

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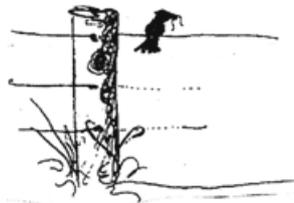



Kellie also found a book that Hazel Toovey had made up with some school children. It sounds very interesting. An excerpt was;

'What are some special memories that you have of your childhood that you haven't shared already?

I think two of the most important and enjoyable times at Naremben School in the 1930's and early 1940's were the coming of the school buses bringing in the kids from the smaller schools. We had more new friends - more kids for sport - more teachers - then in 1942 we had 60 more kids at school as they were evacuated from Perth as they were expecting to be bombed by the Japanese. Most of these children had never been out of Perth - so found life very different so we all had to adjust. Then came air raid drills and slit trenches dug around the school grounds - exciting we thought, luckily we did not have any air raids.'

RECONCILIATION WEEK FRIDAY MAY 27 – FRIDAY JUNE 3 2022



National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about **our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.** The dates for NRW are the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

May 27 1967: On this day, Australia’s most successful referendum saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census.

June 3 1992: On this day, the Australian High Court delivered the Mabo decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo’s challenge to the legal fiction of ‘terra nullius’ (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. This decision paved the way for Native Title.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

At its heart, reconciliation is about **strengthening relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous peoples, for the benefit of all Australians.** For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, Australia’s colonial history is characterised by **devastating land dispossession, violence, and racism.** Over the last half century, however, many

significant steps towards reconciliation have been taken. **Reconciliation is an ongoing journey that reminds us that while generations of Australians have fought hard for meaningful change, future gains are likely to take just as much, if not more, effort.**

Why is National Reconciliation Week important?

National Reconciliation Week provides a focus for working towards our goal of a just equitable and reconciled Australia. National Reconciliation Week is an ideal time for organisations, schools, universities, community groups and workplaces to advance understanding of reconciliation within their own places and their own lives. National Reconciliation Week provides a focus for working towards our goal of a just equitable and reconciled Australia. It began as a Week of Prayer for Reconciliation in 1993, supported by Australia's major religious groups. Three years later it evolved into National Reconciliation Week under the guidance of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation (now Reconciliation Australia).

Rainbow Fritter's

VEGETABLE PATTY'S RAINBOW FRITTERS TASTE.COM.AU



Ingredients

1 1/2 cups (225g) self-raising flour
 2 Coles Australian Free Range Eggs, lightly whisked
 3/4 cup (185ml) milk
 1/2 cup (60g) coarsely grated tasty Cheddar
 2 cups vegetables (see below)
 Vegetable oil, to shallow-fry

Pea fritters

1 1/2 cups (180g) frozen peas

Corn fritters

1 1/2 cups (240g) corn kernels
 Pinch of ground turmeric

Capsicum fritters

1 red capsicum, seeded, chopped
 Pinch of ground paprika

Beetroot fritters

1 large beetroot, coarsely grated

Zucchini fritters

2 medium zucchini, coarsely grated

Method

Step 1

To make the pea fritters, cook the peas in a saucepan of boiling water for 2 mins. Refresh under cold water. Drain. Process in a food processor until coarsely chopped.

Step 2

To make the corn fritters, cook the corn in a saucepan of boiling water for 1-2 mins. Refresh under cold water. Drain. Process in a food processor with turmeric until finely chopped.

Step 3

To make the capsicum fritters, process the capsicum in a food processor with the paprika until finely chopped. Transfer to a sieve and drain excess liquid.

Step 4

To make beetroot fritters, coarsely grate 1 large beetroot.

Step 5

To make zucchini fritters, coarsely grate 1 large zucchini. Squeeze out excess water.

Step 6

Place the flour in a large bowl. Whisk the egg and milk in a jug. Add to the flour and stir to combine. Stir in the cheddar and your chosen vegetables.

