



On Saturday 12th June 2021 past and present netballers, councillors and freeman gathered at the Narembeen Netball Courts to officially name the courts after former councillor Mrs MJ (Joan) McCutcheon and her contribution to the Narembeen Community.

Joan McCutcheon was elected to the Shire of Narembeen Council in 1984 and served 12 years until 1996, during these years Joan represented her community and helped to shape Narembeen. Joan McCutcheon was the first female Councillor elected to the Shire of Narembeen and Council would like to acknowledge this achievement.

Narembeen Netball Club President Brit Duncan responded with a brief description of Joans involvement in the Narembeen Netball Club, Narembeen Junior Netball Association & Corrigin & Districts Netball Association.

"Welcome to the McCutcheon family, Shire President Rhonda Cole, Past & Present councillors, CDNA & Narembeen Netball Club Life Members, Patronesses, Past & Present Members.

To say that Joan was a driving force behind country netball would be an understatement, she began with the establishment of the Narembeen Junior Netball Club in 1970 along with the Junior Association. This in itself was a huge accomplishment, Narembeen kids weren't getting to play the game and so what did Joan do, start up a club and form an association, that's the type of woman Joan was. So off she went dragging any kids along to surrounding towns to get them on the court.

Her coaching continued well into the 80's with both juniors and seniors being taught the skills and passion for the game. That passion for the game extended into the passion Joan had for the club. She believed no job was too small or too big, whether it was picking up a whistle or being part of the grading committee which she was throughout the 80's and early 90's or simply cheering on from the sideline Joan did it and boy was she good at it!

Narembeen Netball Club awarded Joan with the highest honour of life membership in 1981 this was of course followed by a life membership with Corrigin & Districts Netball Association and finally to round out the hat trick a life membership for Narembeen Junior Netball Association was awarded in 1993, not a bad effort really! Safe to say the success on and off the court for the Narembeen Netball Club began with Joan. It did not lie solely within the match score but lay within what it meant to be a part of a team and a club. To support, encourage, participate and of course have a bloody good time doing it! This is a legacy that Joan has passed down and instilled within our club and one we will endeavour to continue for generations to come.

We are very honoured to step foot and play on the Joan McCutcheon Courts."

"Mrs Rhonda Cole, President Shire of Narembeen, councillors, and netballers past and present. While Joan McCutcheon was alive, she needed no-one to speak for her, she was assertive and confident in her opinions on most matters, as all who knew her can no doubt attest to! Therefore, speaking on her behalf does not come easily. However, today I do speak on behalf of her family, and present today is my brother Andrew, sister Lex, my kid and Mum's granddaughter Kaidee, and her kid and Mum's Great Granddaughter Alex. We would like to thank the Shire of Narembeen for, on this day, one day past what would have been her 92nd birthday, acknowledging Mum as the first female on council, a commitment she dedicated 12 years to, and honouring her by the naming of theses courts the 'Joan McCutcheon Courts'. By doing this, you have coupled two of her most passionate pastimes over her years in Narembeen, her work as a councillor and her netball. She will always be remembered for working hard for her town and its people, whether through shire duties, JP responsibilities, her many years of service on the hospital board, her efforts at the Fencepost, her coaching roles for netty and swimming and of course how could we forget the years of yelling at us from the sidelines, never happy, even if we were up by 20! A hard lady to please, but she set the standard and we have continued to have outstanding success as a club.

She is remembered as an intelligent, tough, outspoken and hard-working community member, and I am sure I am not alone in believing that this honour is thoroughly deserved. So to our Shire, I thank you once again. To all of you who are here for the netball reunion, enjoy the final game, spend time catching up with friends and we look forward to a night of celebrations."

Brayden McCubbing held another coaching clinic on Sunday morning. Thanks to Brayden for coming up.


Not many braved the elements but were given very good tips.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Well we are in the penultimate week of Term 2, week ten of an eleven-week term and I would hazard a guess that the students and staff are tired and about to hit the wall. At least our cross country athletes are able to have a break from their ongoing training, and testing should be over for our high school students by the end of this week. Last week was a big one for the school and one day took many hours of work to prepare for, so we can relax and enjoy the last couple of weeks ...

PUBLIC SCHOOL REVIEW 2021

Many thanks to all who were involved last Wednesday in our Public School Review. This is the first of this type of review we have had, as our previous ones were Independent Public School Reviews. All schools now have the same reviews. Most of the work was done prior to the day, with staff and myself working through our Business Plan and documenting reports as well as collating other evidence of our progress in the six domains the review is based on:

- ✓ Relationships and partnerships
- ✓ Learning Environment
- ✓ Leadership
- ✓ Use of Resources
- ✓ Teaching Quality
- ✓ Student Achievement and Progress

Our evidence, including our Business and Strategic Plan, achievement data, targets, reports on progress in all focus areas in the plans and other self -assessment strategies, was uploaded onto the Electronic Schools Assessment Tool (ESAT) one week prior to the visit. The reviewers, a Director of Public School Review, Vicki McKeown and a Principal of a like school, in our case Bernard Beattie, Principal of Boyup Brook DHS, then had a week to examine the evidence and then come to the school to verify that what we put on the ESAT, was actually happening in the school. Meetings, without the admin of Russ, Lynda and myself, took place between the reviewers and our staff focus group teams, parents, community members, Board and students. Amanda our MCS, Russ and myself met with them to go through our use of both human resources and the management of our One Line Budget. At the end of the day, the admin then met the reviewers and were given feedback. We were very pleased with the excellent feedback, with a couple of recommendations that we received. This result is thanks to the outstanding work of our staff, and the great job we, the school community and the wider community of Narembeen, are doing with our students, with the setting and demanding of high standards across all areas of their development.

We could not have implemented all of the strategies we have over many years, if you did not support us. We demand that our students are engaged in all sporting activities, wear only one uniform, maintain satisfactory attendance, complete set homework tasks and show respect, resilience and a high level of behaviour at all times, and to do this we needed a great partnership with our parents and wider community. So thanks to all of you for this support.

To the admin, teaching staff and education assistants, who have had a couple of months of stress leading up to the review, thank you not only for your efforts this term, but at all times, to ensure our students are engaged in learning and improving. You are a team of professionals and you

impressed with your excellence last Wednesday. Cheers to our ECE team for giving the computer room a new look as part of your learning environment upgrade. Thank you also to Amanda Hall, who is an outstanding MCS, ensuring that we had no problems breezing through the use of resources domain. To Joey Slade for ensuring that the reviewers had sustenance and water and for ensuring that the office and staff room were looking great, thank you. Finally, huge thanks to Sandra, Sharon, Laurinda, Sapphire and Maria for their work around the school to make it look its very best for the special day. Our school is always clean and our gardens awesome, but you put in that bit extra to support us, so thank you.

Lastly, on a personal note, huge thanks to Amanda, Joey and Ash for putting up with the ongoing pressure of having to work with me whilst I was under stress \otimes . Not an easy task! Ditto to Russ and Lynda, and then to poor old Russ who had to put up with me at home as well. I believe that we are all relaxed again and I know now, that I will only have to go through this one more time in my role as a Principal, as we will not have a review again for five years \odot .


