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
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

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🛮 ALAN – a life well lived read by Daughter Susan Denton

Once upon a time, in the land down under, there lived a handsome young farmer named Alan who labored from dawn to dusk on the family farm southeast of the hamlet of Bruce Rock. One fine day, Alan was enjoying a rare few hours of leisure - hanging with his mates in town, when he saw something that was to change his life.... A lovely young stranger was peddling her bicycle down the street, oblivious to the admiring stares of the young men. As Alan watched Dawn's shapely derrière disappear down the street, he boldly declared to all and sundry -"I'm going to marry that!" - And he did. Fast forward three years... Our loved up newlyweds have journeyed far from family and friends to a small farm in a far corner of the shire of Corrigin. As night falls, Alan turns the loaded semi-trailer into the long driveway unaware that disaster lurks just beyond the gate in the form of a very deep, very muddy puddle - and within moments, the semi is well and truly bogged. And so it came to pass that our intrepid young couple have no choice but to walk the two miles from the gate to the homestead - in the dark. Dawn determinedly clutching the two juice steaks she is planned to cook to celebrate their first night in their new home. They arrive at the house at last and Dawn is confronted with a sight guaranteed to instill fear into any new bride.... an ancient wood stove. But she manages to get the stove lit and before too long the steaks are sizzling in the frying pan... but then...Whoosh! An avalanche of soot falls out of the chimney and smothers the half cooked steaks. It's the final straw. "I want to go home to my mother" sobs Dawn. And that could have been the end of our story but fortunately for us, Alan persuaded her to stay and they settle down to married life. As well as working the existing holding at Corrigin, Alan now tackles the daunting task of clearing a scrub block at Billericay and turning it into arable farm land, for he saw opportunity where others only saw years of hard graft for an uncertain reward. Additional workmen were employed to help with the mammoth task and that increased Dawn's workload exponentially but she took it all in her stride and did what needed to be done with limited resources and an unwavering faith in Alan's vision. I can't remember a time when we weren't joined by two or more workers for meals. One or two stayed with us for so long they became like family while others came and went depending on the season. 9 years pass quickly... The farm at Billericay is finally up and running and a former Doctor's house in Perth is dismantled and relocated to the property to provide a roomy home for their growing family. They name their new home - DALAWN. Farmers have traditionally been innovative and resourceful from necessity, but Alan took innovation to a whole new level on a daily basis by improving, modifying or repurposing almost every piece of equipment or machinery he used. There are several well-known manufacturers of farm machinery that benefited from his unselfish willingness to share his ideas but you'll not find his name associated with any patent because for Alan, it was never about money or accolades. His sole reward was the satisfaction of solving the puzzle the initial problem represented. If you're interested in hearing about some of those innovations, however, Ray has a wealth of stories he is more than happy to share with anyone who'll listen. Growing up we girls weren't really aware of this side of "Our Dad" so it is the more personal stories we remember and enjoy sharing the most. Like the way he would always insist on driving home after a cabaret but would only get a short way down the road before he pulled over and crawled into the back of the station wagon, nestle down in the middle of us kids and promptly drop off to sleep - leaving Mum to drive home. Or how he spent the first two days of our annual holiday in Rockingham recovering from the rigors of harvesting

asleep on the beach. He actually slept so soundly he inevitably woke to find he was buried in the sand up to his neck. Once his energy level returned to normal however, he would happily spend hours romping with us in the ocean. Busy, happy years passed all too quickly. Children grew, married and started families of their own. At last count there are 19 grandchildren and 34 great grandchildren. Dawn eventually convinced Alan to leave the farm and move into town. The family were initially concerned about how he'd cope but our fears proved groundless for he discovered... the Men's Shed. Alan loved nothing more than working quietly on some project or other and having a yarn with anyone who wandered by. He was the ultimate recycler and could make almost anything from a couple of old pallets and a few bolts. Covid-19 hit and he was denied access to his beloved shed. And yes, it's true they may have had to change the locks a time or two to discourage him from sneaking in to finish whatever project he had on the go. His rather unique sense of humor has left many a recipient scratching their heads in bemusement. He took great delight in delivering a totally outrages statement and seeing the baffled expression that inevitably followed. Such as the time he marched into the hardware store and loudly announced that they had sold him a bunch of "geldings". It turns out he had recently purchased some bolts for the shed but they had come without their corresponding nuts - hence the geldings. Those that benefited from Alan's many projects know who they are and don't need cataloging here but it was his final project that possibly held the most significance for him personally, because it represented a connection with our family's pioneering past. And even though others only saw a pile of junk he saw its potential and spent many blissful hours lovingly restoring a piece of local history that would have been lost forever and then detailed its story for all to enjoy in the display you see on the table. Alan Sedgwick was a self-effacing man who spent his entire life working for the betterment of his family and the wider farming community.

We will never see his like again.







AN OPEN LETTER TO THE COMMITTEE OF 'GO NAREMBEEN'

Committee of Go Narembeen

On behalf of the Narembeen DHS school community I would like to thank the committee for their generosity in subsidising the cost of Country Week and Camp for students at our school. In addition, I would like to pass on a couple of anecdotes that add some context to the importance of Country Week to our students and the school community.

In the years that I was involved as the MC of the Year 10 graduation ceremony, I would ask the students for information that I could include when introducing them. Almost without fail, their responses to the question "What is the most significant memory you will take with you of your time at Narembeen DHS?", they would answer "Country Week". It is a noteworthy part of Year 10 and serves as a celebration of their time at school. It cannot be under stated as an important part of the school calendar.

As a school, we have always endeavoured to keep the cost of Country Week and Camp as low as possible. We carry out fundraising activities and contribute significant funds from our school budget. The students take an active role in the fundraising so as to give them some ownership of the activities, and it doesn't just become a hand-out. Keeping the cost of Country Week and Camp to a minimum is important, particularly for those families that may have 2 or 3 students attending. This year, prior to your contribution, we had reduced the cost of Country Week from \$480 to \$190, and camp from \$625 to \$190. After your \$70 per student, the cost for both was \$120.

Whilst attending this year, we heard of a school where the cost of Country Week was upward of \$500, they had done no fundraising, nor had the school contributed any subsidy to reduce the cost. As a result, 14 students were unable to attend. As a school community, we would not let this happen. I can only imagine the split that this could cause within a student body, those who went and those who didn't, those that can speak of the fun time they had, and those who cannot. The COVID-19 situation has impacted on many aspects of our lives, and for some families there has been the additional financial stress added as a result of changes to employment. Your generosity has ensured that the impact of COVID-19 has not taken away the joy of Country Week and Camp. I hope that you get a deal of satisfaction from knowing the positive impact you have had on both our school and the wider community. Thanks again, and kind regards.


