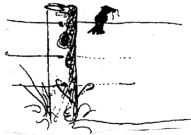

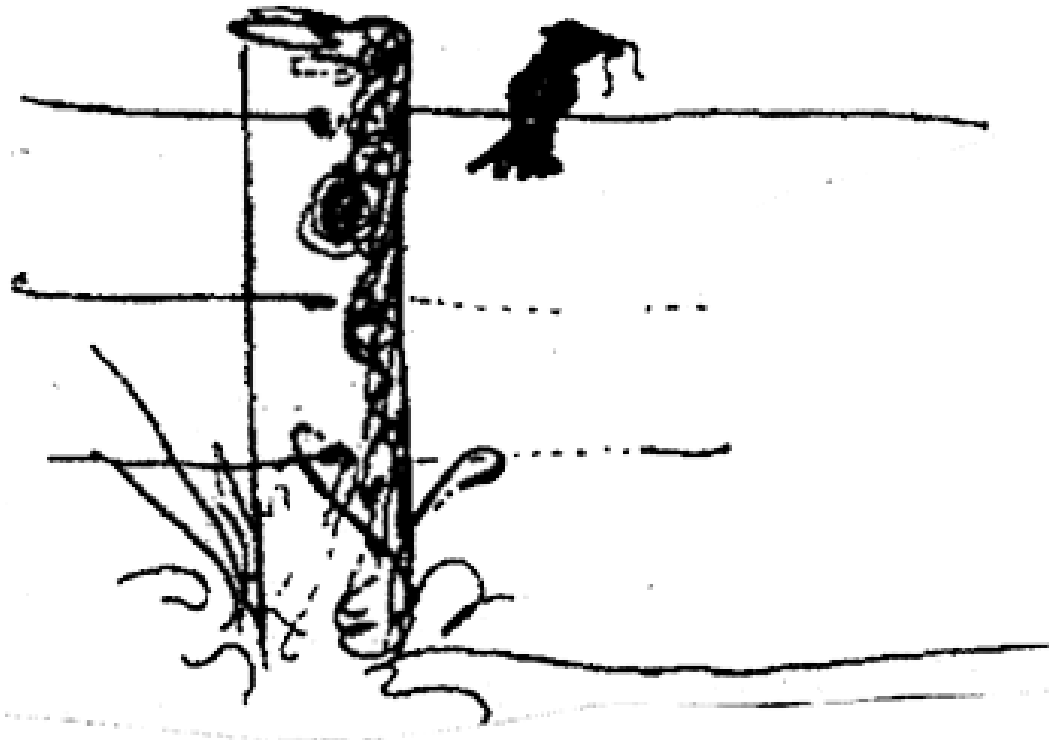

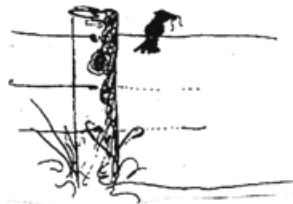

Stepping up..

Maturity is a curious thing. It has such a fluid description when applied to individuals and to groups. It's a label that is applied to some who are very young while it is also a label that is never applied to some. When analysing the behaviour of a sporting group it is a tag that is often used when that group starts to provide some consistency and coolness to their efforts. After overcoming a very good Burra side on the weekend perhaps this is a moniker that can be applied to these Hawks.

Two Saturdays ago the league game was a good game of footy. Starting into the breeze the pacy cats had the best of the early stanza. They won stoppages and moved the ball with speed through the middle of the ground. The Hawks defence had to reorganise a couple of times to absorb the pressure. To their credit they were able to and then get their offence going to stay with the Cats on the scoreboard.

The ensuing two quarters would be an arm wrestle of entertaining characteristics. The Cats defence held up wonderfully well against when the Hawks controlled the ball and on the other side so did the backline of the home team. It seemed each period of control or potential scoreboard break was countered by each team. A fact that was see the two sides separated by a solitary point at the final change.

