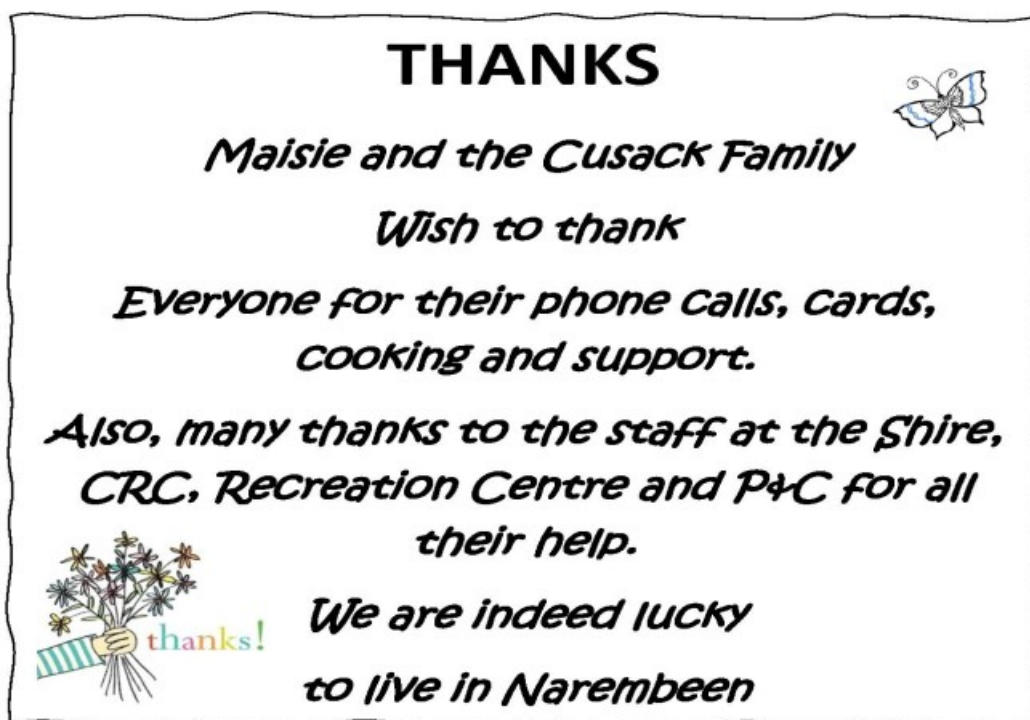
Over the Fence....

Grain Brokers Australia Weekly Market Report

July 19, 2022

French crops are getting fried...

The harvest of this year's winter and spring crops in France is humming along, according to the country's agriculture ministry. One of the hottest and driest springs on record has promoted French crop development to such an extent that the harvest pace is well ahead of both last year and the five-year average.

While the hot and dry weather is great for harvest, cereal production is expected to be down significantly, and concerns are growing about the possible impact on this season's corn production, especially with a second wave of scorching weather forecast for this week.

FranceAgriMer released data last week that put the soft wheat harvest at 50 per cent completed as of July 11. French farmers had only harvested 14 per cent of their crop a week earlier and just 3 per cent at the same time in 2021. The durum wheat harvest was 82 per cent done as of last Monday, compared to 50 per cent on July 4 and 37 per cent a year earlier. Harvesting in the southernmost regions had reached about 90 per cent, but the northernmost regions of Hauts-de-France and Normandie were only beginning last week.

The winter barley harvest is completed in most districts across the country, with 97 per cent in the bin at the beginning of last week compared to 83 per cent the previous Monday and only 39 per cent at the same time last year. As of the beginning of last week, the northern regions of Normandy and Brittany still had around 13 per cent and 20 per cent, respectively, to harvest. Reaping of the spring barley fields is also motoring along with 41 per cent of the total planted area covered by July 11, compared to 14 per cent on US Independence Day and 4 per cent on the same day in 2021.

