BREAST CANCER



Common symptoms:



Lumps and bumps

A lump or hard area in your breast or underarm, especially if it is only on one side.



Unusual dimpling or rashes

Change in the look of your breast, like: your skin looks like the skin of an orange, your skin looks and feels different in one area, redness or rash.



Changes to the nipple

Changes to the nipple, like: it's pulled inwards, leaking, itchy or has a sore that won't heal.



Pain or swelling

Breast pain or discomfort, especially if it is only on one side.




A change in size

A change in the size, shape or feel of your breast.

Get to know your breasts and what is normal for you. If you notice any of these symptoms or unusual changes, talk to a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker without delay.

If you have a symptom, it does not mean you have breast cancer. Often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious. However, it is important to get these symptoms or any unusual changes in your body checked out just in case.

Part 3 COMMUNITY continued

What types of services were provided in Narembeen and if so, who managed them?

Travel by train to Merredin to meet Kalgoorlie Express to Perth. Two banks, milk delivered daily. Saddlery, our own electricity (power house). Two garages, Bootmaker, Men's hairdresser and barber, also Billiard Saloon (males only), Hospital and Chemist, Hotel, Tea Rooms. Pastry Shop. Local people owned most businesses. School and school buses (1939), Blacksmiths and Horse shoeing, Timber yard. Post Office, Police Station, Stock Agents.



What memories do you have of local community events and social activities and what was your favourite social activity?

Community events were Fancy Dress Balls each year. We all enjoyed this and all had to dance. There was always a community Christmas Tree, everyone received a present. At New Year a Sports and Horseracing Day at the old sports ground. The Brass Band played in the street a lot of Sunday mornings. Old Time Dances, Picture shows, picnics. My favourite was the Fancy Dress Ball.

What products were unavailable from the local shop in your days? E.g. milk, sugar and bread.

In my childhood there were more shops in Narembeen than now. We had our own Bakery, Butchers, Food store, Pastry shop, Vegetable shop. Milk was always delivered from the dairy. Two Grocery shops. Ice-cream and cool drinks were sold from the Vegetable shop so food was not a problem but, no luxury foods like today. When war came some foods were rationed, as were clothes.

Compare the prices of products when you were a child to today? E.g. Tea, coffee and Iollies.

Very hard to compare because wages were so low. Food also was low priced compared to todays prices. Money value—Pounds, Schillings and Pence.

Bread—3 pennies per loaf, Tea ½lb—2 shillings, Ice-cream—1 penny for a cone, Lollies—mixed small bag 1 penny, Milk (delivered) - I think 5 pennies per pint. (one pound was equal to 20 shillings, one shilling was equal to 12 pence) We kept our own chooks for eating and eggs and grew vegetables.

What type of transport did you have access to?

Horse and cart, bikes, train travel. Horse riding. Some people (not many) had cars. When school buses came we travelled in them to sports days etc.

What was your favourite mode of transport and why?

Bike and train. The bike meant I could go so many places and the train meant we were going to Perth on holidays.

What was the hardest type of transport to use and why?

Horse and cart. As horses needed a lot of attention such as harnessing to cart, feeding and watering, brushing down and feeding on return home.

What occupations were available in the community?

Shop work. Office work. Domestic work. Nurses could do part of their training at the local hospital.

As a child what kind of dreams did you have?

If I had a choice, I would have liked to do something with music, such as singing, dancing. Music (piano) but there was no money for that, also travel to other countries, which I did later in life.



What was the most popular job in Narembeen when you were young and why?

The Post Office, Railway Station, Moppett's Bus and Garage, Col Commons all employed people. The main jobs were working in the two grocery stores who employed girls and young men. The Shire also employed office girls, Banks (2). It was more interesting working in the shops, meeting people they also they sold clothes as well.

How many businesses were running in Narembeen when you left school and what was the most successful and why?

Probably 12-14 and I do not know if any businesses were very successful in 1943 as it was war time and most things were just surviving with no young men in the district. Lots of the young women '18 plus' were in the Services too.



October Historical Society Highlights

It was great to see such a good attendance at last Monday's meeting with 15 people present.

The main points from the day were: The Post Office Cart – we need to research the purpose of this item further so a story can be displayed telling of the uses for the cart. Maurie Harper will assist as he has a lot of knowledge in this regard having spent years working on the railways in conjunction with mail deliveries. The Charge Table from the Police Station has had a polish and is now in the Sports Room. Thank you Kellie and Ian.

