Bowl the wide .....

As society continues to roll towards a desire to make sure no one is ever upset we are moving dangerously away from developing the kind of people that make the world go round. Last Saturday night the Perth Scorchers got a hiding from the Sydney Sixers. The contest fizzled out into a contest between the bowlers form Perth and Sydney's import James Vince. Vince was powering towards a maiden Big Bash century and the bowlers were doing their best to stop him. In the end he needed two off the last ball and didn't get it because AJ Tye bowled a wide.

The look that James Vince threw straight at AJ Tye at the end of the Big Bash Qualifier the other night seemed to be on contrast to the comments he made to the media later on. Jason Roy deserves credit for making it to Vince quick enough to seemingly turn him around and make sure he shook some hands. Time allows us all to calm down and it was good to see that outwardly at least Vince has done. If we were all honest though, many cricketers would have done the same thing that AJ Tye did.

Obviously, that should be done with character and class but there are better ways to show these important traits rather than handing an opponent some success on a platter. It's important we don't forget that.

Why Ladmire Margaret Court......

I have always had an interest and an admiration for athletes. I marvel at the ability of people to prepare for something that can't be guaranteed and then throw their all into trying to achieve their goal. I don't know a lot about tennis but Margaret Court is considered by many as the greatest female tennis player to ever have played the game. I admire that. That can't have been an easy mantle to reach, especially in the time in which she played.

I am not an overtly religious person. When I left boarding school I figured that because I had gone to church three times a week for five years I was in credit for about seventy years. I have nothing against people who are devoutly religious though and indeed try my best to respect their beliefs. While religion has made a lot of mistakes one of the great things that churches do is go out of their way to help those who need it. I admire that.

My understanding is that the church at which Margaret Court is heavily involved in does an enormous amount of work in this kind of area. There is talk of massive amounts of food and assistance being given out at least every week to people who so desperately need it throughout Perth. So many people, me included, walk around the problems of the homeless or the struggling while we try and make the most of our own lives for ourselves. Margaret Court doesn't do that and I admire that.

I voted for the legalising of same sex marriage in the plebiscite that we all had the option to vote in a couple of years ago. I have no issue with homosexuality and strongly believe that people should not be judged on who they might love or be attracted to. Margaret Court obviously has a differing view to me and that's fine, she entitled to her own views.



Margaret Court fully deserves the latest accolade that is coming her way in the upcoming Australia Day. She deserves the award because of the trailblazing athlete she was and for the community minded person she has become. While I understand and respect the debate suggesting she doesn't deserve such recognition, that debate is flawed. It's flawed for the simple reason is we can't be a society that starts to suggest that people aren't entitled to their opinions. We need to be a place that judge's people on what they do, not what they say.

One of the great strengths of Australia is surely the fact that we are so multicultural. Not only that but Australia is a wonderfully safe place to live. Part of that safety is surely the way that people are entitled to their opinions. Free speech is a driver for a democratic society and under that premise we are all entitled to our opinions. Once we start publicly denouncing people simply for their opinions then we are building a society that isn't multicultural and will become more and more dangerous.

I admire Margaret Court. She has achieved some wonderful things in her life and also helped a lot of people with a lot of challenges. I admire people who do that. I don't agree with her opinions on homosexuality and indeed hold opinions that are the exact opposite. That's ok though because we live in a country where people are allowed to voice their opinions and hold on to their beliefs without fear of retributions. Don't we?

#### COVID 19 PANDEMIC – WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Effective from 6pm Sunday 31 January 2021 until 6pm Friday 5 February, the Perth metropolitan area and the Peel and South West regions will enter a 5-day lock down, based on health advice.

#### Travel Restrictions During Lock Down

- People should not leave Perth, Peel or the South West during this period.
- People can enter Perth, Peel or the South West only to access or deliver essential health and emergency services and other essential requirements.
- Non-residents currently in Perth, Peel and the South West are required to remain until the end of the
  restriction period however if you must leave for serious reasons you are to then return home
  immediately, stay home and get tested if symptoms develop.
- Travel remains prohibited within remote Aboriginal communities.

#### Masks

Wearing a face mask outside the home is mandatory for the Perth, Peel and South West regions.

Wearing a face mask is also mandatory in WA while at an airport, travelling on aircraft, or transporting a person subject to a quarantine direction.

#### **Mandatory Contact Registers**

From 6am on Tuesday 2 February, contact registers will be a mandatory requirement for specified businesses and premises across WA.

The following businesses are required to keep a contact register:

- retail venues (supermarkets, shopping centres, pharmacies, hardware and department stores)
- retail components of other business where customers are physically present (bank branches, post offices and customer facing showrooms)
- commercial buses or vessels that can carry 12 or more people where different groups of people interact (party buses, wine and food tour buses, hop on/hop off tour buses, sightseeing tours, party/ function boats, sightseeing/tour boats, private charter buses/boats)
- takeaway food and beverage services
- venues with a COVID Event Plan (500 patrons or more)
- certain outdoor events under 500 people (weddings, corporate functions, fetes and festivals)
- public and private hospitals (persons visiting patients, attending meetings/lectures, couriers, and contractors)

# from the CHIEF

A contact register is a record of anyone over 16 years of age (including staff, customers, contractors and volunteers) who attends a specified business or venue in WA. It must record the following information:

- Name
- Phone number
- Location
- Date
- Arrival time

Contact registration is not required for children under 16 years. However, adults that accompany children under 16 are encouraged to register their details.