The massive jump in harvest progress highlights how poor the yields must be in some areas allowing headers to navigate the fields far quicker than usual. So, it was a surprise to see the soft wheat crop ratings increase for the first time in many weeks. FranceAgriMer called the good-to-excellent category 1 per cent higher at 64 per cent, suggesting anticipated yields will improve as the harvest gets into full swing in the north. However, the poor-to-very poor category also increased by one per cent to 14 per cent, underscoring the weather-induced yield issues in the south. Crop conditions for both winter and spring barley were unchanged week-on-week.

The French Agriculture Ministry cut the country's wheat production forecast from 35.4 million metric tonne last harvest to 32.9MMT this year. Further cuts are possible if yields fail to improve as expected as the harvest moves north. However, a drop in the average yield from 7.1 metric tonne per hectare last harvest to the current projection of 6.9MT/ha is not the only contributing factor, as the country's planted area is also down by 5.6 per cent.

Winter and spring barley production is forecast at 11.2MMT collectively, down 2.4 per cent on 2021/22. The lost output will put a severe dent in the country's exportable surplus of cereals, just as global consumers search for reliable substitutes for stranded Ukrainian grains.

That said, FranceAgriMer remains confident wheat exports will increase on the back of the Black Sea supply issues. The state back agency expects 2022/23 season wheat exports to countries outside the European Union to rise by 17 per cent to 10.3MMT compared to 2021/22.

The Maghreb countries of Northwest Africa are expected to be responsible for most of this increase, particularly Morocco, now that Algeria has a taste for Russian wheat. Add in the 7.1MMT of exports to fellow European Union member states, and French wheat exports are forecast to increase 3 per cent year-on-year to 17.4MMT, despite the decline in production.

Meanwhile, on the summer crop front, the heatwave conditions forecast for France this week have the trade and consumers on edge. The soil moisture profile is already well below average in many corn-growing districts, just as the crop moves from the vegetative growth phase to the high moisture dependent reproductive phase.

In the week ending July 11, FranceAgriMer estimated the proportion of the corn crop at the flowering stage rose from 30 per cent to 67 per cent. This compared to 9 per cent one year ago and emphasises just how quickly the crop has matured under the less than favourable conditions. Development was most advanced in the eastern regions of Auvergne-Rhone-Alpes and Alsace. The north-eastern region of Grand-Est, which includes Alsace, had the best crop conditions, with 96 per cent of the crop rated good or better.

On Monday of last week, FranceAgriMer estimated that 83 per cent of the French corn crop was rated good or excellent, down slightly from 84 per cent the previous week, which it still compares quite favourably with 89 per cent a year earlier.

However, with moisture demand peaking and the mercury tipped to exceed 40 degrees Celsius in some regions this week, more substantial rating downgrades are expected in the coming weeks. Temperatures above 35°C commonly lead to incomplete pollination, in turn having a negative impact on final yields. If the hot and dry weather continues without relief for the rest of July, corn production potential will be eroded very quickly.

The deteriorating harvest outlook in France comes amid a background of significant market uncertainty and volatility. Traders and funds seem to be selling the rumours regarding Ukraine's potential to return as a major grain exporter rather than looking at cold hard facts. The impracticality of such an outcome will remain high as long as Russia demands the removal of Western sanctions and Ukraine rightly refuses to demine its Black Sea ports until the invaders goes home.

Narembeen tech wins AFGRI Top Tech '22

AFGRI Equipment – Narembeen service technician Daniel de Gouveia has been awarded AFGRI Top Technician of the Year for 2022. The award was presented at the company's annual awards night, held at Optus Stadium this month. This year's award saw a different winner selection process with all AFGRI service technicians encouraged to take part in a skills-based competition, rather than metrics to choose the eventual winner. The first assessment was an open book written test where technicians had access to all tools and documentation available to them such as John Deere Service ADVISOR™. From the results of the first assessment, the group was whittled down to the top twelve service technicians. "It is a real pleasure to work with someone like Daniel with such a great attitude and work ethic," Craig said. Margaret Butler is working with a group from Kellerberrin aiming to provide a memorial to wheatbelt members of the 2nd 28th Battalion Rats of Tobruk. This project is in its early stages.

