RANGER REPORTS - CATS

There continues to be complaints and reports about wandering cats within the Shire.

Responsible and legal cat ownership requires all cats over six months to be sterilised, microchipped, and registered with the Shire of Narembeen.

Sterilisation is the most important thing you can do for these animals as this will protect native animal and ensure the problem does get worse. Letting stray cats breed and then contacting the Ranger Services to remove kittens is simply not sustainable.

Arrangements can be made with the Merredin Vet to sterilise cats and discounts are offered for those people who qualify financially. The RSPCA has a pet sterilisation program where they will pay 75% of the cost to sterilise your dog or cat if you hold an eligible concession.

Under the Cat Act it is an offence to give away kittens. The reason for this law is to ensure responsibility on the part of the owner as often a family receives a kitten, doesn't get it desexed as "it costs too much money" then lose interest in the kitten as it gets older. This can result the in the kitten becoming a feral animal.

It's a no-brainer that cats who are kept indoors are safe from the many dangers that free-roaming and "indoor/outdoor" cats face every time they set paw outside, including infectious and deadly diseases, speeding cars, loose dogs, and cruel people, to name a few. But keeping cats indoors has another safety "side effect"—it makes life easier and safer for wildlife, too.

For those of you having issues with feral cats, Shire of Narembeen owns a number of traps which are available for use.

Budget Allocation - Christmas Lights

Adoption of Community Wellbeing Plan (CWP) 2022-2024

The Narembeen CWP seeks to build resilience, improve health and wellbeing, and strengthen agency collaboration; in turn reducing the incidence of risky behaviours and potential harms associated with alcohol and other drug use within the community of Narembeen.

Rundle welcomes report to improve School Bus Services

Member for Roe, Peter Rundle, has welcomed the final report of the Student Transport Assistance Policy framework Inquiry which was tabled today.

"Over the past 12 months, every one of the members of the Public Accounts Committee has worked incredibly hard to understand and resolve the issues that have plagued this important government service for so many years.

"Two of the most difficult issues we as a committee had to resolve were around the policies of the nearest appropriate school, and the communication issues between parents, contractors and School Bus Services.

The committee has taken into account the social, economic, financial and community factors to recommend a degree of flexibility to families who live a similar distance from two or more schools.

"The committee recognised the need for this flexibility which I am sure families will appreciate as it often causes a lot of angst.

"The committee has recommended that the rules around the nearest appropriate school provide more flexibility for those in School Bus Services to apply some common sense and empathy to their decisions as well as the recommendation for a complaints process," Mr Rundle said.

"Open and positive communication channels with School Bus Services are critical to the success of any issue which is raised by parents and/or schools. I am pleased the committee emphasised the need for those involved in working through the issues to be able to work constructively for the best outcome."

While the final report has covered the issues well, Mr Rundle has felt the need to release a Minority Report which expresses his concerns about the contract system for bus owners and operators.

"My Minority Report states the need for Evergreen Contracts to be maintained. The reason for this is outlined in the report, however in short, I think the evergreen model reflects the circumstances of regional businesses most accurately.

"Regional bus services are small to medium businesses owned by operators in the towns they service. The owners and drivers know the families, know the local environment and have always worked with the schools to ensure the safety and welfare of the children on their runs.

"I was pleased the Committee saw fit to maintain the relocation of current contracts. It has worked so well for so long, I see no need to change this unique system for the sake of a government policy".

Country Stargazing

with Carol Redford and Donna Vanzetti, Astrotourism WA

The Big Three! Saturn, Jupiter & the Moon!

This month, stargazers are in for a treat as the two gas giants, Saturn and Jupiter, take to the skies and are joined by the Moon, to make for a stargazing spectacle! All three are bright and brilliant in the night sky and worth noting in the diary for a 'sneaky stargazing binge!

On the 8th, Saturn is making a close approach to the Moon! If you've never seen Saturn before, now is the PERFECT time to find the ringed giant, just look for the bright star next to the Moon! The following night, the Moon will be underneath Saturn.

To see Saturn & the Moon: 8th September from 6pm, looking to the eastern horizon.

On the 11th, brilliant Jupiter will be just below the full Moon so easy to spot, and on the 26th, Jupiter will reach opposition, becoming it's biggest and brightest all year.

To see Jupiter & the Moon: The conjunction when Jupiter and the Moon appear close together is on the 11th and opposition is on the 26t, in the east at sunset, through to west at sunrise.

What is Opposition? In astronomy, opposition means a planet is opposite the sun. So, for example, the planets with orbits inside Earth's orbit (Mercury and Venus) can't be at opposition. But the planets orbiting outside Earth's orbit, can. At opposition, a planet is easiest to observe because it's generally closest to Earth and visible throughout the night. Credit: Earthsky.org

Elders shared night sky stories and students interpreted the stories which were then

designed and printed onto two planispheres. Communities came together to celebrate the launch of the planispheres with the plan to develop Aboriginal Astrotourism. It was held out at the magical Yorkrakine Hall and the night sky was spectacular.



STUDENT ATTENDANCE WE ARE BACK NAGGING ABOUT GETTING KIDS TO SCHOOL ... IT 'S NOT OK TO BE AWAY!!

Attendance Matters!



One week we have the department asking us to share a letter from the three leaders of the three education sectors about staying COVID safe and keeping your child/ren at home if they are showing cold or flu symptoms, and the next I am on a Webex with all Principals from the Wheatbelt Region, being told we must lift attendance levels to pre-COVID levels. Just another day in the life of a worker in a large bureaucracy! All schools have been hit with COVID and this has had an affect on our attendance percentages, usually between 93% and 96%, which is highly satisfactory. Currently our attendance rate is just below 90% and dropping. I can now say, we want the students back at school unless they are unwell, as in fever or flu, a runny nose is back to being just a runny nose. Obviously, students also must stay home if they have COVID. We need to get back to the understanding that EVERY DAY AWAY FROM SCHOOL HAS FLOW ON EFFECTS ON LEARNING. Most of our students have already had a minimum of one week out due to COVID and we need to make sure that this is not compounded by other absences that are not essential.

The day will start with the jumps and throws at 9:00am and you have already had all of the information home. Students are to go straight to the oval on the day of the carnival, buses will deliver directly to the oval. All students must be there 15 minutes prior to their first jump or throw event. A jump and throw schedule was sent home with the excursion paper work for your information, and it is also attached to this email. PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE AGE THEY COMPETE IN IS THEIR AGE AS OF DECEMBER 31 2022, so if they are 7 years old right now, but turn 8 any time between now and December 31 2022, say in November, then they compete in the 8 years events, not the 7 years events. All students, regardless of ability will be involved in the set events:

6 - 10 year olds: long jump; 50m or 80m depending on age and flag race.

11 - 12 year olds: long and triple jump; 100m and 200m.

Students need to be in their school uniform, ready to compete with shorts or a skort, their maroon or gold t-shirt and school jumper/jacket and track pants for in between events. They will need their recess, snack food and a water bottle, no cool drink or sports drinks will be allowed in the bays. Students will be able to join their parents for lunch ©. 
