
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

NAREMBEEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY— Final

Over the next two weeks we will be publishing this story written by Hazel TOOVEY (nee FRENCH).

Hazel is today the person who has lived the longest in Narembeen.

PIONEER FAMILY OF NAREMBEEN.

John Isaac FRENCH Harriett FRENCH (nee FRANCIS)

The depression came and the family all lived in town and Mr FRENCH soon started a local dairy. The family lived side by side all building their own homes of hessian with iron roofs and cement floors. They were located on the northern end of town facing the now Merredin Road and it was known for many years as 'French Town'.

There were 18 grand children living here. The sons and son in laws now took on whatever jobs were available in the depression years such as shire work, wheat lumping, shearing and farm work and later Co-op bulk handling.

Mr John (Jack) FRENCH was a local shearer also went shearing up

north. Mr Herbert (Bert) FRENCH joined CBH after wheat lumping and stayed on to become part of head office staff. Mr Walter FRENCH joined CBH also. Son in laws—Mr Bill COOPER joined the Shire to become foreman for 25 years. Mr Bob HOOD joined CBH. Mr HAYWARD did farm work then moved away north. Son Victor was killed in World War I.

There are still three original members of the family living at this time of writing in June 1981. Mrs Bessie COOPER and Mr Walter FRENCH in Narembeen and Mrs May YOUNG in Perth plus many direct descendants living in the district.


Supermoons and Minimoons

The Moon's orbit around Earth is slightly oval shaped or elliptical. So, every month there's a time when the Moon is at its closest distance to Earth at about 363,300 kilometres away, known as perigee and another time when it is at its furthest distance from Earth at about 405,500 kilometres away and known as apogee.

When perigee coincides with the full Moon, it's popularly called a "Supermoon". And when the full Moon coincides with apogee? Well, it's a "Micromoon" or a "Minimoon"!

When the Moon is at its closest it will appear 17 percent bigger and 30 percent brighter than a Minimoon.

You can spot a Minimoon on the 19th November. Looking to the east, moonrise will occur at 7.06pm and on this night the moon will be furthest away from Earth in its orbit. Check it out to see if you think the Moon looks smaller than normal.

Tea With Venus | 8th-24th November

From the 8th November through to the 24th, Venus is making a complete transit across a familiar asterism, the Teapot! Formally recognised as a part of the constellation of Sagittarius, the teapot is easily identifiable, and even more so as the bright Venus makes its way through the cosmic crockery.

Remember, the teapot is upside down in the Southern Hemisphere. On the 8th, Venus is below the teapot spout and the crescent Moon is right beside the top of the teapot lid. On the 12th and 13th, Venus will appear in the centre of the teapot lid. And by the 19th, Venus marks the top of the teapot's handle.

When to look: Venus moves into the tea pot on the 8th, with a nearby moon, and completes its journey through by the 24th.

Which direction to look: North west



Scorpius | Spring

Can you find Scorpio this Spring? Learning to point out constellations is lots of fun, and one of the easiest to find is Scorpius the Scorpion. It's a lovely, large constellation that really does form the shape of a scorpion!



Scorpius, more commonly referred to as Scorpio, is a large constellation that actually looks like its namesake! Sometimes it's quite difficult to make out the shape of constellations, but you should have some success with Scorpius!

It is visible all through spring during the early evenings. It lies overhead at around 8pm and is a lovely, large constellation.

See if you can find the curve of Scorpio's body and the sting in its tail stretching up to the centre of the sky!

When to look: after 8pm during spring

Which direction to look: Directly overhead. Later in the evening, Scorpio sets in the west.

Something Interesting

See how many stars you can count in the constellation of Scorpio. Try this when you're in different places too. You'll soon see how dark night skies help bring out the stars!

Use your knowledge to become a Citizen Scientist for the Globe at Night! The Globe at Night is an international citizen-science program that's raising awareness of the impact of light pollution.

They are inviting Citizen Scientists to measure and submit their night sky brightness observations. It's easy to get involved. All you need is a computer or smart phone.