The interior of the Old Church has been renovated and a new porch has been built. Several plaques e.g. opening of buildings, commemorations etc. which have been removed during redevelopment around the town will be displayed on the outside wall of the RSL building. This work is in conjunction with the Shire.

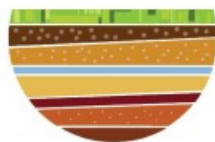
The preservation of Avoca Farm House and shearing shed was discussed. The general consensus was that the building needs to be made waterproof to prevent further damage. Fencing around the house was also deemed important as well as some signage. Visitors to buildings is strongly discouraged due to health and safety concerns. It is not possible for the society to undertake work in making the site another museum as we have more than enough work in maintaining the museums in town, showing visitors through and managing exhibits. We are very happy that the shire has worked with us on this matter and maybe in the future there may be possibilities for development of the location. For the moment preservation is the priority.

Plans are ongoing re tidying up the Historical Society's section behind the Community Shed.

Requests for information continue to arrive: Eric Silver for information on Harry Rothbaum and Maurice Silverstein; Brian Vertannas re Dave Brown who was thought to be a Vietnam Veteran from Narembeen. Alan Wright is assisting with this one.

We have been offered the Charge Table from the Police Station. This could be utilized as a display unit whilst at the same time preserving its story when in use.

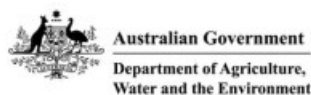

Standards.....

Ressies footy is a funny thing. The motivations behind the players pulling on the boots vary greatly and the range of football skill and football IQ across the group can be quite stark. Heaven.....

'Everyone wants to go to heaven, but nobody wants to die.' This is quote often used by the US Marines and holds with it a very simple interpretation. That interpretation is that in today's society everyone wants the fruits of success but fewer and fewer want to do the hard work to get that success. Today this quote serves as an apt description of the Hawks efforts at the Cross on Saturday.

Sitting a game clear on top of the ladder the Hawks went into the match as the warmest of favourites. They had got the better of the Bombers in the first round at Naremben and had every reason to be confident going into the game. However, it was clear from what was a very even first quarter that the Hawks would have to work hard to win against a spirited Bombers on their home ground. The Bombers were on top in the middle of the ground and the Hawks were struggling to find connection through the ground when they did have it. An even scoreboard at the first change showed this one for the arm wrestle it would become.

To win an arm wrestle a team needs to work both sides of the ball. They need to acknowledge the threat that their opposition brings and increase their intensity when they do not have the ball. They need to sacrifice themselves for the good of the team. Pressure needs to be placed on the ball carrier at all times and numbers need to get back to help out the defence when the ball does come in. Indeed, numbers need to be evened at every contest to ensure the game can get on the terms you want. The Hawks could not do this on Saturday.

When they had the ball in hand, they at times moved it well and attacked. Jayden Hooper had a good day as a mobile centre half forward while Will Shepherd showed his eagerness for the contest across half back. His tenacity was shown in the air as well as he was willing to back into packs to provide a contest. When the ball turned over though they were poor. The pressure on the Bombers ball carrier was just about non existent which allowed the Bombers forwards to often have space to lead into and even numbers when the ball was on the ground.

This problem was no better shown in what was a pulsating last quarter. The Hawks had their chances to win it as they streamed forward and got their shots on goal. Which was good to see. However the inability of the midfield to work the other way when the ball turned over put undue pressure on the backline. Eventually this lack of defence would prove to be the Hawks downfall as they lost to a deserving Bombers side by 3 points.

