



Country hospitality on show during Wheatbelt bushfires

Bushfires are scary and unpredictable, but when times get tough in regional WA, one thing's guaranteed - country communities will roll up their sleeves to support one another.

When smoke, ash and dust from a nearby bushfire began to blanket the town of Narembeen, teams from the WA Country Health Service (WACHS) made the call to evacuate the residential aged care facility at Narembeen Health Service.

Narembeen staff ensured the facility's ten residents were safely evacuated. Even staff not rostered on that day came in to lend a hand.

Marie Hedley, Acting Health Service Manager for the Narembeen Health Service, praised staff for going above and beyond the call of duty.

"I'm so proud of the incredible team at Narembeen. They kept residents calm and informed every step of the way," Ms Hedley said.

"Staff accompanied the residents to help them comfortably settle into their new accommodation and ensure familiar faces were on hand to provide care."

Residents were evacuated to the Merredin Health Service, with crews from St John Ambulance WA assisting the transfer. Families and next of kin were kept well informed at every point in the process.

Kitchen staff in Merredin had a hearty meal waiting for the new arrivals after their journey. The staff also prepared refreshments for the St John Ambulance WA team before they returned to duty.

Narembeen Health Service resident Effie Wilson said she felt well looked after every step of the way. "The staff did an excellent job and did all that they could to make us comfortable," Ms Wilson said.

Suzanne Taylor, Acting Operations Manager for the Eastern Wheatbelt said the Narembeen residents were warmly welcomed in Merredin.

"When I came in the next morning, they were sitting in the staff dining room enjoying breakfast together," Ms Taylor said.

"By morning teatime, it was a lovely cool day, so they were taken outside into the gazebo for board games and cards. Staff then put on a lovely lunch for them, complete with flowers on the table."



When the fire danger passed, residents were transferred back to Narembeen.

After they had settled back into their usual surroundings, the residents even remarked that they'd like to do it all again, just without the fire next time.

Early Days

By Iris Bristow

From early in the 20th Century, when farmland was allocated in Western Australia, there have been newspapers. In the Eastern Wheatbelt of WA some of these newspapers under various name banners were centred on Merredin.

Local correspondents in smaller towns contributed items. Bill Jarrot who had an agency business in Narembeen, was one of the regular correspondents' in the late 1930's, through to the 1950's. Moya Fardon, wife of the Road Board CEO, Ralph Fardon, carried on his work when he sold his business to Jack Nichols.

Following Moya Fardon, Pat Miller was the regular correspondent until Iris Bristow took over in the late 1960's. Iris was at this time gathering information for a history of the Narembeen district. The editor and printer of the Wheatbelt (Merredin) paper* was Ern Little, a keen history buff. He printed many items of Narembeen history written by Iris Bristow, including reams of information on the week-long 1974 Golden Jubilee Celebrations of the local government in Narembeen.

Wishing to concentrate on the writing of a book on this history, Iris relinquished the role of district correspondent to Kaye Aylemore about 1975. In later years Kaye was the inaugural editor of the Williams local paper. Iris was invited there to give information on how to go about this project. Joan McCutcheon assumed the Narembeen correspondents position.

By this time many country districts were becoming dissatisfied with the space being allocated to their news in the Merredin paper. Some towns, including Bencubbin, Corrigan, Hyden, Bruce Rock and Mukinbudin began putting out local news sheets that were the work of volunteers assisted by their Shire Councils.

Janine Bristow, daughter of Iris, had become editor of the Bencubbin *Gimlet*. Shirley Thorn and Iris went to Bencubbin to ascertain how this was operated.

Back at Narembeen Joan McCutcheon, Shirley Thorn and Iris Bristow were invited by the Shire Council, having responded to approaches made to them, to discuss the production of a local news sheet.

In discussion with the Shire President Bob Cheetham and Shire Clerk Allan Middleton, Shirley was of the opinion that the Shire staff should type and produce the paper as was done in Bruce Rock. Joan and Iris suggested that volunteers would give their services,

leaving only the duplicating process to the Council Staff. The shire representatives suggested that the paper be a monthly-as in Corrigin and Hyden. They thought a weekly would be too demanding on volunteers. The insistence that a weekly *would* be a success was vindicated, of course, in the months and years to follow. Some other country towns had been producing a voluntary weekly paper for years.

