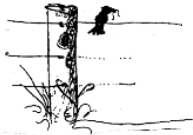

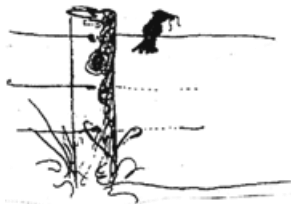

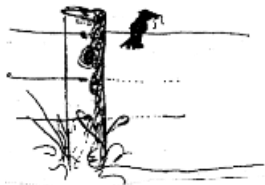

LIONS SKIN CANCER SCREENING BUS

SATURDAY JUNE 25th

The Narembeen Lions Club is pleased to announce that the Lions Mobile Skin Screening Bus is scheduled to visit Narembeen on Saturday June 25th. The bus last visited Narembeen in August 2000, when 64 people were screened, with 14% of those that were screened referred for further assessment.

15 minutes is all the time that is required for screening, a small amount of time to be screened by a medical professional for an all over body check for skin cancers. This is an entirely free service. Up to 70 people can be screened in a day, so we hope that Narembeen residents make the most of this opportunity.

WELL DONE AGAIN NAREMBEEN DHS: TOP 10 RESULTS 😊

Following up from a phone call I received, last week I received an email from David Wanstell, Director, Primary, Early Childhood and Education Support at Statewide Services stating:

'As mentioned to you, your school has been recognised as one of the top 10 Western Australian public primary schools over 2019/21 relative performance for Year 3 English NAPLAN results. We would appreciate the opportunity to learn more about your school's teaching and assessment of phonics and hope that you would be willing to participate in a short survey.'

We did not know that we were Top 10, but we are aware that the work of the ECE team, coupled with the use of our funds so that we can provide as much as possible, classes with one year level in these years, has resulted in improvement. As I said at the assembly, an reiterate here, **it would not matter how many thousands of dollars we threw at the ECE focus area, if we did not have the right people in front of the classes, improvement may have been seen, but it would not have been at the same level as has happened. We have outstanding educators in our K - 2 classes, dedicated to ensuring that we are providing the best possible start to our students. They are enthusiastic, professional and experienced teachers, who continually initiate change using research based best practice. I congratulate them on their excellence over a number of years. As well as the staff members seen in this photo, Dannielle Leask-Copeman and Karen Bormolini would also have been instrumental in seeing such growth in the 2019 and 2021 testing. Well done ladies, love your work 😊.**