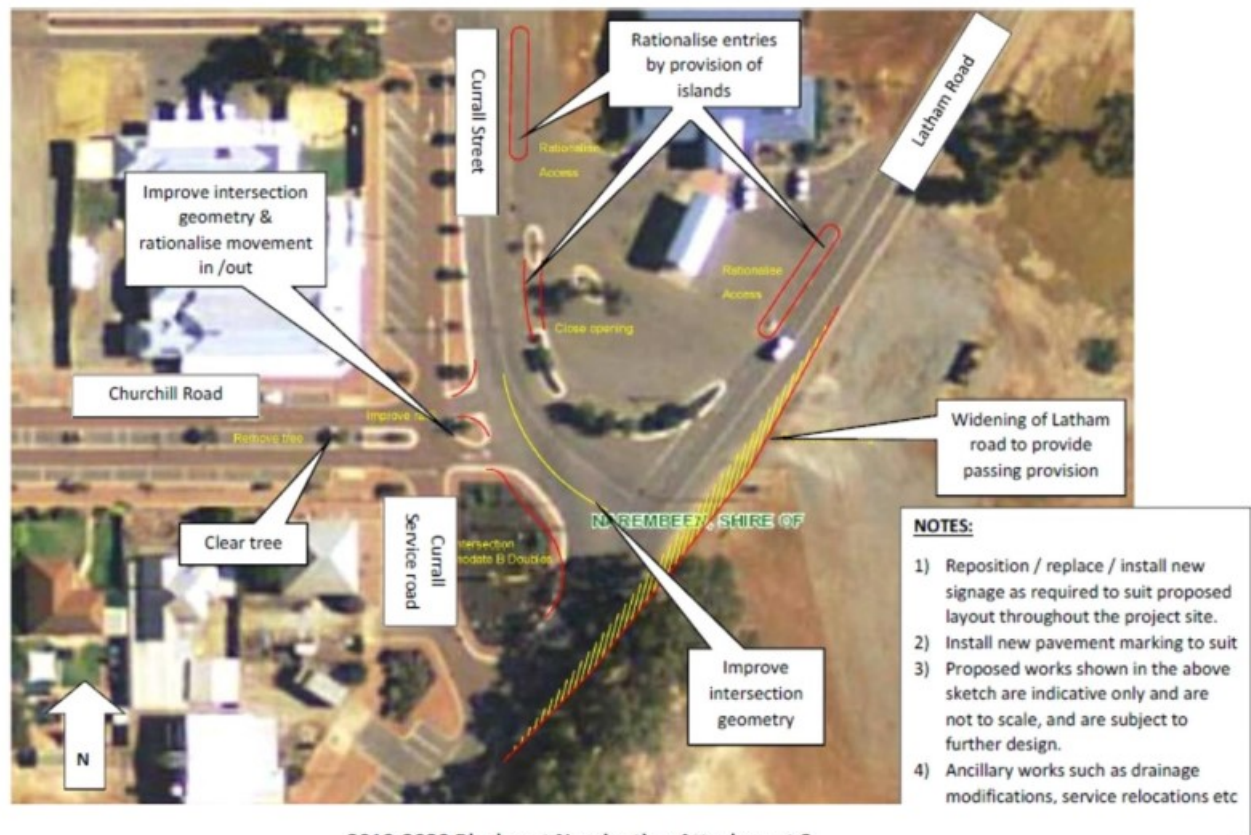

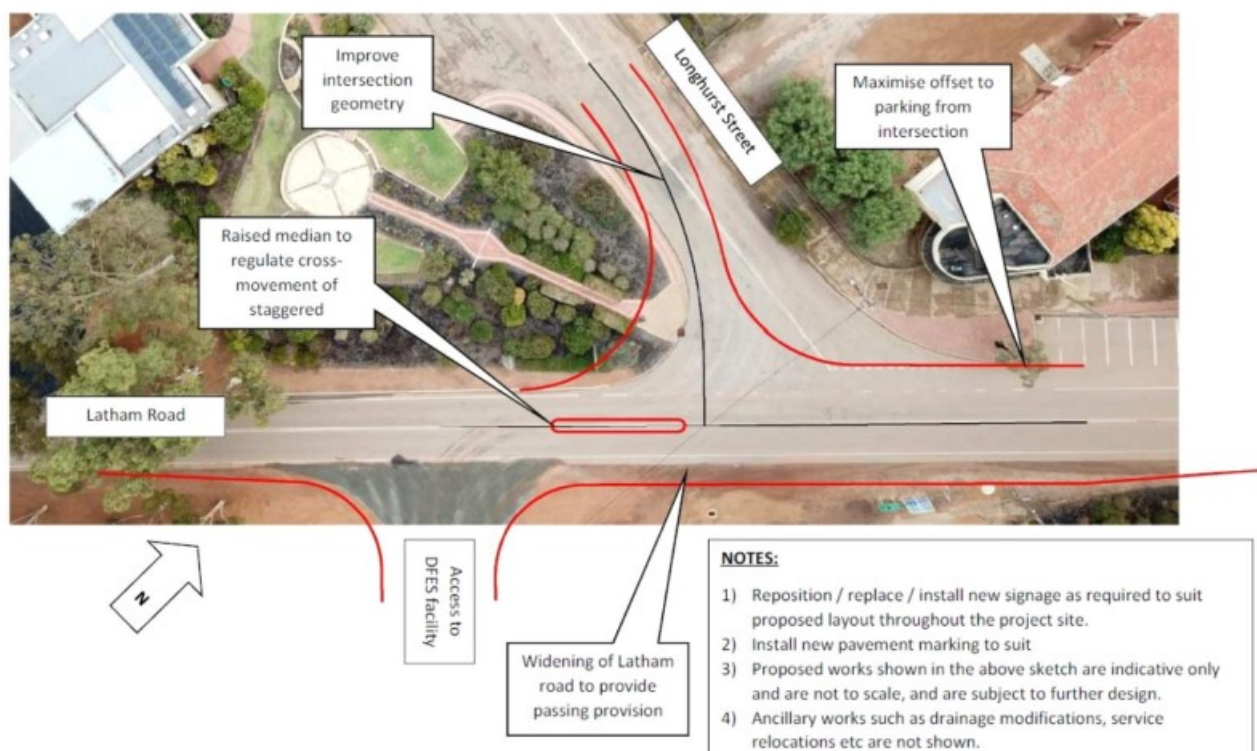

Spectacular Night Skies

We are smack bang in the middle of “Milky Way Season”! That’s because, during this time of year, we look towards the centre or core of our Milky Way Galaxy. It’s dense with stars and stretches across the dark night sky in country WA. Astrophotographers love it!

The Milky Way is best seen when there’s no moonlight and you’re away from bright city lights. What you’re looking for is a band of cloudy or dusty looking light that stretches in an arc from the south east to the south west. It looks like a cloud, but it’s actually billions of stars that make up the Milky Way Galaxy, our home in the Universe. Throughout August and September, the core or heart of the Milky Way is high in the southern sky.

Saturn returns to our evening skies and on the 12th will be right by the Moon with both shining brilliantly.

And to add to this cosmic spectacular, we have another meteor shower to enjoy. The Perseids meteor shower is generated from comet Swift-Tuttle and renowned for producing bright meteors. The shower peaks on the night of the 12th/13th of August but can be viewed several days either side of the peak. The best views will be under dark skies, after midnight. The further north you are in WA, the better you will see this meteor shower.

To See Saturn & the Moon: All night on the 12th, from the early evening, looking towards the eastern horizon.

Enjoy a bumper month of cosmic views.

COVID-19 reinfection period reduced from 12 weeks to 4 weeks

Western Australians who have recovered from COVID-19 will soon need to test again 28 days after recovery, if experiencing symptoms.

Fourth dose now available for more Western Australians

Fourth doses of COVID-19 vaccines are now encouraged for those 30 and over, three months after their last dose

This is in addition to the previous recommendations for a fourth dose, which remain in place for:

- all adults aged 65 years or older
- residents of aged care or disability care facilities
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 50 years or older
- people who are [severely immunocompromised \(external link\)](#) (this will be their fifth dose)
- people aged 16 years or older with [a medical condition \(external link\)](#) that increases the risk of severe COVID-19 illness
- people aged 16 years or older with disability, significant or complex health needs, or multiple comorbidities which increase the risk of a poor outcome.