The next step was to invite a group of people from various sections of the community to give advice on the establishment rules for the paper. Present at the initial meeting were Ivy Hall, Rita Miller, Brian Federici, Shirley Thorn, Joan McCutcheon, Carol Birch, Ian Forbes, Tess Berry, Peter Bradbrook and Iris Bristow. From this group the executive committee was formed;

The name The Fence Post was suggested by Brian Federici.

The first copy of *The Fence Post* was produced just before Christmas 1978. It was a mad time to commence a new venture, when all were so busy with harvest (there was a harvest that year!) and Christmas preparations and parties-but we were fired with enthusiasm after the official nod from the Civic Fathers, and couldn't wait until the New Year. Sixteen pages were in the first *Fence Post*.

After the first big effort we were glad to relax for six weeks in preparation for the next copy. After that it became fairly routine but never dull.

Joan and Shirley were news scouts and Carol was the only typist, rattling away on a manual machine borrowed from the school. Iris had to make an editorial, set the pages up and make a set of rules for workers and readers alike. There was a problem in finding a suitable cover picture for the first edition. Later there were hundreds of pictures from which to choose, but then Roma Smith came to the rescue with a Christmas scene.

Time has always been our biggest problem-sometimes a half page of copy or even a few lines necessitated an hour or more of research. Writing, editing, setting up advertisements, finding suitable headings, pictures, proof reading and correcting-we always seemed to find that not enough attention was being given as the issue got towards completion.

In those early days there were few people able to type, certainly no fax, email or even a telephone in that first year. It is hard now, to imagine the difficulties of putting a paper together over thirty years ago.

In the first few months it was a three day week for some volunteers. Monday and Tuesday coordinating the news and after being printed at the Shire Office, came the job of assembling the pages and stapling them. Distribution around town and mailing copies even today relies on volunteers.

We used the Shire Council map room for the first few months of operation. It was a bit crowded, even more so when Mary Dixon came to proof read bringing her dog. Alan Middleton the CEO frowned upon this and suggested we use the Old Shire Offices meeting room (now the History Centre). This room was being used for general meetings and we had to put our typewriters and other equipment away each week in a cupboard donated to us by the Shire.

After dropping the typewriter on the floor and losing other equipment, Melvin Bristow, Then Shire President, directed that *The Fence Post* could have sole use of the meeting room. This was a great help and we made it quite comfortable with a small refrigerator and other items. Beryl Draper who came in for a few years to proof read each week, made new curtains for the windows.

For the first five weeks of operation (one copy in December 1978, and four in February 1979), *The Fence Post* was posted out by the Council to all ratepayers free of charge, but in March 1979 a ten cent charge was made to help cover cost of paper-we were using reams by this time to reach all rate payers. Population of the district was about 1200 people.

Total cost of shire labour, paper, stencils, ink, etc. was estimated to be \$6000 for the financial year 1979-1980. Of this amount \$3000 was raised by sale of paper and advertisements which meant the Council was subsidising *The Fence Post* to the tune of \$3000. Raising the cost of the paper to 20 cents per copy in March 1980 went a long way to making the paper self supporting.

In the ensuing 30 years the charges were raised periodically to ensure that The Fence Post.

In December 1996, on completion of the Village Square offices, the Shire Council granted *The Fence Post* their own street-frontage office rent free, in return for printing Shire notices.

The old meeting room was turned into Historical Archives (History Centre), so everyone benefitted.

For the first few months of operation a manual typewriter was used, the copy from which did not always duplicate too very. Probably the highlight of 1979 was the splendid response by readers to an appeal for donations for two new electronic typewriters. Over \$1400 was raised and the duplication process was much improved.

Over 400 copies of *The Fence Post* were being produced in 1980 with more than 100 of these being mail subscriptions. Former residents and relations outside the district have always been keen supporters of *The Fence Post*.

In March 1980 Carol Birch resigned, the demands and affection of a baby replacing that of *The Fence Post*. The office of secretary was taken by Gwenda Pollard and Diane Hunter became treasurer.

