Narembeen Historical Society Schools over the Years

NAREMBEEN SCHOOL

The history of the Narembeen School flowed from the first school in the district – that of Emu Hill School, which was located on the block of Mr C.G. LATHAM (later Sir Charles LATHAM). The first school is marked today by a cairn and plaque. It is adjacent to Narembeen Shire Council depot on the road leading to the Narembeen School farm and the Emu Hill Cemetery.

The first Emu Hill School opened on February 9, 1914, and continued until September 5, 1919. From that date the building remained closed, and it was not until late in 1922 that thoughts of reopening were discussed. Meanwhile, children from the area were either attending school at Wadderin or at Emu Hill town, where a school also named Emu Hill was opened on April 27, 1920, in the Emu Hill Hall.

Mr LONGHURST advised the Education Department that settlers were willing to remove the vacant building to a block reserved for the purpose in Churchill Street, Narembeen.

It was the block now occupied by Moppett's garage. The east block, next to it (Nichol's Machinery, then Aquip) was then reserved for a Police Station. Ada Street had then not been surveyed through to Churchill Street, and the area west of the proposed school was the Recreation ground (the cement cricket pitch is still discernible in the backyards of houses in the area).

Mrs FOGDEN, about 3kilometres east of Narembeen town (where Stephen MOPPETT used to live) was prepared to accommodate the teacher for \$2.50 per week. Teacher to share a room with a child. On the back of the application form was a list of children, who were likely to attend the proposed school:

Approval for establishing a school at Narembeen was granted but the Education Department decided to test the district attendance by re-opening the first Emu Hill School building under the name of Narembeen. If attendances proved satisfactory it would be removed to the township.

There was a hiccup, however, as the Director ruled that the accommodation for the teacher was unsatisfactory as a separate room was to be provided. Mrs FOGDEN didn't like her accommodation being criticised and withdrew her offer. Mr R. BAILEY stepped into the breech offering accommodation, saying a previous teacher had stayed there (Alice JEFFERSON drove in a sulky to Emu Hill town school).

Miss Ada FOWLES opened Narembeen School on January 23, 1923. Stock for the school had been sent from another school at Kojonup. Miss FOWLES immediately reported on the shocking

condition of the building. Costs were approved for cleaning and calsomining the walls and ceiling, repairs to windows and a new blind, also a potbelly stove and a boys' urinal totalling \$38.00.

Although CONNOLLY and HALE (who had had Narembeen surveyed as a private township) had donated land for a school in the town and Mr LONGHURST continued to press for it, the District School Inspector noted that the roll showed only 19 children, but the average attendance was only 13 in a room 6metres by 5metres with sufficient room for 24 places.

Mrs Annie TUCKETT followed Miss FOWLES in February 1924, and she immediately requested more repairs to the school. But at this time Narembeen town, indeed the whole district, was growing very quickly. The enrolment in September 1924 was 22 with an average of 17 each day. The District Inspector did not recommend extensive repairs to the school saying that a larger school would probably be built fairly soon.

The last straw came when a storm took off part of the school roof and damaged the toilets. The building was unfit for occupation at the beginning of the 1925 school year. Mr LATHAM arranged for the town hall to be made available. In 1925, Head Teacher Mrs Hazel TAYLOR enrolled 26 children, 12 boys and 14 girls. The portion of the town hall made available as a schoolroom was very overcrowded and so on May 5, 1925, tenders were called for a new school to be built on the block donated by CONNOLLY and HALE in Churchill Street. R.C. KILPIN of Victoria Park completed building the school on July 7, 1925.

The old Emu Hill School building, although virtually a wreck, was removed to Pine Hill where it was repaired and used as a schoolroom (between South Kumminin and Corrigin).

Although delighted to have a new building, the Narembeen Parents and Citizens Association in one of their first requests as a body, to the Department, asked for a shelter shed to be erected. The Department, however, replied that there was no necessity for a shelter shed as the verandah of the school (9metres by 2½metres) should be sufficient for a school of that size. In October 1926, the Lands and Surveys Department amended the school boundary to include the Police block as a new Police Station had been built in Ada Street (near the entrance of the present school). The Head Teacher at this time was Alex ROBERTS.

A request for quarters for a teacher to be erected was granted and tenders were called in July 1927, to be built on the back of the school block facing Thomas Street. The matter was complicated however by a request to move the school from Churchill Street end of the block to the other end facing Wilfred Street, because there was constant noise from the main street and also street parking in front of the school. The P & C Association thought that moving the school and building the teacher's quarters could be done by the same tenderer.

