MAINTAINING CONTACT REGISTERS, A REQUIREMENT TO KEEP WA SAFE

From Saturday 5 December particular WA businesses and venues will be required to maintain a mandatory contact register for staff and patrons.

The reintroduction of contact registers is an additional protection measure and will assist with WA Department of Health contact tracing, should it be required.

Businesses or venues required to keep a contact register, include:

- Food and licenced venues (restaurants, cafés, bars, pubs, taverns, nightclubs)
- Gyms, indoor sporting centres and pools
- Places of worship and funeral parlours
- Beauty and personal care services including hairdressers and barbers
- Galleries and museums
- Cinemas, theatres and other entertainment venues
- Auction houses and real estate inspections
- · Community facilities, libraries and halls
- Zoos and amusement parks
- Function centres
- Accommodation facilities that already have check-in arrangements in place (i.e. hostels, hotels, large camp grounds)

Designated businesses and venues will be required to collect the date, name, telephone number and arrival time of all patrons, staff, visitors and contractors that attend the premises, other than to collect takeaway.

The contact register records must be kept for 28 days, and not used for any other purpose.

To assist businesses and venues, the WA Government has developed the free, SafeWA app, an online contact register system that uses QR Codes for patrons and staff to scan to register their attendance.

SafeWA can be downloaded from Apple App Store or Google Play from today. This will allow businesses and venues, which choose to use the SafeWA app, time to implement it for Saturday, 5 December 2020.

The app is being provided as a free, easy, contactless solution, however the use of Safe WA is not mandatory.

Alternative formats for mandatory contact registers are available, including other electronic tools or a paper-based system, depending on what is suitable for the business, venue or individual.

Businesses must still maintain a written contact register for people who choose not to use the app.

Failing to comply with the new requirements to maintain a contact register could result in fines and penalties of up to \$50,000 for an individual and \$250,000 for a body corporate or 12 months' imprisonment.

Any person aged 16 years and over who attends a business, place or premises, listed above, including patrons, staff, volunteers and contractors will be required to register their contact details.

Records are not required to be collected for people collecting takeaway or children under 16 years.

SafeWA can be downloaded from Apple App Store or Google Play Store from Wednesday, November 25, 2020. This will allow businesses and venues, which choose to use the SafeWA app, time to implement it for Saturday, December 5, 2020. More information can be found at https://www.wa.gov.au/SafeWA





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

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A NEW PERSPECTIVE ON LIFE

In the last 6 months through a good friend of mine, I have had the pleasure of meeting a young Iraqi family, currently living in the city while the husband has been studying for his PHD in agriculture, specifically on control of pests and diseases in citrus fruit world wide.

Mr K, as I will call him, has, against all odds (learning English included) achieved his doctorate.

Mr K came here first and once settled, then organised for his wife and two small girls to join him, as it was a 5 year course. Because of their culture Mrs K had to be accompanied by a male when she was out in public, so it was Mr K's brother who drove them through war torn Syria and other mid eastern countries en route to Turkey so as to fly to Australia. A very harrowing journey she has told me.

This family has embraced Australia and have shown a great desire to integrate. It was they who rang my friend to ask whether she was going to an Anzac Service because they wanted to go, not the other way around. On Australia Day they attended an Australia Day picnic with my friend and her family. One of the girls is playing soccer, which is how my friend met this family as her granddaughter was playing. However, this little girl could not become a full member due to lack of finances. As we know, to play sport in the city is very costly, not like our country sports where everything is done voluntary. And a lot of fund raising!!!!!!

I was privy to a lunch hosted by my friend in honour of his achievements. Such proud and grateful faces of this family was a sight to behold. I have also had the chance to taste some of their food, thanks to Mrs K's cooking and it is yummy. I have also visited their home and enjoyed a traditional Iraqi meal, and sitting in the Iraqi way. Although a bit reluctant, I tried some Turkish coffee in a tiny cup, very nice even though I am not a black coffee drinker.

They now have four beautiful children, little Aussies now, two have adjusted to schooling, while learning to speak English. They have nothing but praise for the teachers at their school. The two younger children were born here so of course their English is very good, the youngest, who is two has certainly learnt "No, don't and mine" in very clear English.

Last school holidays my friend brought this family to Narembeen as Mr K wanted to see a working farm in Western Australia. They stopped at the caravan park in one of the cottages and loved it. On arrival at the farm, Mrs K said to my friend that she was astonished that we lived in a "house", expecting to see us in a tent or similar as is the case for farmers in Iraq. Of course Ross was in his element showing them around the farm. We ventured out to Hidden Hollow where the children just ran everywhere. Mr K stood at the top of Mt Walker Rock and just gazed at the vista and said it was awesome. On return to the city, he said to my friend that the visit to the wheatbelt and Narembeen has been the **highlight** of his time in Western Australia . They loved Narembeen and the friendship of the few people they met, ie Roadhouse staff.

Sadly, they have to return to Iraq. Mr K has just returned and all is still up in the air as to when Mrs K and children have to return, due to the cost of flying them back as a result of Covid 19. They are so uncertain of the date they will all be reunited again.

However, Mrs K has addressed the issues facing her while on her own. They have managed to find a rental home close to schools, bus stops and shops. Mrs K is taking English lessons, and getting involved in the community where she lives. The children are still being taught Arabic which is necessary for when they return to Iraq.