Step 7

Heat a little oil in a large non-stick frying pan over medium-low heat. Pour three 1/4-cup (60ml) portions of mixture in the pan, allowing room for spreading. Cook for 1-2 mins or until small bubbles appear on the surface. Turn and cook for 1-2 mins or until cooked through. Transfer to a plate. Cover with foil to keep warm.

Step 8

Repeat with the remaining mixture.

Narembreen Historical Society Schools Over the Years

WADDERIN SCHOOLS

WADDERIN SCHOOL No.1

Pioneers in the Wadderin Hill area north of Narembreen who had moved in just prior to World War I, found their children were growing up and their education was becoming a problem.

Emu Hill School on LATHAM's farm was too far for most children to travel bearing in mind that transport was by horse, or horses and sulky over poor tracks, sandy and rough in summer, boggy and slippery in winter.

The terminus of the railway from Narrogin through Kondinin and Emu Hill reached Narembreen in 1917 and seemed destined to end there for many years.

With these facts in mind, A. HEMSLEY JP wrote to the Education Department on behalf of the settlers, following a public meeting on March 18, 1917. He stated that the matter of obtaining a school was urgent and gave the number of school-aged children, some never having been to school, adding, some will soon be too old. He said the reserve at the proposed siding at Wadderin would be a good site and Mrs CUSACK or Mrs STEWART would be willing to give land free.

Apparently, the engineer sent to assess the situation at Wadderin siding took some time to do this. An application signed S.C. LONGHURST, President of Settlers Association, A. STEWART, Vice-President and J.P. BUTLER, Secretary was sent to the Education Department recommending a site on Homestead farm location 17430/74 (34169) right opposite the Wadderin siding. Board for teacher available with Mrs HILTON.

 J. NOBLES – Joshua (9)
 J.P. BUTLER – Mabel (12), John (11), William (6), Herbert (5)

As Emu Hill (near present Narembeen town) and the proposed Wadderin School were within about 10 kilometres of each other, it was obvious that some children would be “poached” from the other.

On October 7, 1917, Mr W.H. FRICKER, Secretary of the Emu Hill School committee wrote to the Department protesting against the rumour afloat of establishing a school at Wadderin. He asked the Director to consider the difficulty Emu Hill parents had had establishing, then re-opening after closure. If Wadderin had a school Emu Hill would lose at least 4 children from J. NOBLE’s and BUTLER’s families. It would leave Emu Hill in a precarious position attendance wise.

It must have been extremely difficult for the Education Department to sort out the problem given that the only mode of transport was horse and sulky, and the mail was sent the same way until the railway came through in 1917 and mail facilities were then at Narembeen.

The files contain numerous memos and letters. A deputation from Wadderin met the Director of Education at Bruce Rock on January 16, 1918. They suggested the site 8 kilometres northeast of Emu Hill. E.P. CUSACK was tenacious indeed – he wrote many pointed and pithy epistles to the Department. On February 4, 1918, he commented that if the Inspector (HUGHES) doesn’t come soon to inspect the site he wouldn’t guarantee anyone to meet him.

Inspector HUGHES suggested moving Emu Hill School to a more central site, 2 kilometres north of Narembeen siding (corner of SAVAGE farm, (Peter WALKER’s)). This idea sounded feasible and was approved by the Minister.

However, with much correspondence to and fro it was pointed out that even if Emu Hill School was sited further north, many children would still have to drive 6 or 7 miles over very bad roads in winter, which they would not do. Finally, Inspector HUGHES on April 26, 1918, advised, *“the whole area does not warrant two schools.”* He withdrew the recommendation to move Emu Hill School north and would not recommend Wadderin School establishment. He pointed out that Wadderin did not have a monopoly of tough conditions – many children elsewhere drove to school in just as bad or worse conditions.

