Nursing staff and Telehealth GP Services will continue to be available for emergency situations at the Narembeen Hospital.

Dr Lines has been the GP in Narembeen for more than 21 years and Council would like to thank him for his years of dedicated and continued service to the Narembeen Community.

The Council will continue to work with Dr Lines to ensure ongoing medical services are provided to the Narembeen community.

DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION – PROPOSED OUTBUILDING 16 CHEETHAM WAY, NAREMBEEN

The owner of the abovementioned lot has lodged a planning application proposing to construct an outbuilding.

Under the Residential Design Codes the permitted aggregate size of an outbuilding on a lot is 60m² in floor area, with a 2.4 metre wall height and 4.2 metre ridge height.

The application entails a variation to the R Codes as the proposed wall height is 3.2 metres.

Prior to determining this application, the Shire would like to provide an opportunity for public comment on the proposal. The development plans can be viewed at the Shire of Narembeen administration office during office hours or on the Shire website.

Should you wish to make a submission on the proposal, your comments (in writing) will need to be lodged with Council within 14 days by 17 August 2022.

Please note, if no comments are received by the closure date, we will assume that you have no comment you wish to make and the application will be assessed and determined on its merits and without any further consultation.

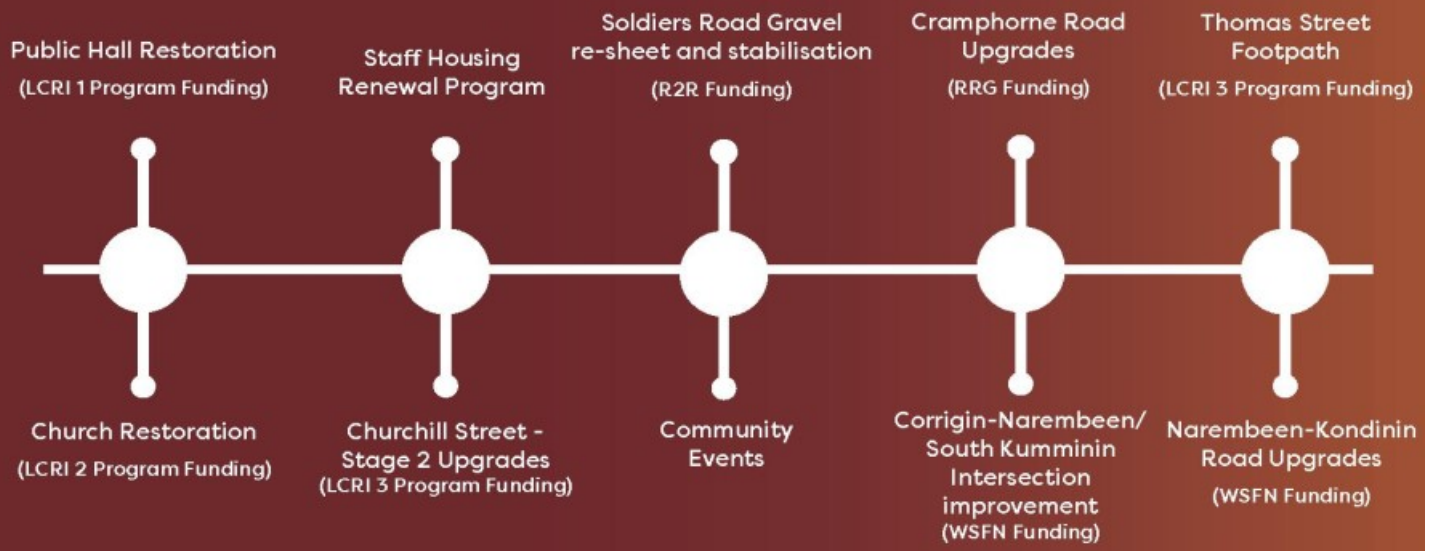

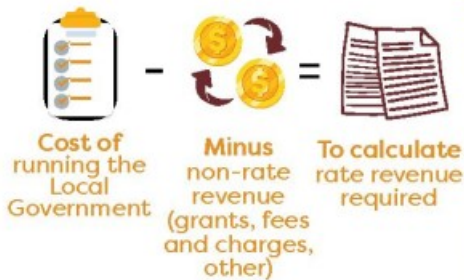

EMERGENCY SERVICES LEVY

This is a charge collected on behalf of the State Government to help fund Emergency Services. The State Government increased the ESL for 2022/2023 to \$93 per rates notice.

Mojo.....

Mojo is a funny word. I don't really know where it comes from but Google defines it as being a noun that is similar to a spell or magical charm. When applied to a sporting team it is used to describe the synergy between players, the connection they have to do all work together and be all on the same page, kind of like a spell I guess. In the two weeks since the country week bye the Hawks lost their mojo, they found it hard to work together, to be all on the same page. This can happen in a footy season, as a footy season is a marathon rather than a sprint. On Saturday over at Bruce Rock however they took steps towards getting their mojo back.