Naturally, they will be very sad to leave Western Australia but will return to Iraq with fond memories of our country.

Their culture is so different to ours, some of which I will never understand, but they accept it.

On meeting this family and getting an insight in to what they have endured, as they were under ISIS rule for a time, has made me so grateful for the way we live here in Australia. Our freedom is something to treasure.

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

Grain Brokers Australia Weekly Market Report

December 1, 2020

China's voracious appetite for grain yet to be satisfied...

Customs data released last week reveals that China's insatiable demand for grain continued unabated in October. This was led primarily by demand from the country's rapidly rebounding pork sector, which was decimated by African swine fever in late 2018 and through 2019.

China imported a staggering 1.14 million metric tonne (MMT) of corn in the first month of the fourth quarter, the second-highest level on record. This was quite a dramatic increase from next to nothing in October last year and was the third consecutive month above the one million tonne level.

It pushes the country's total corn imports for 2020 to an impressive 7.82MMT, almost double the previous year, and there is still two months to go. That also takes China's corn imports for the year past the official tariff rate quota (TRQ) of 7.2MMT for the first time, which was one of the requirements under the Phase 1 trade deal with the United States.

The global corn market is searching for a price that rations demand, particularly in the second and third quarters of 2021. For the rest of this year and the first quarter of 2021, the US is the place to shop. But the South American drought and resultant corn crop issues are certainly a genuine and growing concern for the corn balance sheet.

And now there is talk in the market that the Chinese demand is more than a short-term supply issue, but rather a longer-term structural change in domestic consumption. Some analysts are forecasting Chinese imports of US corn will hit the top end of market expectations next year and will exceed 50MMT by 2023. Only time will tell on that matter, but while the pig herd is rebuilding and domestic reserves remain tight, the demand is likely to continue.

Imports of soybeans into the Middle Kingdom for October totalled 8.69MMT, up a stunning 41 per cent on the same period last year. Imports from the US were 3.4MMT, almost triple the 1.147MMT a year ago and up from 1.17MMT in September.

Chinese customs also cleared 4.233MMT of Brazilian soybeans in October, an 11.6 per cent increase from 3.793MMT in the corresponding period last year. But that figure was down from 7.25MMT in September as the soybean export season in Brazil winds down and the US starts to dominate fourth-quarter trade.

The world is not rationing global soybean demand on a large scale just yet, in particular from China. And like corn, the ultimate fear is a crop failure in South America, the possibility of which is increasing with every day of scorching weather and no beneficial rainfall.

There was vague talk during the week that some Chinese soybean importers and processors are looking to wash out of US cargoes booked for December and January shipment. It was apparently spurred by the recent Chicago futures rally which collapsed Chinese crush margins. That will be a fascinating discussion, especially in light of the US trade deal commitments and Beijing's desire to 'keep the peace' throughout the Presidential transition.

China imported 630,000 metric tonne of wheat in October, up 126.9 per cent from the year prior. They have now imported 6.69mmt of wheat in 2020 against a TRQ of 9.36MMT. With two months of the calendar year left to report it is possible, but highly unlikely, that they will breach that mark for the first time by year's end.

Beijing sold 708,000 metric tonne of wheat from their strategic reserves in last week's auction, less than 18 per cent of the 4MMT offered. Total sales now stand at 13.5MMT since the program began in June. Prices were slightly higher than the previous week, but the clearance rate has declined from more than 70 per cent in October, suggesting that Chinese consumers are gaining comfort with the domestic grain supply outlook.

October barley imports came in at 5.98MMT, a jump of 13.4 per cent on the October 2019 number. Much of this barley came from France, which is posing challenges for European Union feed manufacturers. And as long as the Chinese tariff remains in place on Australian barley, it is highly likely that the Chinese consumers will continue to turn to France, especially to meet their malting barley requirements.

French barley yields disappointed last harvest and the farmers have reportedly reacted by reducing the planted area in the recent seeding campaign. They evidently didn't read the tea leaves very well, as ongoing Chinese demand could be a game changer for the wheat-barley price relationship in the EU. This would have significant consequences for stockfeed producers, and ultimately, planting decisions by farmers right across Europe in coming years.

The recovery of China's pig herd has been a fundamental driver of the country's feed grain demand this year. According to the agriculture ministry, the nation's pig herd grew by an impressive 26.9 per cent in October. However, the resurgence in pork output is likely to take much longer as the quality of the nation's herd is poor and a higher than usual proportion of offspring go back into the breeding program.

This was certainly borne out in the October customs data with pork imports jumping 80.4 per cent to 330,000 metric tonne, compared to a year earlier. In the January to October period China has imported 3.62MMT of pork products, a 126.2 per cent leap from the same period in 2019. The scramble for protein also pushed beef imports up 12.2 per cent from a year ago to 170,000 metric tonne in October. That took 2020 beef shipments to 1.74MMT.

There seems little doubt that the short-term demand from China for grain production from almost all corners of the globe will continue into the foreseeable future and will dominate grain market dynamics well into 2021. How that plays out in the long-term is the key question, but there appears to be a growing bias toward more, as opposed to less.

Australia's participation in that fundamental change relies heavily on the cooling of tensions and a diplomatic reengagement from both parties to better recognize the differences and ultimately resolve the growing trade impasse.