The information will only be used for the purpose of COVID-19 contact tracing by the Department of Health WA, and records will be destroyed after 28 days. Their purpose is to allow health officials to quickly identify and assist anyone that may have been exposed to COVID-19.

The business owner or operator is responsible for keeping a contact register of all visitors, stored in a secure and confidential location, from where it can be retrieved quickly if requested by an authorised person.

Penalties for failing to keep a contact register, may apply to individuals and businesses that fail to comply. Businesses may refuse service to any visitor who refuses to register their contact details.

#### 2021 CENSUS - 2,665 FIELD MANAGER ROLES AVAILABLE NATIONWIDE

The next Census will be held on Tuesday 10 August 2021. A key part of the 2021 Census is the engagement of a large temporary workforce of around 38,000 temporary staff. Our Census temporary workforce plays a vital role, ensuring everyone can access and complete the Census, including in remote areas and population groups who may need special support or assistance. Census staff also help remind those who missed Census deadlines, so that everyone is counted.

The ABS will recruit to fill 2,665 Field Manager roles nationwide. Each Census Field Manager will train, lead and manage a team of Field Officers in their local area of responsibility, and will play a key role in supporting and motivating their team.

Census Field Manager roles are short-term and will be recruited locally to ensure they are familiar with the local area, where it is possible to do so. Applications open on 1 February 2021, and applicants are encouraged to apply early as jobs are expected to fill quickly.

# The Leeuwin Voyage — Ocean Adventure

### 'An adventure of a Lifetime'

On January 7, 2021 I was set to head on an adventure of a lifetime on the STS Leeuwin II. The STS Leeuwin II is Australia's largest sail-training tall ship launched in 1986. It is 55 meters long and 33 meters tall and has 16 sails.

A few weeks leading up to the day where I was set to sail to Busselton, I was quite nervous and did not know what to expect. The day was finally here, and I headed to Fremantle to board the ship. At the beginning of the voyage, we were put into watches with two watch leaders, I was in Red Watch. The first day consisted of getting to know everyone in our watch and a bit of training on how the ship works. The winds weren't really in our favor that day, so in the afternoon we motored off the dock and anchored for the night.

Every day was a different day, we learnt so much on all the sails, lines and how to take the helm. Each night we had a designated watch times where we would be up on deck on bow lookout, the helm and setting sails as the wind changed. Although I am not much of a morning person my favorite watch was 4am-8am and watching the gorgeous sunrise over Bunker Bay. Due to the winds blowing in the wrong direction and the calm weather we were ahead of time, so we had what was called a "Shore Day"

got on the Dory's and headed to Bunker Bay for the day, the weather was just perfect!

As the day's went by, I conquered my fear of heights, climbing aloft to set and furl sails and climbing the main mast which is 33 meters high! I was stepping out of my comfort zone and gaining so much confidence and creating lifelong friendships!

The final day had arrived, this was known as "Hand Over Day", yes you guessed it, the 20 crew members stepped back and let us 40 trainees sail to Busselton. It was a hard long day, the wind was constantly changing, but not once did we give up and we did it! We arrived at our destination and anchored just off the jetty for the night. It was the final night of the best food I ever did taste! I was certainly going to miss three cooked meals a day, afternoon tea and dessert!

I was greeted in Busselton by a crew of Narembeen people, thank you Holly, Tim, Sari, Jack, Charlie, Bianca, Lucy, Amelia, Kellie and Ian it meant a lot.

To say it was an adventure of a lifetime is an understatement! If you have ever thought about sending your children on this voyage, please do you won't regret it, not even the sea legs!

The Sunsmart raffle winners were: Maz Beechey, Charlie Cusack and Rhienna Parsons. Congratulations! Please collect your price from the CRC.





#### February is Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

During February's Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month Cancer Council WA's Wheatbelt Regional Education Officer, Melissa Pickering is urging women in the Wheatbelt region to remain ever vigilant, as ovarian cancer symptoms were vague and women often think they are caused by other conditions and may ignore them.

Ms Pickering said that women should pay attention to any symptoms that are unusual for you, new, persistent or troublesome.

"If you have any of the symptoms and they happen on most days for three weeks or more, particularly if you're over 50 or have a strong family history of breast or ovarian cancer, go to your doctor and get a check-up," she said.

"You won't be wasting the doctor's time, and in most cases it won't be anything to worry about, but if it is cancer and you find it early, your chances of successfully treating it are much greater."

Because it's difficult to detect in its early stages, there are more deaths from ovarian cancer in Australia than any other gynaecological cancer.

In 2017, there were 115 reported new cases of ovarian cancer and 94 deaths due to an ovarian cancer diagnosis. Ovarian cancer is most common in women over the age of 50.

Symptoms can include, swollen lower tummy (abdomen) or bloating, feeling full quickly, pain in the tummy, needing to wee more often than usual, harder poo, loss of appetite, indigestion or nausea.

"More research is required to better understand the causes of ovarian cancer, but there are steps we can all take to reduce our overall risk of cancer, including quitting smoking, being SunSmart, maintaining a healthy body weight, being active, eating plenty of fruit and vegetables, and if you drink alcohol, reducing how much you drink to reduce your cancer risk," she said.


