EULOGY - IRENE EDWARDS

23 November 1937 to 29 July 2021

Our Mum was an amazing person. She was hard working, big hearted, funny, kind, generous, opinionated – yes she spoke her mind and stood up for what she believed in. She was often loud and the life of the party. She was a great organiser who was dedicated to the community, a supportive Auntie and matriarch of the extended Menegola family, but she always had time to be our Mum.

She set a great example to us and many others – work hard and take care of your family and your community.

Mum was many things to many people and I found it hard to condense Mum's life into a few pages so these are just some highlights.

IRENE EDWARDS was born on 23 November 1937 to Giacomo and Pierina Menegola on the farm at Mt Walker, east of Narembeen. Mum had 8 brothers and a sister – Robbie, Arnold, Clemmy, Jimmy, Clarry, Mary, John, Vally and Ross. She worked very hard on the farm in the kitchen, wash house, cleaning, feeding animals, looking after younger siblings, and many other jobs. Just imagine the dishes 12 people created for every meal!

Mum went to the Mt Walker school which was close to their farm. She really enjoyed school and often spoke fondly of her school days. Mum was a very good student, especially in maths, and was also very good at all sports. She wanted to be a teacher but help was needed at home and around the farm so she left school, as many did in those days, at 14. Mum didn't get to leave the farm too often but she happily recalled a trip to Perth when she was a bridesmaid for her cousin Kathy and they went shopping for dresses.

Sometimes she went to football to watch her brothers, and after one match in 1959, Mum met Dad – Paddy Edwards – a Victorian who had ventured to the West and recently started shearing around Narembeen. They courted for a few years, between his shearing trips north and south, and were married in July 1962.

They went share farming at Westonia for a few years, during which time Tania was born in 1963 and me in 1964. After returning to Narembeen, living on local farms while Dad was shearing, Deborah came along in 1966. In January 1969 we moved to town, to the house in Thomas Street, and Tracey was born a few weeks later. Then yet another girl, Felicity, came along in 1972.

As you can imagine, our house was a noisy, busy place and we also had visitors coming regularly, and even cousins and friends moving in for short and sometimes long stays. Mum took it all in her stride, and welcomed and fed everyone.

Food and cooking were a big passion for Mum; she was a great cook and we ate very well. Mum started catering with some friends - she had a ready made team of kitchen hands and waitresses right at home. We did weddings, football dinners and other events; they were hard work but always lots of fun. Mum was well known for her sponge cakes, jelly cakes and lasagne. She also arranged many catering fundraisers and cake stalls for the school and other organisations, and was the main organiser of Cova and Menegola family reunions. Mum loved food and her very favourite food in later years was icecream drumsticks!

Another amazing skill Mum had was sewing. She made most of our clothes growing up, wedding and bridesmaids dresses, curtains, and when she got her overlocker nothing could stop her – she was up all night sewing tracksuits for half the town!

Mum started working at the Narembeen Shire in July 1978. She worked hard and her gardens were a credit to her, with beautiful displays of flowers and neat gardens beds all around town. Many Narembeen people would remember seeing her turning taps on or off, and her butt in the air weeding, planting or fixing retic. In 2008 the Shire celebrated Mum's 30 years of service and then she retired later that year at 71. Mum, however, wasn't quite ready to stop work altogether and continued to take care of several gardens in town for a few more years, and tended her own garden which always looked fantastic.

Sport played a very big part in our lives and Mum was always there supporting all of us and driving us for miles on weekends to netball, hockey, softball and swimming carnivals all around the state but also being a major part of the sporting committees too. Mum played softball and could really clout the ball, and for many years Mum played darts with great success.

Mum loved her five girls and when they married, her sons-in-law gave her much delight. In 1985 the first of the grandchildren arrived and 10 more followed - Jenna, Amy, Brandon, Jarrad, Kahlan, Riley, Brittany, Madison, Abbey, Siena and Levi. Christmas and birthday get togethers were chaos but fun. Mum absolutely loved all her grandchildren and really enjoyed watching them play sport, and celebrate their birthdays and achievements.

Mum was a devoted member of the Narembeen community right from when we moved to town until in her 70s. Mum seemed to be always at meetings, busy bees, cake stalls or catering, and other fundraisers. She also cared about people in the community - if someone was sick, bereaved or needed help, Mum was one of the first to visit with a meal or offering support.