People in these groups can walk-in without an appointment and get their fourth dose at COVID-19 vaccination clinics, and can receive a vaccination at GPs, pharmacies and Aboriginal Medical Services. Appointment

opportunities will increase appropriately as more people book in for their fourth dose.

ATAGI emphasised that people who have previously been infected with COVID-19 – irrespective of the variant – should continue to receive the recommended vaccination doses, as prior infection alone will not provide sufficient protection against severe disease.



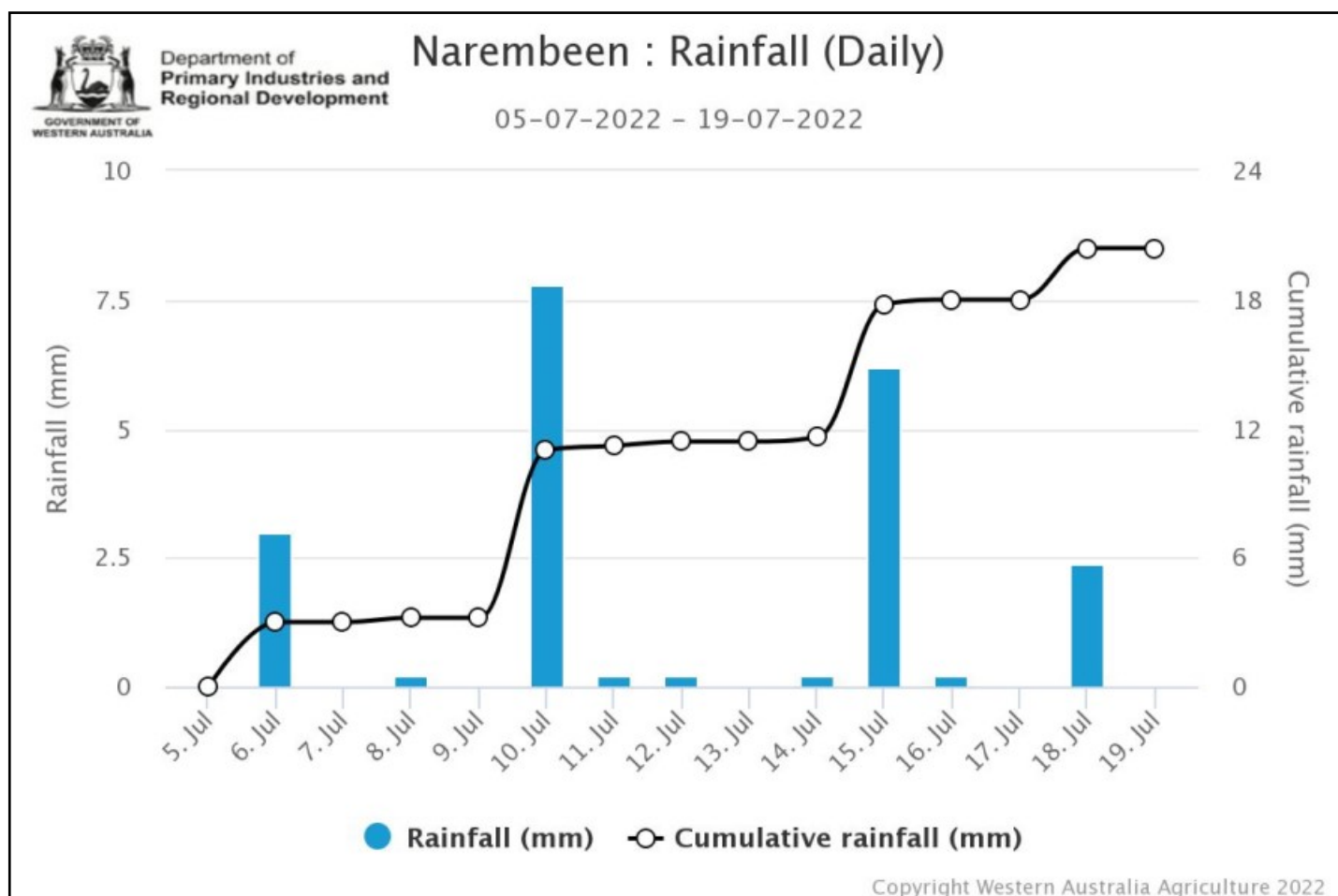
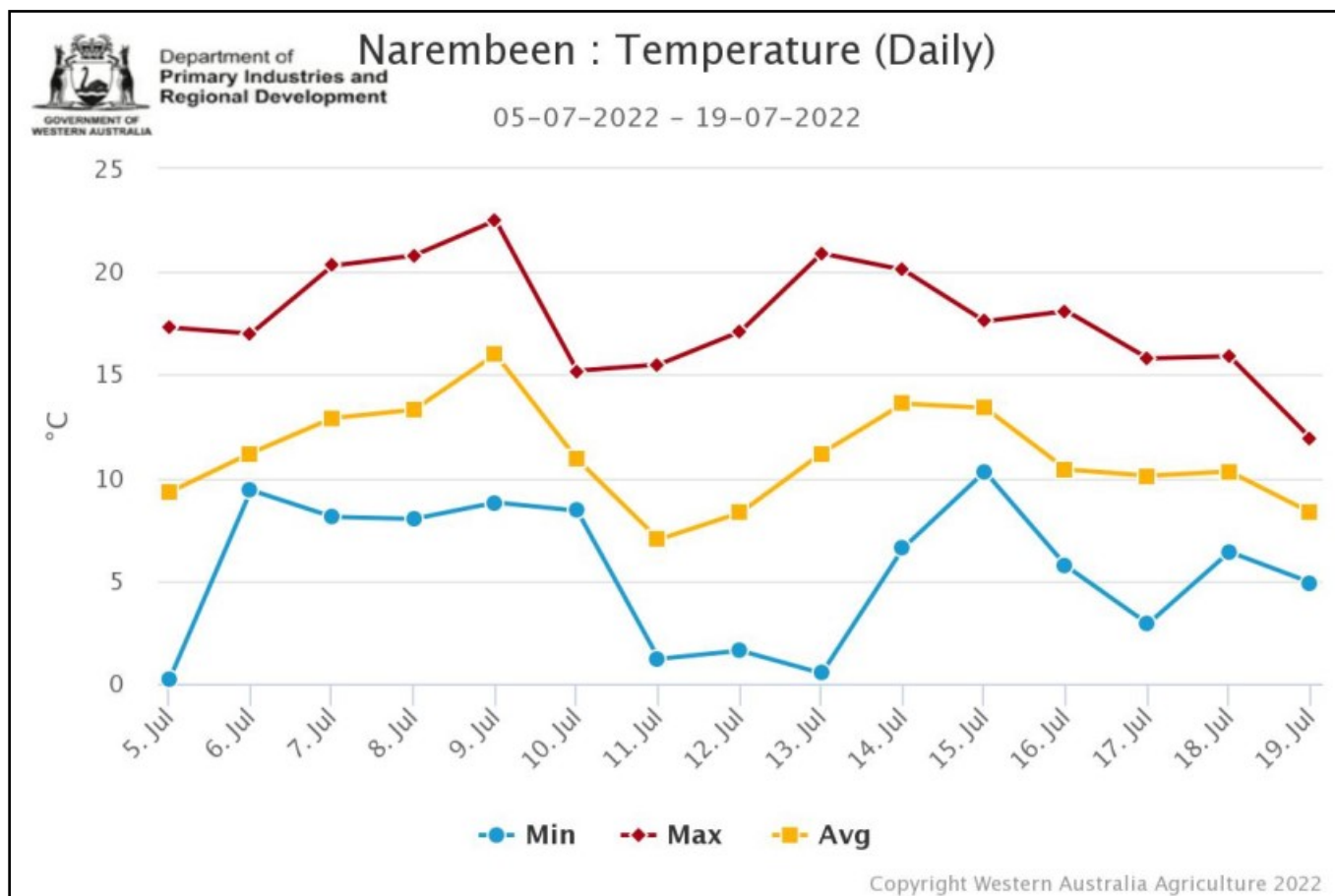