It was noted in August 1979 that the addition Gwenda Pollard and Nancy Graham to the committee gave the group greater solidarity. Both Joan and Shirley had other commitments for many weeks, but the production of *The Fence Post* did not suffer.

Gwenda Pollard dealt with the advertising and secretarial work, working nine hours non stop every Tuesday. Her quick, clever work and humorous quips here and there were enjoyed and appreciated.

Sometimes we wondered how we managed before Nance Graham came on the scene. She collated back page fixtures, birthdays, rosters and church notices, was tea maker and general helper for many years and thirty years later is still involved weekly as a distributer to the paper outlets.

The six members of the executive committee met on the first Tuesday of the month to discuss finance, policy changes etc. From an editorial point of view, everything ran smoothly.

In 1980, permission was granted to post under Australia Post Category B, meaning cost of postage reduced from 22 cents to 12 cents at that time.

Another milestone was the acquisition of a telephone. Yes, we are still (08) 647394. Typists were always in demand. Chris Padfield came in regularly every Monday afternoon for sometime and Wendy Keane filled on often at a moments notice if needed.

The committee were relieved of the Wednesday's chores when regular assemblers came in. Peg Clarke was their chief organiser for a long period-a great effort.

In the mid1980's Iris Bristow, who had given two, sometimes three days a week to the production of *The Fence Post* as editor, was set for an overseas holiday and was able to hand the reins to Gwenda Pollard for the next few years.

Incidentally Iris did leave for overseas but broke her leg in Zimbabwe and had to return home. She did go overseas several years later but concentrated on producing her book on Narembeen history *Seedtime and Harvest* (1988).

Joan McCutcheon was also editor for a time, as was Carol Birch.

There was a general change in population and work issues in 1990's to 2000, and volunteer workers were fewer than in previous years. There was no one able to volunteer as editor in a full time capacity so it was decided to have a roster of editors so that no one needed to work more than once a month at most.

The following ladies were rostered editors for a period at least;

Iris Bristow, Gwenda Pollard, Edna Federici, Maxine Miolini, Wendy Keane, Doreen Isles, Helen Fidge, Anita Cowan, Jane Gould, Rose Peczka, Julia Cusworth, Bianca Currie and Kellie Mortimore

The Presidents of the *Fence Post* Committee have mostly held office for many years. Joan McCutcheon was the first, for twenty years. Others to follow include Helen Fidge for years.

Helen has been a tower of strength in many capacities, not only as president but was an excellent editor. Jane Gould...

Special mention must go to Maisey Cusack who was the regular Monday typist for many years and never failed to also provide the Monday morning tea. Her contribution was outstanding

Lydia Bailey dealt with adverts for many years and was always most dependable. She still goes on roster for this work. Irene Walker followed Nancy Graham in dealing with the mailing each week. She assisted for many years. Others who concentrated on mailing were Eleanor Brayshaw and Marj Parsons.

With the advent of email and many of the contributions to the *Fence Post* being made available in 'ready to print' form, the time taken to assemble the paper each week was considerably shortened so it was decided to do the work in one day, Tuesday.

The business of the *Fence Post* has run very smoothly over the years thanks to the acumen of the committee and especially the secretary-treasurer, notably Val Bow and Carol Currie.

Yvonne Treloar has taken on the regular job of collecting unsold copies of the *Fence Post* from the outlets in town who sell the paper in a voluntary capacity. Yvonne also does proofreading as well as counting and receipting cash sales.

Regular workers who have collating duties with back page and similar items have included Nancy Graham, Gwen Fagan, Doreen Bookham and Lil Chapman.

In May 2010, the following notes were included in a *Fence Post* 'members who deserve a heap of praise and rarely seen or heard are Nancy Graham, Mabel Hassett, Pat Latham and Peter Bray. Every Wednesday they sort the *Fence Post* for distribution to various outlets-*Fence Post*'s for mailing are folded, labels wrapped and sticky taped and sorted as per post codes then delivered to the Post Office. Other copies so to distribution points-the Road House, Les Hills' Mail Run, Post Office and Community Resource Centre.'

The Battey Library contacted us after the first few editions of the *Fence Post* were made, informing us we were obliged (by law presumably) to send them a copy of every issue. This we have ever since then-1979. We have also kept an issue for historical and reference use at the History Centre. This has proved a popular and well used reference point over the years.