Into a stiff breeze the Hawks got on top early. Ben Hislop was back to his best through the middle of the ground and forwards such as Jimmy Kennedy and Jack Hilder were finding space to move into. The return of Hilder was important to the Hawks as it gave their forward line more variety and his ability to win the ball both above his shoulders and below his knees was a stand out. Part of the mojo of a team is their willingness to sacrifice. To give rather than receive. This was a highlight of their stirring win over Hyden before country week and started to return on Saturday against the Pies.

They waited when taking a set shot inside the arc and more than once they gave the ball off to a player in a better position. When the Pies won the ball forward they worked hard to get back and win it back as soon as possible. The numbers around the contest returned and once that was their it was obvious that the players were reviving the faith they had in each other in the first half of the year. Dave Mortimore continued a strong season across half back and Heath Spinks found his dare and risk taking as well. These are good signs.

Discipline is a big part of mojo as well. Showing in your actions, not just your words, that you can hold your composure for the good of the others around. This is a facet of work that has been lacking in the Hawks in the last weeks but they found it again on Saturday. They just kept working. If they were beaten in a contest they worked harder and harder and as a result they weren't beaten in many. Tougher for longer is a great footy cliché as it is often the factor that separates good sides, it played a big role for the Hawks in their win over the Pies on Saturday.

The scoreboard was always going to be irrelevant for the Hawks on Saturday. It was always going to be about how they played. Could they get their mojo back. Could they find again their method, system and sacrifice that had served them so well earlier in the year and set them up for a real crack at it. The good news is that found.....most of it. They started to work for each other again, started to attack off half back and started to find some space forward of the ball. It wasn't a perfect effort but it was an effort that sets them up to have as good a chance as any have to find their way to the promised land.

Value Adding.....

There's a concept in education, and perhaps in lots of other places, which is called value adding. Simply put it measures whether over the period that you have had a student in your class whether they have improved or not. Have you added value to them? It really should be a concept that country footy clubs use when assessing whether their recruits have been a success or not. Have they added value? For while winning is fun, no doubt, it's much more fun to bring in people who have a crack on the field and are good people off it. Who improve what you already have no matter how good it already is. Over the last couple of years the Narembeen Footy Club has been lucky to add some immense value.

Justin and Sharon Baldwin (Hooper) both grew up in Narembeen and to my knowledge both left in their early twenties. They then spent the best part of the next twenty years in the deep south of the state, primarily around Jerramungup, indeed a read of the Jerry Footy Honour Board will see the name Baldwin pop up numerous times. About four years ago they would return to the Been and have since bought a business and settled back in.

Justin was a tremendous country footballer in his day and spent some time at South Fremantle as well. After a couple of years of quietly watching JB has got involved in the footy club as an assistant coach. He has brought with him a level of what they call Footy IQ and the club is the better for it. This IQ shows clearly when ever JB runs a drill at training or talks to the players on game day. He has a way of imparting his understanding of the game in a manner that can't help but add value to the club and the players.

The arrival of the Baldwins saw their daughter Mel and her then boyfriend now fiancé Dean Williams soon follow suit. Dean, who brought his fledging plumbing business with him, is also a footballer and was quick to slip into the league side and commit to the club. Mel is a teacher and also a devoted and highly talented hockey player. Then the connections of the family brought the club Ben Hislop.

Hislop is a quality footballer and also a quality bloke. In his second year at the Hawks he has become a popular member of the group and being a country boy, Hislop is originally from Jerramungup, he had a clear understanding of how country footy and the clubs within work. This is what country footballers need, they need to bring in people who contribute on and off the field.

Then finally the connection of the Baldwins has brought the two Spinks boys to town. Connor, the older of the two, is an apprentice out at AFGRI and arrived early in 2021. He is a smooth moving footballer who no doubt has his best footy in front of him. Heath, younger by a couple of years, came to town to work for Uncle Justin this year and has been quick to become a key part of the league side. A tough big bodied defender Heath compliments what the Hawks have beautifully and, like his brother, at only nineteen has some great footy ahead of him. More importantly than all this though is the clear and obvious fact that both the Spinks boys are good fellahs who enjoy a laugh and are good to others, they bring great value.

Country footy clubs and the communities in which they exist need the stalwarts. We need the farming families than have been in town for a century. We need the businesses who have been going for almost as long. We need the players who play hundreds of games and the trainers that arrive every week. However we also need to add to what we have. We need new ideas, new faces and new talents. For it is when people that can bring these factors into a town and a footy club arrive that you know you have really added some value.

Standing up.....

There are times in the evolution of a group that they need to draw a line in the sand. They need to take on an identity that they are proud of and that means something. It is important that we let them know that, while they have a long way to go and we are all prepared to wait, they are on the right track and are doing well. For as famous Eagles coach once said 'the ox is slow but the earth is patient' which in another time simply means, these kids are alright.