These were fighting words to the settlers and brought a deluge of letters pleading and imploring *“we don’t want our children uneducated”*. Mr COLEBACH MP remarked that their persistence and tenacity merited earnest consideration.

In June 1918, Mr CUSACK must have had his ear to the ground. He’d heard their case was to be considered. The Department finally suggested that a school be built on the corner of Longhurst’s block (Loc. 18147), but the settlers countered with a suggestion that it be on CURRALL’s block (Loc. 18150) now Woodfield’s which was quite close. Reason given was that ground was virgin land and would afford shade and shelter for summer whereas LONGHURST’s block was cleared. Mr CUSACK added his usual admonishment *“Time is coming when the children without education will most certainly be at a great disadvantage.”* The surveyor pronounced the LONGHURST site ideal and Mr CUSACK countered further... *“After waiting one year, there is only one way of looking at it, you prefer to have the children of 8 years of pioneering, grow up in ignorance.”*

Eventually, however, tenders were called to build the school on CURRALL’s land. E. CROSSLEY of East Perth commenced building in February 1919 and completed the school in April 1919. Unfortunately, Mrs HILTON who was to board the teacher was unavailable so Mr CUSACK wrote...

“Teacher can come to my place. We will endeavour to make her comfortable as possible. Of course, you will understand that the teacher is not coming to a mansion.”

So, Miss Maude ALLEN arrived on June 9, 1919, to open Wadderin School. As predicted, this meant that Emu Hill School couldn't sustain the numbers and would revert to an Assisted School with parents having to subsidise the teacher. This they were not prepared to do, so Emu Hill School closed on September 5, 1919, and Miss MAYS, the teacher, was transferred on request to Wadderin School. Miss ALLEN was transferred to Kunnonoppin. Wadderin School suited Miss MAYS very well. She could board with sister and brother-in-law Molly and Paddy CUSACK, and she was closer to her fiancé, Sam YEOMANS.

They were married on February 25, 1920. Miss Mercia BARLOW became Head Teacher at Wadderin on January 29, 1920. At the end of this year, however, on December 17, 1920, the school closed on account of accommodation problems.

A memo from the Public Works Department in May 1921, queried if the school was likely to be closed for any length of time. Inspector HUGHES noted that there was not much hope of the school re-opening, but not recommending its removal on account of the possibility of a school being required in Graball district. He had heard that this settlement was being opened up some miles east of Wadderin.

The Department was on the point of allowing the Agricultural Bank to take the building to Bruce Rock for office use, when approval by the Minister was received on February 18, 1922, for J.J. SCHIPP to move Wadderin School to Graball.

So, after so much agitation, Wadderin School was open for only 18 months. In October 1926, Inspector HATFIELD, according to a memo, visited Wadderin School site (the building had gone) and concluded that the owner Mr CURRALL could have his land back.

Presumably, some children in Emu Hill and Wadderin areas received no education in 1921-22, because both schools were then closed. It is noted that Phil (Felice) COVA was a pupil at North Kumminin School (Loc. 15308) during this period. Others including the BURGIN and CUSACK children attended Graball School.

WADDERIN SCHOOL No.2

The construction of Wadderin Dam in 1927 provided the spur for an attempt to establish a second school in the Wadderin district.

In late 1926, A. GORDON, for Wadderin District Progress Association, applied for a school at the Wadderin township, but by May 1927, he had altered his plea to a site at the PWD camp at Wadderin Dam, then being built.

Names of likely children to attend the school were given:

Other parents with children were Alex GORDON, Joseph CUSACK, and Harry ROTHBAUM plus PWD workers with seven other children.

Inspector HAMILTON made a report on the settlement. It was ascertained that the project would last for two years.

A well built hall was near the camp, suitable for use as a school. The hall committee was prepared to erect wc's. The engineer agreed that there was no difficulty in employing married men if a school was available.