Thank you to Iris for providing us with this insight into the Fencepost. Many of us were not around in the early days and its interesting to read the number of volunteers that have made the Fencepost successful over the past 43 years.

We encourage you all to think of us when advertising on social media with your news or upcoming events so we can keep the Fencepost going for many years to come.

Kellie, our secretary, is very able and willing to put her hand at anything that needs doing. With the appointment of being made Shire President this year adding to her work load, we at the Historical Society have still enjoyed the efficiency of her task.

The years go by so quickly and assessing what has been done in the last year is difficult to remember but by referring to the minutes I was encouraged to see that so much has happened.

The new Tourist Signage at Billericay has now been completed. Thanks to Rhonda Hickey, Margaret Butler and the Shire Council we were able to complete this task. Rhonda and Margaret also co-opted their families into helping. It is a very informative display.

With the refurbishment of our Road Board Building and the surrounding gardens, the signage had to be re located. This is now up, thanks to Chris Bray and Lou Maringoni. Together with the" Museum Open" sign that is displayed, brings attention to the building for travellers to pop in and visit.

The RSL Museum has been re organised and the display cabinets purchased with funds donated by Dorcas make the exhibitions much more accessible and the items easier to see. Thanks to Kellie who put a lot of work into this and also co-opted her family into moving the heavy items. It is not quite finished yet.

The Shire Council have made funding available to repair/upgrade/almost rebuild, the Old Church. This is going to be a major project and will take some time to complete. The electrical wiring has already been completed and has made a big difference to be able to see the items on display. We are looking forward to its completion.

The Historical Society and Shire Council were in liaison to erect the Information Bay at the old "Apex Park" site. This gives a short history and location of interesting points for those visitors looking for information.

During the year we had representatives from Ro Tourism come and update their website and include the Narembeen Historical buildings on it. This took a lot of co-ordination and many thanks to the people who were the "stars" of the show. Let's hope the website helps to attract many visitors to our town and the museums.

The year 1 class from the school borrowed some of our items for their museum display. The display was well received at the Parent Teacher night. Some of the parents did not know what items were used for or how to use them. The typewriter was a great hit, the flat iron – too heavy to lift - and the telephone – well it was a bit bigger than the mobiles around today.

The Wilson Bakers Bike and the Post Office Cart have had to be re located. They are now on display at the Community Shed Gallery. The Pop-UP shop is a good place for them but the door is not wide enough to allow them to be displayed there.

I attended the RWAHS conference in Kalgoorlie in September. This was very informative and interesting. Kalgoorlie and Boulder have a lot of history and well worth the visit. Helpful ideas on data collection etc. was obtained from the representatives from other towns.

Kellie, Margaret and Rhonda attended a 2-day course in Merredin obtaining information on what and how to store and upkeep the information we have in our museums. The purchase of our new computer, camera and printer will make this job easier in the future.

Filing, filing, filing, there was so much done and still a lot to do. Thanks to the people who come in and do this. It a tedious task but creates a lot of discussion and interest as different articles are duly placed in their files.

New cleaning equipment was purchased to make things easier for our cleaners.

Several people have enjoyed the "Stories" that have been printed in our Fencepost. Some of these have been done as a series and created a lot of interest. Thanks to Kellie who has painstakingly re typed the articles.

Neville Marsh, a descendant of the Savage family, who sold the land where Narembeen now stands, attended two of our meeting and donated a map of the townsite as it was when the Savage family owned it. I caused a lot of interest and much discussion.

We have had a priorities list for some years now and it is great to see that we have dealt with some of those things but there is still a lot to do. Little tasks and big tasks.

Not long now until Narembeen celebrates 100 years of Local Government. 2024 Put on your thinking caps!!

Our membership is growing – even if some of them are getting older – old is good in our society – and we appreciate the valuable input of each and every member.

Let's hope 2022 continues to be a good year and make can make our history important to our future generations.



Country Stargazing

The Magic 'Orion the Hunter' Constellation

Orion the Hunter is a famous summer constellation and it is up in the early evening to see now. First thing in the evening, the brightest star in the sky is Sirius. Directly to the left of Sirius is what is often referred to as the "Saucepan". The "Saucepan" is part of the Orion constellation. It's easy to spot because three bright stars in a fairly straight line make up the base of the saucepan and a handle sticks out at the top right.