Mum received many honours for her community service including Narembeen Citizen of the Year, Sports Administrator of the Year, and Life Memberships of the Junior Netball Club, Softball Club and the Darts Association. In June 2004 she was awarded the Order of Australia for services to the Narembeen Community. When we were gathering the information we were amazed at the level of her commitment. Mum held many committee positions and these are just a few major ones:

- Mum was the first female President of the P & C and an active member for 18 years and; President of the School Fundraising and Catering Committee for 13 years;
- Junior Netball President for 15 consecutive years;
- Swimming, Darts and Softball Clubs;
- Tidy Town Committee;
- Golden Grain Ladies Auxiliary;
- she started the Tee-Ball Club with Tania and some friends;
- and somehow she found time to be Brown Owl for nearly 20 years.

It was a super proud day for our family when we went to Government House and Mum received her Medal from the Governor.

Mum travelled a bit – to Tasmania, on the Ghan, and the wonderful trip to Italy with Dad, Felicity and I in 1993. But home was her happy place.

Mum was thrilled when Jenna and Dan were married – it was an exciting day for the whole family but there was also the prospect of great grandchildren! And in the last four years gorgeous Caley and Kaitlyn brought immense joy to Mum, through visits and regular videos. Mum's face transformed when she saw those little girls. We saw it first hand at Christmas last year – a very special Christmas we will treasure forever.

After Dad passed away in 2006, Mum kept busy and healthy, visiting family and continuing to be part of the community. But in 2015 we noticed that Mum was having a few short term memory problems and we received a diagnosis no family wants hear – Alzheimer's Disease. But it was early stages so we started to plan for her future care.

Mum had nursed her mother-in-law, Dad and then Uncle Clarry, so it was time we cared for Mum. She always said "I'm not going into one of those homes", so with Kerryine Cowan's support – thanks Kerryine for all the special assistance and advice you gave us over the years – we arranged a Home Care Package which gave us flexibility in the years to come.

This brought Avivo and Kelly Williams into our lives. Kelly started slowly with social visits – it was not an easy task to be doing things for Irene was it Kelly? Kelly's personality, thick skin and compassion allowed her to form a great relationship with Mum and to provide the

care and support needed. During COVID lockdown last year, Kelly and others, visited Mum on weekends when none of us could. Kelly, thank you so much - we all appreciate everything you did for Mum.

By increasing the amount of support each year when required, and with the super support of wonderful family and friends, especially Di & Toni Miolini and Viv Baynes, we were able to keep Mum in her own home, which was always her wish.

Eight weeks ago, Mum had a fall and sustained a head injury. We were concerned about another fall, so the family worked as a team to give her the best possible care and to keep her safe. After 10 days Mum wasn't improving so we took her to Narrogin Hospital for a CT scan where Mum received fantastic care and they helped us get Mum admitted to Karinya Aged Hostel in Narrogin for respite. Mum's last 5 weeks were difficult and uncomfortable but there were still some really good moments, generally at meal times! Right up to the end she loved her food and she was sassy, pulling faces and rolling her eyes when it was time for a shower or walk; and we had lots of laughs too. We thought she may recover from the head injury but then her heart started to fail. Mum, you always said she didn't want to go into one of those homes, and you didn't. You had 83 good years and you were tired, and you decided it was time to go, even though we weren't quite ready to let you go.

We express huge thanks to the management and staff at Karinya. Mum was only there 9 days, but the care and compassion given to her and our whole family, at such a difficult time, was wonderful and a huge comfort to us all.

On behalf of the whole family, I wish to thank everyone for the kind messages, condolences, cards and flowers, and for coming today to celebrate Mum's life - a life well lived.

Thank you Mum for all the wonderful memories, the laughs we shared, the advice you always gave, but most of all for loving us all so much. We are going to miss the faces you pulled, the one liners you said (most we can't repeat), the card games and jigsaws, but most of all we will miss spending time with you.

Rest in peace Mamma. We love you and we thank you for being the greatest Mum, Nanna and Great Nan. What a legacy you have left.

COUNCIL WRAP UP - AUGUST 2021

Updates from the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday 17 August 2021.

Review of Speed Zones

Following safety concerns, Council resolved to write to Main Roads to:

- Replace the current 80km/hr speed zone on the Narembeen-Kondinin Road with a 60km/hr zone and introduce a new 80km/hr or 90km/hr zone further south on the Narembeen-Kondinin Road
- Relocate the current unrestricted speed zone north past the intersection of Fricker Road/ Narembeen-Merredin Road
- Change the current 80km/hr speed zone to 60km/hr and introduce a new 80 or 90km/ hr zone on Mt Walker Road

Annual Report – Training Undertaken by Elected Members of the Shire of Narembeen 2020-2021

Council acknowledged the receipt of the Shire of Narembeen Annual Report of Training Undertaken by Elected Members for 2020-2021. This is available on the website.