This is where the maturity kicked in. Where once the side may have panicked and over done their situation. The Hawks got their match ups right, they gained control of the middle of the ground and slammed home nine goals in the last quarter to go on to win a highly entertaining game by 37 points. A result that didn't do justice to how good the Cats were but did suggest the Hawks had the ability to step up.

When teams are challenged it often takes individuals to show the way for others to follow. When they see their team being confronted certain players take it upon themselves to try and set the tone in the way of their team. On Saturday, James Kennedy was that player for the Hawks. Playing as perhaps the smallest key forward the game has ever seen, Kennedy kicked seven goals. He also spent time on the ball winning contested footy when the Hawks were challenged. There was a passage of play where Kennedy was involved about thirty metres out from the Cats goal. He won the ball and got the Hawks out on the other side. He then took the mark at the end of the chain to have the shot on goal. That was an impressive effort.

The Spinks boys were also influential in what was a good contest while the stopping job that Dave Mortimore did on the super talented Dylan Hayden was also highly influential in getting the Hawks another win. It was a good win for the Hawks for a couple of simple reasons. Firstly, their opponents are a good side, young fast and with a huge upside, it is clear the Cats are a contender in 2022. Secondly it was a sign that maybe these Hawks are starting to mature.

Of those forwards Tommy Latham showed that he is simply a man of many talents with an imperious display across half forward. He provided a connection for the hard working midfield and showed a turn of speed to his opponents that made him hard to put a clamp on. Lindsay Brown had a day out as the small forward kicking six goals in what was a classy display. Then to top off the show from the forward line, Brendan Maher kicked one of the goals of the year. A goal which can best be described as athletic in all sorts of original ways.

The best parts of the way that the Ressies played on the weekend were seen after half time. Firstly, they had almost as many shots on goal in the second half as the first. When you are lucky enough to be in control it is easy to take your foot off the pedal after half time. Especially in Ressies footy as this is the time, where the boys may have indulged a bit much in the snakes, the burners or really just seized up. Secondly it was the fact that they only allowed their opposition one shot at goal, that's a fair effort.

The Ressies were lucky enough to get the Cats on the right weekend and will no doubt have a tough game waiting for them when they travel up to the Cattery later in the year. 1972.....Quite the year

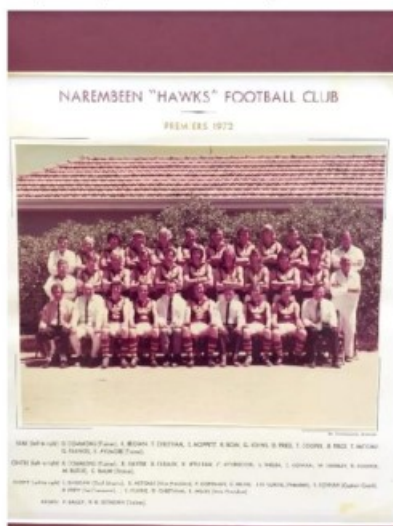
It will be hard to believe for some but fifty years ago the Hawks were the top of the tree, for fifty years ago the Narembeen Football Club won the EDFL League Premiership. In 1972 the EDFL was a nine team competition. The mighty Shackleton Royals had recently called it a day and the likes of Kulin and Hyden had yet to join the competition. There were three highly competitive grades with the Merredin High School adding a side to the Ressies competition. It was year when Eastern Districts Football was strong and the Hawks sat on top of the tree.

In 1972 the Hawks finished on top of the ladder with twelve wins from 16 games. While that is an impressive record they were only two wins away from Nukarni who held fourth spot with ten wins which suggested the possibility of a close finals series. The Hawks had some prime movers through the year with John Currie winning the goal kicking with 51 while Frank Copeman finished second with 45. The Hawks didn't have a contender for the Miller Medal in '72 but Graeme Hunter finished third in the Jefferys medal, which was the Fairest and Best award for the Colts competition.