THANK YOU, DORCAS, AGAIN, YOUR DONATION IS GREATLY APPRECIATED

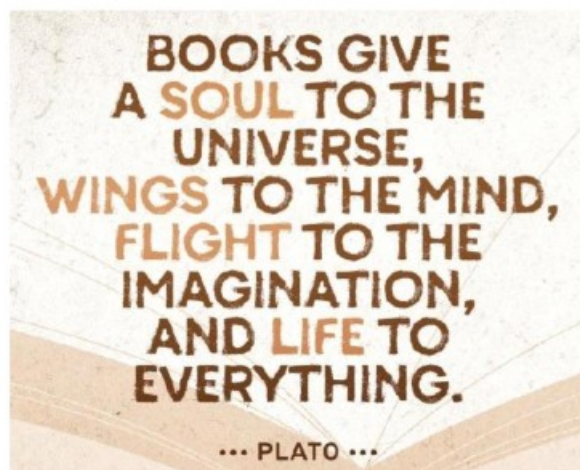

YEAR 5/6 BAKE SALE

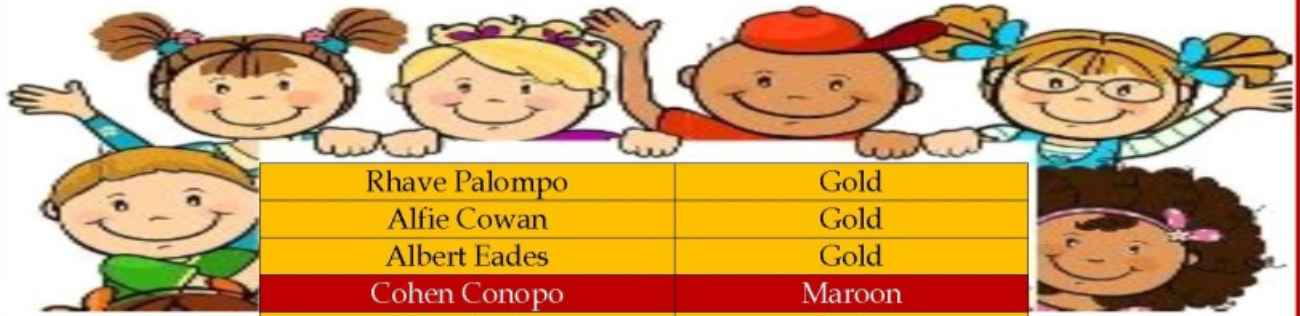

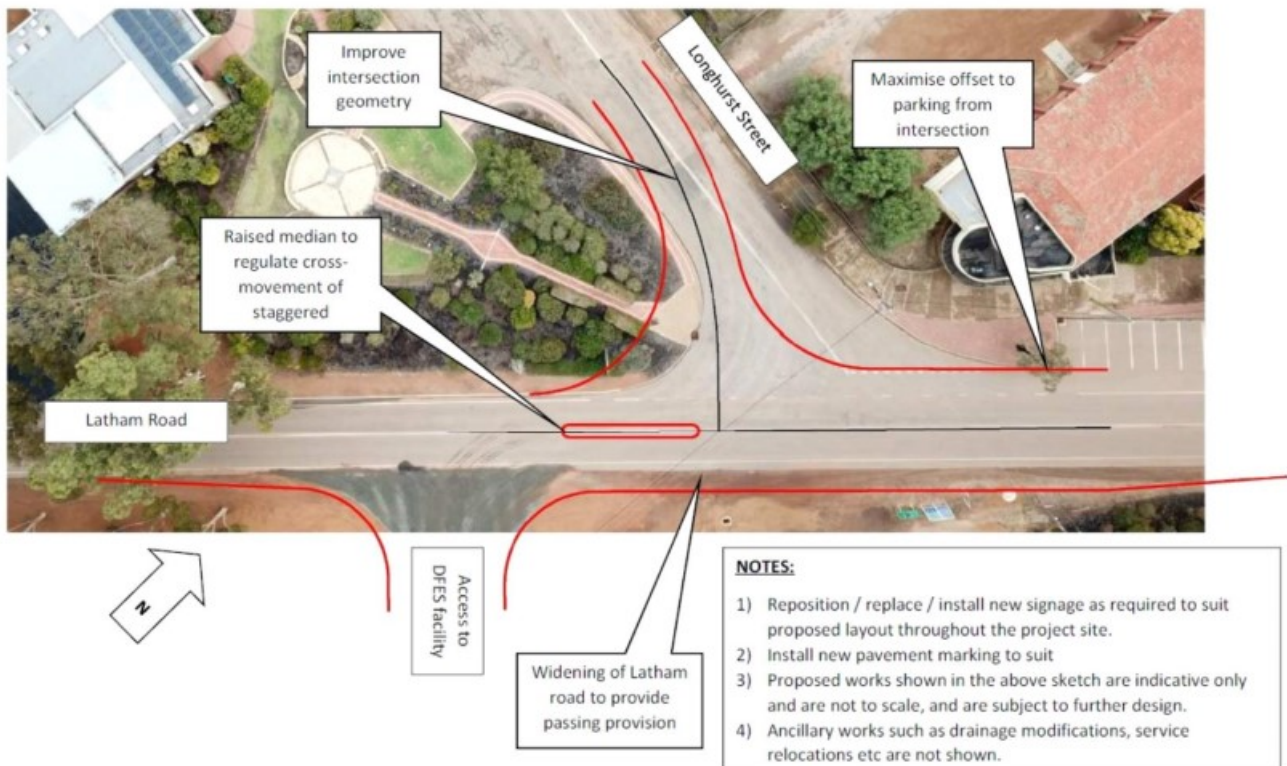