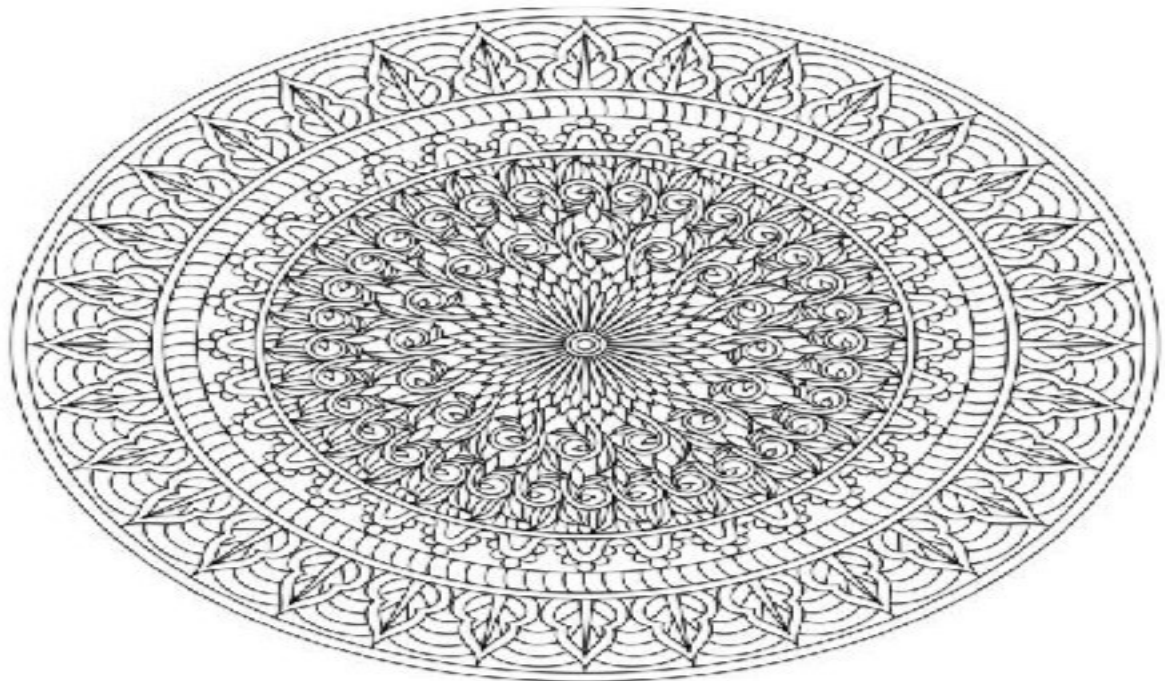

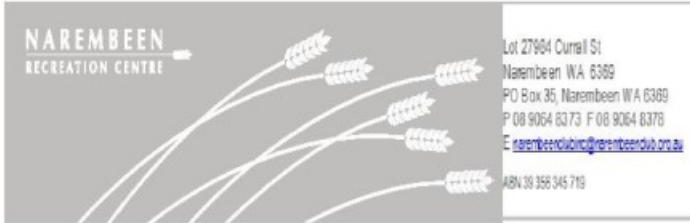

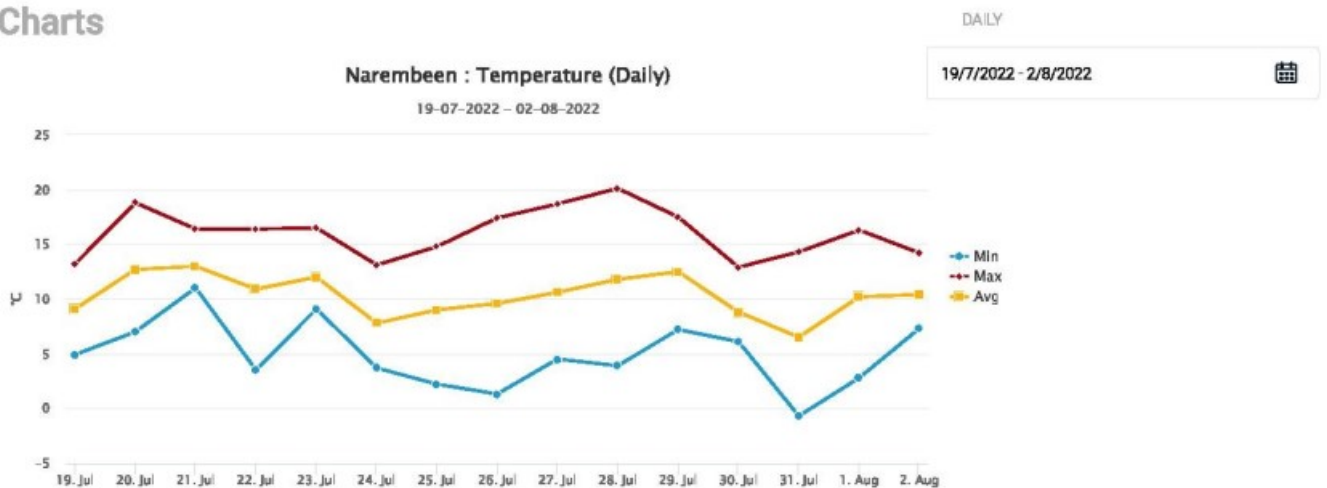