Results suggest that the Hawks saved their best football for the final series. They would take on Burracoppin in the Second Semi and as it was back in the days when the finals were all played in the central towns, the Hawks got the game at home. An eleven goal win to the maroon and gold would start the Cats off on what would be a straight sets exit from the finals. They would be beaten by their arch rivals Nukarni in the Preliminary Final.

Nukarni, the Hawks opponents on the big day, would come from fourth to make the big dance. They beat Baandee by just three points in the first semi. They would then go on to have that aforementioned Preliminary Final win against the Cats. Nukarni were, and still are, a club of wonderful character and belief. Their side was on a roll it seems and presented as a real challenger to the Hawks of '72.

A football season is a marathon not a sprint and good sides save their best for last. Despite the quality of their opponent the final score in the gf suggests the Hawks hit their straps when it mattered most. Thirty eight shots to sixteen suggests an afternoon of almost complete dominance from the Hawks of '72. Colin Holberton would win the Cosgrove Medal for best on ground and the Hendy Cowan coached side would go on to win by eighty eight points. It was quiet the year for the Hawks some fifty years ago. Keep an eye out for a couple of interviews with some involved soon,

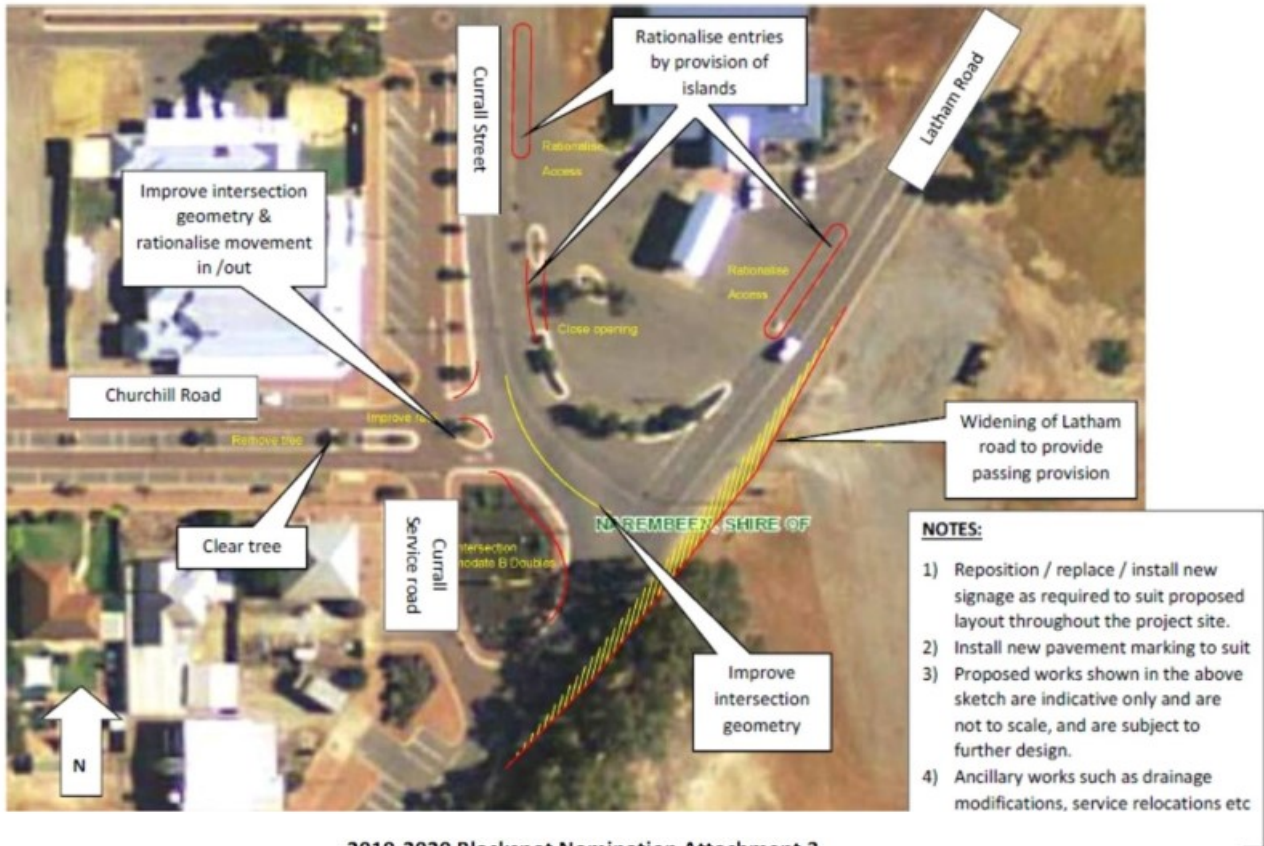

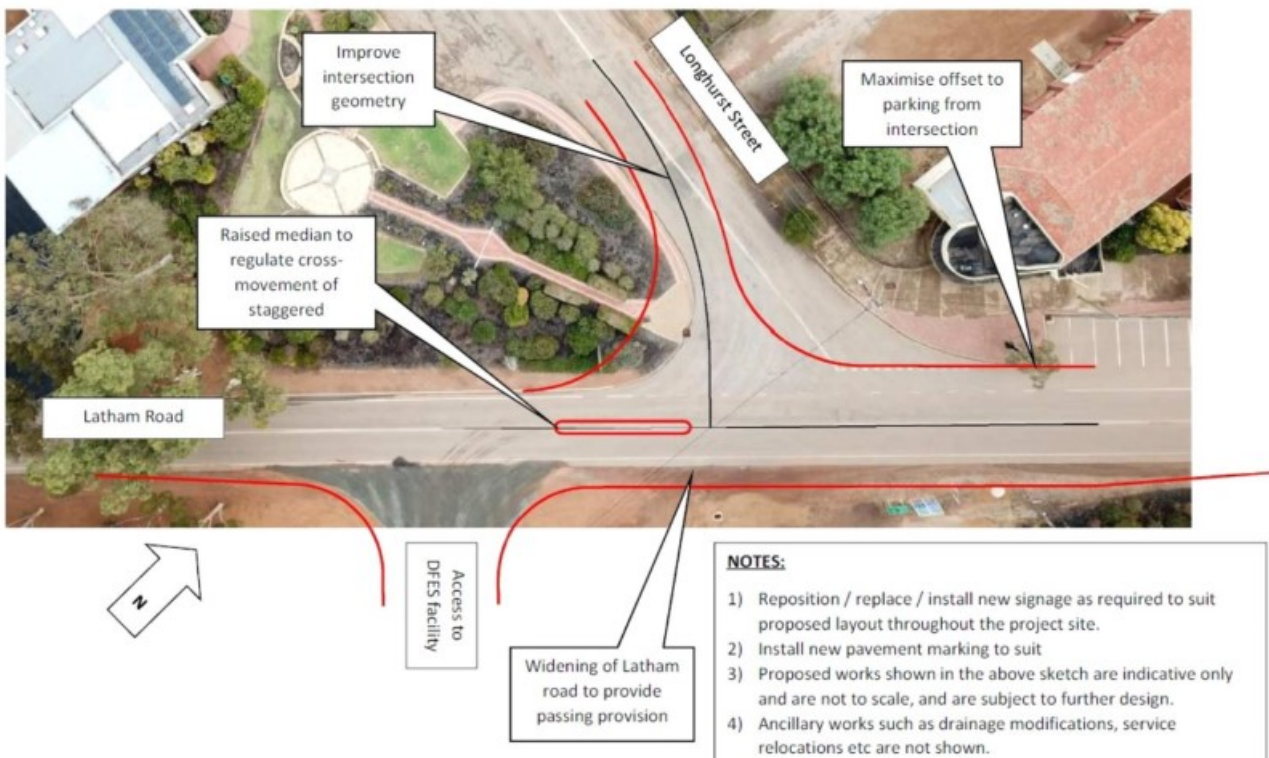
2019-2020 Blackspot Nomination Attachment 2