Orion the Hunter has been known since ancient times in Greek mythology. His image is upside down in the southern hemisphere! The three bright stars of the base are Orion's belt and the handle is his sword.

When and where to look:

The Orion Constellation will be visible in the early evening throughout the next few months. Look to the east an hour or so after sunset.

Something Interesting:

There's a beautiful object to look for in Orion. The middle star of the handle of the "Saucepan", is not actually a star at all. When looked at through a telescope or powerful binoculars, the beautiful Orion nebula reveals itself.

A nebula is a gaseous region in space where new stars are born. The Orion Nebula is approximately 1,350 light years from Earth and is a massive region of about 30 light years in diameter.

NAREMBEEN MEDICAL CENTRE

Following surgery on his wrist, Dr Peter Lines medical leave has been extended until 1 May 2022.

This unexpected leave may result in temporary closure of the Narembeen Medical Centre.

We understand this may cause some concern, however, please be assured that the Shire of Narembeen is working closely with Dr Lines to ensure the continuity of medical services to our residents.

Recruitment for a locum doctor has commenced and updates will be provided as they become available.

The wellbeing of our community is our highest priority.

BURNING PERMITS

Shire of Narembeen advises that we are now in the **RESTRICTED (PERMIT REQUIRED)** burning period from 1 February 2022 to 15 April 2022.

The following additional requirements for burning are also in place.

• 1st February includes grass and raked cereal stubble and header windrows of non-cereal stubble including canola and legumes.

1st March is header windrows and chaff dumps and cereal stubble fires.

Burning during restricted periods is allowed on Sunday's and Public Holidays with a permit.

PROJECT UPDATES

Thanks to several large grants awarded to the Shire of Narembeen, the past few months has been extra busy with projects happening simultaneously around town. We apologise for any inconvenience due to these works being near your place of work and / or homes and would like to thank those affected for being so patience and understanding. Our endeavours to inform the community are made via Fencepost, Website and our Social Media pages, however, please feel free to call to discuss or request any further information regarding these projects during our office hours.

Apex Park

The Stargazing signage has now been installed and looks great, please take a look and be amazed at what you can see in the night sky. Future Star gazing events will be scheduled during the year with dates still to be confirmed.

Caravan Park

New solar bollards, additional landscaping, and improvements have been made to the camping area allowing more accommodation options in Narembeen. A new entry statement and additional signage will be installed in the coming weeks. This project has been made possible by the Drought Communities Program.

Brown Street and Ada Dual Footpath

Over January and February a dual use footpath has been installed by our local contractor Craig Kennedy. It is almost complete and looks great, this new section of pathway connects to other major pathways in the town, helping to increase mobility and safety in the community. The project has been made possible by West Australian Bike Network (WABN). Additional funding has been provided through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund to construct more footpaths in the coming months.

Churchill Street

Throughout January and February improvements to the safety and aesthetic of the main street has been started with the crossover repaved and the public toilet walkway resurfaced. Additional street furniture has also been installed including extra table and chairs, benches and bins. New Trees guards will replace the existing ones in the coming weeks. This project was made possible with funding through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

Lake Walker Shared Pathway

Works to commence 1st March 2022 and finish early April. Please exercise caution whenever near this 4–6-week construction site. A concrete batching plant will also be setup in the vicinity of the saleyards, so please exercise caution in this area as well.

Town Hall / The Old Church restoration

A contractor has been selected with works due to commence early May 2022

COUNCIL WRAP UP - FEBRUARY 2022

Shire of Narembeen Councillors met 15 February for the 681st Ordinary Council Meeting.

Wadderin Reserve

The Shire received notification from the Department of Water and Environmental regulation that the dam portion of Wadderin Reserve 20022 Avon Location 25286 has been reclassified from "Possibly contaminated – Investigation required" to "remediated for restricted use" effective form 14 December 2021. Reserve 20022 is crown land which is currently vested to the Water Corporation to manage.

Council resolved to request transfer of the management order of the Wadderin Reserve from the Water Corporation to the Shire of Narembeen for the purposes of "water and conservation" with the power to lease.