Construction of Walker Lake Principal Shared Pathway

Federal Government works to solve Ag Workers Grain Harvest Shortage

While WA grain producers continue to watch their abundant crops grow with fingers crossed for a good finish, members of the Morrison Government have initiated a solution to ensure there is going to be a workforce available to harvest those abundant crops.

After having been disappointed not to have received a formal application from the State Government detailing their requirements of any overseas worker quarantine system proposal for WA, despite their claims to the contrary, it was only late last week that the Federal Agriculture Minister David Littleproud did receive those details from the McGowan Government.

Western Australian Morrison Government members, the Hon. Melissa Price, Member for Durack and O'Connor's Rick Wilson welcome the initiative.

"We believe that a workable solution has been proposed by the Morrison Government and we would now urge the McGowan Government to commit the joint resources required to operate the Northern Territory Bladin Village facility as a quarantine hub. As local members, we are very concerned that this issue is urgently resolved to assist WA's broad-acre farmers. We now urge action from the McGowan Government so we can get the visa process moving," Melissa Price said.

"It is vital that the state government works with us to allow hundreds of overseas staff with the skills required to come from the northern hemisphere to help take off this season's grain crops. This opportunity should not be missed by the McGowan Government. There is economic gold sitting in those paddocks for the WA economy right now. We want the state government to understand that and back our hardworking Western Australian farmers," Rick Wilson said.

Industry estimates that the broad-acre regions crops this year could produce a record yield of 20 million tonnes worth more than \$7 billion.

The Morrison Government this week signed an agreement with the McGowan Government to build a 1000 bed quarantine facility committing up to \$400 million, to be completed next year. We now ask that the State Government commit to solving the immediate grain harvest worker shortage with the quarantine solution now being proposed.

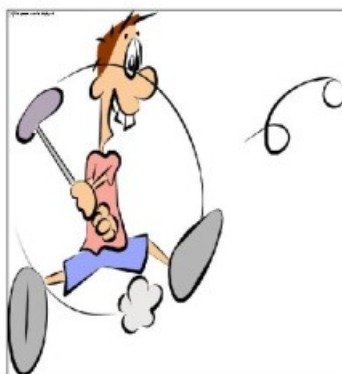

NAREMBEEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY— Part 5

Story taken from 'The Democrat' October 1, 1963 of Sir Charles Latham by Bill Courtney.

THE NINE-YEAR-OLD ORPHAN MIGRANT WHO BECAME A LEGEND WITHIN HIS LIFETIME.

KING COUNTRY

The King country today is probably some of the finest dairy land in the world—where it happens to be flat enough, the rest is great sheep country, and the remainder is straight up and down—and timber.

It also has an incredible rainfall—Charles soon found that the promised 8/- a day wages was really 1/- per hour for an 8 hour day and you only received pay for the hours actually worked.

For the first month young Charles managed to get in 10 days work—which averaged out at less than £4 for the 30 days, no kind of income for a married man.

Then—and this, says Sir Charles, was the turning point of his life—one morning the district engineer asked him if he could swing an awe, and would he like to become the engineer's chairman.

Could a duck swim?

So Charles became a kind orderly, clerk, and personal offsider to the engineer on a straight salary of 8/- a day, rain or shine. And the pay went on seven days a week, because it was part of his job to feed the horses on Sunday.

Soon Charles was part of the engineer's family circle, and evenings were spent reading books from the library, catching up on the missed education.

Then his mother-in-law died and left her daughter the little dairy farm back in Hay, N.S.W.

They returned to Hay, ran the farm for two years, and then sold out for £600.

That was when they came to Western Australia—in 1910. Western Australia was gaining a solid reputation as a land of opportunity for a young man with a few pounds.

He and Louisa applied for a block of land in the new country being opened up, and while they were waiting Charles worked in the Dumleyung country, clearing salmon gum.

Then they got their block—and became the first people to farm the Narambeen country.

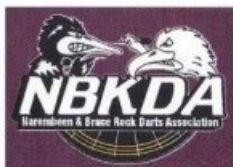

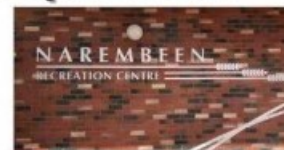

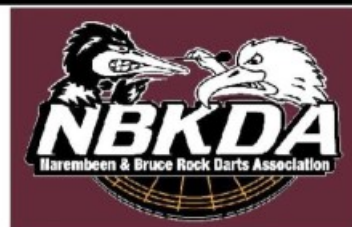