Other school sites were also being considered. The town was in a state of flux. The rapid growth meant that the new Road Board attempting to survey new streets in the township, was drawn into the controversy. The Board wished to bring Ada Street through the Sports Ground area to Churchill Street.

Finally, the schoolhouse was built on its present site on the corner of Wilfred and Thomas Streets. It cost \$1218.00 and was completed on October 1, 1927.

Mr ANDERSON was the Secretary of both the Narembeen P & C Association and the Greater Sports Ground committee so he could keep his finger on any transfer proposals. The sports Ground committee desired to buy the school site in Churchill Street in order that it be cut up into business sites. The committee would use the money to assist in the purchase of 117½ acres of land from Mr LATHAM (east of the railway line) for use as a Greater Sports ground. In exchange for the school site the committee would give 5 acres of the 117½ acres for a new school site on which to build a

larger school. This was where the sale yards are now situated and was rejected immediately by the Education Department.

Inspector HATFIELD made a report to the Director of Education in December 1927, writing as follows:

"I have made a close inspection of another site, marked with a red cross on the plan (note: area of present school facing Wakeman Street). I have no hesitation in recommending it for a school site. It is sloping ground. It has an area of approximately 4 acres. When the survey is made it will have streets on three sides of it. It is quite close to the school quarters. It is just out of the business area.

It is a very much better site than that suggested by Mr LATHAM and about which I have some doubt concerning its state in the wet season.

If the school is to be removed by Mr ANDERSON's committee, I conclude that the Public Works Department will be consulted with regard to the method of removal."

No doubt with complaints always following removal of schools, by settlers themselves, from one site to another, Mr HATFIELD was getting in first, to avoid this.

The site recommended by Mr HATFIELD is the southern portion of the present school grounds. At that time, a road ran from Ada Street towards what is now MARINGONI's house on Northmore Street. On the north side of the road between the school grounds and the hospital was the horse paddock for the policeman and the Police Station faced Ada Street. Big trees around the police house are still in evidence. When the new Police Station was built in Yandle Park, adjacent to present Shire Offices, the vacated area was taken over by the Education Department for the building of additional schoolrooms. The surveyed road was closed, to make one big school area.

Following Mr HATFIELD's recommendation, and correspondence between the Director, Minister, Lands and Surveys Department, Secretary for Labour, Secretary for Works, Under/Secretary for Works, Director for Land Resumption Branch, Secretary for Greater Sports ground, etc etc, (evidently red tape and time was a worry then, just as it is today) tenders were finally called on December 24, 1929, for removal of the school in Churchill Street to the new site. Permission was granted to use the hall while the move was made.

After teacher, Alex ROBERTS, a single teacher J.B. DWYER was appointed, and he moved into the newly completed schoolhouse in September 1927. He was not asked to pay any rent as he was to be transferred at the end of the school year.

Mr John BEACH commenced as headmaster early in 1928 after the Christmas break. He came at an opportune time – not only a new residence, but one with electric light as the first Narembeen lighting scheme came into being, complete with powerhouse (situated in vicinity at end of Wakeman Street, west end).

The Wadderin Water Scheme had also been completed and scheme water was laid on. What a luxury after kerosene lanterns and tank water, or worse still, water carted from afar.


The Narembeen P&C Association immediately began campaigning for more room at the school saying, "as it is, it is impossible for two teachers in such a confined space to get satisfactory results." Evidently a second teacher had also been appointed.

The school mentioned here, is still in existence and was until 1990 used as an Art Room. Both Pauline BURGIN, who researched this school history for me, and I (Iris BRISTOW) taught classes in this room.

Head Teacher John BEACH, through the Narembeen P&C Association applied in May 1931 for permission to erect a shelter in the form of a verandah on the south side of the school room, to be

3metres wide, iron roof and gravel floor. The small verandah on the east side was proving altogether too small for the growing number of children.

And so there remained only one schoolroom for most of the 1930's. This was to change however, when the Narembeen Consolidated School came into being. A brick room was built on the Wakeman Street end of the block, and shortly after, in the school holidays 1938-39, the school room from Emu Hill town was moved into Narembeen, just next to the 'big' Narembeen school room. At this time, the road was still in existence between the Police yards and the school.