Staff will now commence lease negotiations with the Wadderin Wildlife Group for the use of the Wadderin reserve in readiness for when the transfer to the Shire takes effect.

Jordan Sprigg Sculpture

A request from Jordan Sprigg was presented to Council for him to borrow the Council's Draft Horse sculpture with the intent of taking the sculpture on a series of promotional roadshows through the southwest of the state.

The Council were delighted to support Jordan's request and consider it good opportunity for Jordan to promote his work and encourage people to visit Narembeen to view Jordans work.

Code of Conduct Employees

A Code of Conduct is a legislative requirement under the Local Government Act 1995 and is to be observed by Council Members, Committee Members, Candidates in a local government election and Employees.

In February 2021, legislative changes were made requiring Council to adopt a revised Code of Conduct applicable to Council Members, Committee Members and Candidates. Until this time, Council adopted a Code of Conduct for Councillors and Employees.

The Local Government Regulations Amendment (Employee Code of Conduct Regulations) 2021 introduced minimum requirements for local government employees in relation to gifts, conflicts of interest and disclosure. In addition, the Employee Code Regulations provide that a local government's code of conduct for employees must contain requirements pertaining to:

behaviour, disclosure of information; the use of information and resources; record keeping; and reporting and managing misconduct.

The Council adopted the Code of Conduct for employees and this is available on the Shire's website.

Mid-Year Budget Review 2021/2022

The Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 (as amended) require local governments to conduct a budget review between 1 January and 31 March each year and report the results of the review to Council.

Council adopted the 2021/2022 budget review at the February Council meeting.

COUNCIL WRAP UP - FEBRUARY 2022

20 years ago—February Council Meeting 2022

- The Avoca Farm Lease was offered to Go Narembeen for three years, this was a big step in Community fundraising for our town.
- Narembeen had its very own book launch of "The Vaultee Vengeance" This book was inspired by a plane crash which took place East of Narembeen in 1944.

In 1944, a Royal Australian Air Force (R.A.A.F.) Vultee Vengeance dive-bomber went missing on a training flight from Pearce near Perth. The aeroplane had apparently become lost and run out of fuel. A few days later a chance conversation between a commercial pilot and Squadron Leader Haber, the Commanding Officer of No. 7 Communications Unit at Pearce, revealed that the former had sighted what he thought was a tent in the bush east of Narembeen. Next morning a Beaufort bomber identified a parachute, but no sign of life and a large number of soldiers from Northam were sent for a ground search.

The pilot Warrant Officer J. Ingram was located at a remote farmhouse some four days after the crash and told his story. On realising that he was nearly out of fuel he had warned the navigator Flight-Sergeant C. L. King to bale out and went through the necessary roll to allow him to do so. He then climbed for height and baled out himself. There being no sign of King, he headed west and found the farmhouse, after fours days, during which he had only a goanna to eat. A huge effort was mounted to try and locate King and the aeroplane.


The wreckage was finally found by a Tigermoth on the 2nd of September in extremely thick and inhospitable scrub. There was no trace of King or his parachute, it was believed that he had been hit by the large tailplane of the Vengeance as he bailed out





CHILD PROTECTION WORKSHOP

It is a sobering reality that in Australia 1 in 4 children will be sexually abused in some way during their childhood and most will never speak about it. In 2019/2020 the Australian Institute of Child Health and Welfare reported 486, 300 child abuse and neglect reports were made to the civil authorities.

The Western Australian Child Protection Society in partnership with the Narembeen Autumn Club are providing this session with an aim to assist teaching staff and organisations to develop child protection and safety practices that can assist in creating child safe environments for children, young people and staff.

This workshop will assist with understanding the causes of child abuse and neglect and to develop appropriate education intervention strategies to assist prevention and empower individual children and young people by using Protective Behaviours or Keeping Safe prevention education.

As such this workshop is a must not only for educators but also for service providers working in children's services, the youth sector, child protection, family services, childcare, relationship services, indigenous services, crime prevention, faith-based services, health and accommodation services.

Using the 10 Child Safe Standards this workshop will equip staff with the knowledge, skills and awareness to keep children and young people safe through education and will assist staff to respond to disclosures and the legal requirements relating to disclosures.