The teacher's accommodation would be a tent or camp, paying board of £1 (\$2). The engineer's wife and other wives lived in well made tents. The teacher was to provide their own bed, bedding, and blankets, as only stretchers provided to sleep on.

It was recommended that a male teacher be appointed – and so Elliott PHILLIPS arrived to open the Wadderin Hall School at the Wadderin dam on September 5, 1927. Furniture for the school came from Tenterden, Yealering and Perth.

However, within six months, the PWD project had evidently been completed or there were fewer children among the workers, because Elliott PHILLIPS reported to the Department that the hall was to be moved 3 miles and re-erected at Wadderin siding. For three weeks the school would be closed as there was no other suitable building. Mr PHILLIPS was immediately recalled to be sent to West Coolup temporarily.

WADDERIN SCHOOL No.3

On April 10, 1928, Elliot PHILLIPS re-opened Wadderin School at the siding. He boarded with Mrs MORTIMORE. The hall was improved by additional room being added at the back also a brick fireplace. The Department was asked to pay 7/6 (75¢) per week rental. This they agreed to do as long as the average number of children attending was 10 or more.

During the next year attendance fluctuated, and rent was only being paid intermittently.

Alf SCANLON was the head teacher in 1931. He criticized the school hall as being draughty and in need of partitions and another fireplace. He said the building was 'terrible'.

Rental was lowered to 5/- (50¢) per week. Inspector HATFIELD said the department could not assist with improvements until a higher attendance of children.

Claire McINTYRE became teacher in 1932 and her complaints included broken windows, unlocked doors, roof repairs also needed, but Inspector ROCKLIFF's only comment on his report was that more blackboard space was needed.

Later, he admitted that when the temperature was over 95°, conditions would be unbearable and would be quite comfortable if a ceiling were to be put in.

The Depression was affecting farmers; however, they couldn't afford to assist in this way. They recommended that the Department move the now unused Mt Arrowsmith School to Wadderin.

By July 1935, school attendance had declined dramatically and on March 27, 1936, the Wadderin School Hall closed its doors as a school room.

However, Graball School in the area, continued to operate until 1938 when the Naremben Consolidated School commenced with two school buses operating. Yawerlin school also closed at the end of 1938 for the same reason.

Blankets and Beanies Delivered to Wheelchairs for Kids

Last Tuesday Carmel & Maurie Harper travelled to Perth to deliver two very large bags of blankets and teddies to “Wheelchairs for Kids” which had been made by the Narembeen Autumn Club.

On arrival we observed a happy group of around forty or so volunteers on their tea break. Immediately we were invited to join them. We were welcomed in with a round of applause from Ollie who said they were grateful for Narembeen Autumn Club’s support.

We learned this organisation, supported by Rotary Australia, is doing so much for disabled kids around the world.

Everyone has their particular part to play in putting these all terrain cushioned chairs together – getting them ready to be shipped off to over 90 countries.

One of the things Beppe, our guide, with a mountain of information explained; was the introduction of Spoke Covers (self-propelling rims). These covers/guards fixed onto the wheels, prevents fingers slipping into the spokes. Beppe told us that she ties the spoke covers onto the wheels as the men’s fingers are too large for this fiddly job.

Medical teams from Western Australia go into different countries, helping the kids gain a better life. At the moment they are working in Somaliland, a small safe democracy at the top of Somalia. They go there knowing they are safe and respected.

The children learn how to care for their own chairs: which are fitted with foot restraints; upper body harnesses; postural support devices for the head, trunk and legs; detachable trays; carry basket and tool kits. Also included are blankets and teddies. A Physiotherapist personally fits each recipient to their chair.

One Vietnamese mother who was over the moon with the chair and the help extended to her child, conveyed her thanks to the good ladies of Australia, who had gone to the trouble of knitting a blanket for him.

Wheelchairs for Kids primary aim is to give a more meaningful life to many of the millions of disabled children in lesser resourced countries.




2019-2020 Blackspot Nomination Attachment 2