The name 'Narembeen School' was first used on January 23, 1923.

With the commencement of the 1993 school year, Narembeen School will be 70 years old.





NOTICE OF BAITING PROGRAM FOR WILD DOGS

The Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group (EWBG) advises that from January 1st 2022 ongoing, heavy baiting programs (using 1080 meat baits) to control wild dogs will be carried out by Licensed Pest Management Technicians on Unallocated Crown Land to the east of the State Barrier Fence. In addition to 1080 baiting programs, technicians will be using foot hold traps treated with Strychnine to remove Wild Dogs that are currently impacting the livestock industry in the EWBG region.

From January 1st 2022, the standard wild dog control methods will be ongoing and this may include setting of traps and dispersing of 1080 meat baits in the groups operational area.

The poison baits will remain toxic for a number of months or until substantial rainfall is received. People are advised to take care when working within or visiting these areas.

Warning signs have been placed where applicable on Unallocated Crown Land and main access roads.

Picnic sites and recreational reserves are **not** included within the baiting program; however, baiting may take place adjacent to such areas and domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times.

1080 baiting is an integral part of the wild dog pest management program to protect livestock from death and injury caused by wild dogs.



Exercise caution to prevent your pets from being poisoned by 1080 baits.



If a wild dog is sighted, please report to the Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group immediately.



If poisoning occurs, contact a doctor or Poisons Information Centre (phone 13 11 26).

Police News May 2022

G'day Folks

Covid-19, good morning from isolation! One night in Perth without masks was all it took for 7 nights at home and whilst that can sometimes sound appealing once you're <u>told</u> to do it the charm seems dissipate somewhat and becomes more of a sentence! Whilst the symptoms vary, I'd prefer not to ride this train again thank you very much and will reconsider the no mask in higher risks venues. My point is, masks are not mandated, but they are a choice, so if you are at risk or want to continue to protect yourself, I encourage you to do so.

Traffic Matters, I acknowledge the angst my stance has had on some community groups with my intentions being clear from the start, enforcing road safety actions and keeping the community safe is of the utmost importance especially when so many tragic incidents can be traced back to poor driver behaviours such as speed, alcohol, and drug driving. The devastation of road trauma is burden across the entire community, Narembeen has not been immune from this in the past and I am staunch that police will do our role, I ask you do the same, just plan accordingly. Two recent drink drivers, both suspended reaffirms more work is need in this area.

Just a subtle reminder for employers, a police criminal record check and <u>evidence</u> of a valid driver's licence should be your minimum standard of due diligence. Should a suspended or cancelled driver be detected in one of your work vehicles it will be impounded for 28days, on the spot and you can argue about substituting the vehicle later at your own expense. Employers have a duty of care Section 19(1) OSH Act, protect yourself because this legislation bites.

Mental Health, whilst instructing at the academy I was a Mental Health First Aid trainer having trained more than 600 police officers on tools to help people suffering in this space and the first step is sometimes the hardest, Approach, if you see change in someone you care about allow yourself the courage to approach them with your concern.

If you or someone you know is suffering in this space, I encourage you to reach out as help is available and the person hurting can be assisted toward recovery. Here's just a few of the more common contacts but don't worry they're like gloves, keep fighting until you find the one that fits.

WHAT HAPPENS AT SEEDING TIME

Someone asked me a few days ago what happens at seeding time. And the simple answer of "it's when we plant the crops" just didn't do it

justice. Seeding time is... a combination of little moments. ~ ~ ~ It's the unspoken tension as the weather forecasts show up empty handed each morning. It's the chaos that comes with trying to coordinate tractors, and the trucks to fill the tractors, and the utes to fuel the trucks.



It's the satisfaction of finishing the last run on a big paddock. It's trying to navigate your way around the trees and rock piles while your tractor cab is engulfed in a cloud of dust. It's the amazing sunrises and sunsets that leave the sky dripping with colour. It's working alongside each other in silence, too tired to talk while clambering up over tyres and metal bars to unblock seeding hoses. It's the relief of falling asleep to the sound of rain on the tin roof. It's the 9pm fill ups underneath the Milky Way that put life back into perspective. It's the family two-way talk back that starts up after listening to Richard Fidler or the Country Hour on ABC radio in 3 different vehicles. It's the familiar glow of tractor headlights on the horizon as evening falls. It's the 180km round trip into town for machinery parts and veggies. 
