in Perth, was home one weekend with the task of asking Hooks and Nance for Carol's hand in marriage. It is a great story and I will let Chunder elaborate to anyone who wants to listen later. I will cut to the end of the story, where Chunder armed with some good advice from a mate "Hooks is alright, its Nance you have to worry about" ends up knocking on the door of Nance & Hooks's bedroom late on Sunday night to ask the question. Nance's response was "how quick does this have to happen"? Subtle as a charging rhinoceros!. The answer was of course – we have plenty of time!

A lesson in patience – Mum was a subscriber to corporal punishment. Her views seemed to become stronger later in her child rearing career. Some of this story had to be relayed to me, but I do remember the conclusion. I had climbed a fair way up a tree in order to avoid a wooden spoon, this one didn't have cake mix on it. Tommy was trying to entice me down and I was giving her a mouth full of obscenities, I can only assume had been taught to me by my potty mouth older sisters. Mum eventually walked off and later in the day, feeling hungry and thirsty I ventured down and back to the house. Nance was patiently waiting in ambush and I encountered the spoon again this time covered in soap and wore it across the back of the legs for good measure. I think there is a wooden spoon factory somewhere in Thailand that halved its production when I left to attend boarding school.

Mum was giving, friendly and dependable, she had no airs and graces and was loved by many and would do anything for us. Mum adored her grand kids and great grand kids. She shared many a beer with her loved in laws - Chunder, Jack, Roundy and a sneaky wine or two with Shez.

In closing I would like to thank the staff at the Koolberrin Lodge where Mum was a resident for three years. The friendship and care she was given during her time there was greatly appreciated. Mum's last 3 weeks were spent at Lakeside in the Narembeen Hospital and we would like to thank Dr Peter Lines, Wendy Hooper and the staff for their professionalism and compassion. Mum had said many times how much she missed her great mate Hooks who had died in 2004 and recently had said on occasions "I'm ready to go now". It is comforting to know Mum passed away peacefully last Friday morning on her own terms, thank you Mum, rest in peace.

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

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

Central Wheatbelt farmers get second chance at Federal drought mitigation funding

Local Member Mia Davies MLA has welcomed the Federal Government's decision to double funding to a program helping Central Wheatbelt farmers, pastoralists and horticulturalists mitigate the effects of drought.

Ms Davies said an extra \$50 million for the On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme would allow producers who missed out on rebates to reapply before the onset of summer.

"The initial \$50 million available nationally was quickly exhausted and there were many West Australian agricultural businesses that missed out," she said.

"It was exacerbated when the WA Government processed applications too slowly and the State was forced to hand back \$1.35 million in grant money to the Federal Government.

"The Nationals WA have since written to the Federal Government requesting a top-up of the program and it is encouraging the Commonwealth has responded."

Under the scheme farmers/pastoralists/horticulturalists in the Central Wheatbelt can apply for rebates up to \$25,000 to cover up to 25 per cent of new infrastructure that make on-farm operations more drought resilient.

Livestock producers can use the reimbursement for tanks and troughs, pipes, fittings and pumps associated with water distribution systems, new bores and the desilting of dams by a contractor.

Horticulturists can also apply for rebates for work associated with drilling bores and desilting dams.

Ms Davies said State Government funding options to improve on-farm water security had dried up after Labor killed off the popular Farm and Pastoral Water Rebate schemes two years ago.


"That's why the initial On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme was heavily oversubscribed and so many applicants in WA missed out first time round," she said.

"I urge the Labor Government to respond quickly so as many WA applicants as possible benefit from rebates and we don't repeat having to hand money back to the Feds."