The Older Adults Day at the School was a great success according to those members who attended. They also reported on the very high standard of behaviour of the children and we must mention the most elaborate morning tea served in the staff room. The Old Church is looking much better after a large amount of restorative work and we look forward to its reopening next year. We have had a request for information regarding Prisoners of War who worked on farms in the district following World War 2. A beautiful certificate was donated by Hazel Toovey.

This was in recognition of the voluntary work done by her father Mr Bert French during World War 2. Being an employee of CBH he, along with others in essential services was manpowered. Many of these people gave their time and energies to assist from home. The Spotters Post (now our War Museum) was used as a base to watch for enemy planes. The certificate will be framed and hung in this museum. It is pleasing to see the School and the Historical Society interacting so much. Lorraine Lethlean will show a student through the War Museum in the next week to enable the completion of an assignment involving this and other venues including the Grain Discovery Centre.

Visitors continue to request information on their families, farm locations etc. Recently these have included Lynise (nee Jackson) and Ross O'Dowd, The Marshall and Timms family whose connections farmed near the Ski Lake, the Savage Family researching on behalf of the Luck Family who were near Hedges and Boundary Roads and the Beatty Family, relatives of the Barlows who had Barlows Store in Churchill Street – the first store in town. Thank you to all who allowed the visitors on to their properties and made them welcome.

After a busy year we look forward to our pre Christmas lunch following a short meeting on November 21st at 11am at the History Centre.



FIRE BREAK ORDER 2022/2023

Pursuant to the powers contained in Section 33 of *Bushfire Act 1954*, you are hereby required on or before **31 October 2022** to plough, scarify, cultivate, spray or otherwise clear and thereafter maintain free of all inflammable maters until **15 April 2023** firebreaks in the following dimensions on the land owned or occupied by you.

Rural Land

Firebreaks 2.5 metres wide as follows:

Immediately adjacent to and surrounding all cleared land subdividing all cleared land into areas no greater than 400 hectares. Surrounding each building, haystack, fuel dump or ramp.

Townsite Land

Firebreaks 2.0 metres as follows:

Vacant lots in excess of 1,025 sq metres as follows:

- All lots containing less than 2,025 sq metres on boundaries and immediately surrounding all buildings.
- Remove all flammable material from fuel dumps or liquid fuel containers to a distance of 15 metres.

The penalty for failing to comply with this Notice is a fine not exceeding \$5000 and a person in default is also liable whether prosecuted or not to pay the costs of performing the work directed by this Notice if it is not carried out by the owner and/or occupier by the date required by this Notice.

Several topics were discussed including housing, transport and healthcare.

We were also proud to share with Mia the fantastic achievement of the Narembeen District High School being a finalist in the WA Education Awards 2022 in the Excellence in Teaching and Learning (Primary) category.





Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start.

They provide important information so you can take action to protect yourself and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of a bushfire. You need to understand the Fire Danger Rating to assess your level of bushfire risk and decide what actions to take.

The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) levels are:

Moderate: Plan and prepare.

Most fires can be controlled. Stay up to date and be alert for fires in your area.

High: Be ready to act.

Fires can be dangerous. Decide what you will do if a fire starts. Leave bushfire risk areas if necessary.

Extreme: Take action now to protect your life and property.

Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous. Put your bushfire plan into action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, plan to leave early.

Catastrophic: For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas.

These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire. Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions and if a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost. Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.

When there is minimal risk, Fire Danger Ratings will be set to 'No Rating'. On these days you still need to remain alert and abide by local seasonal laws and regulations.

Fire Danger Ratings and Bushfire Warnings

When a bushfire starts, things can change in a matter of minutes so it's important to stay up to date through official information sources.

During a bushfire, emergency services will provide you with as much information as possible, but no system is foolproof. If you believe you are in danger, act immediately to stay safe and do not wait for a warning.

If you see smoke or flames call Triple Zero (000) and put your bushfire plan into action immediately.

Bushfire warning levels change to reflect the increasing risk to your life or property, and the decreasing amount of time you have until the fire arrives.

The warning levels for bushfires are:

Advice

Watch and Act

Emergency Warning

SHIRE OF NAREMBEEN BUSHFIRE NOTICE – 2022/2023 SEASON
Bush Fires Act 1954

Notice to all owners and/or occupiers of land situated within Shire of Narembeen

As a measure to assist in the control of bush fires, or preventing the spread or extension of a bush fire which may occur, notice is hereby given to all owners and/or occupiers of land within the Shire of Narembeen that pursuant to the powers conferred in *Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act*, works in accordance with the requisitions of this notice must be carried out before the 1st day of November in each year, or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier of land if after that date. All work specified in this Notice is to be maintained up to and including the 30th day of April in the following calendar year.

Definitions

"Town site land" means all land within the boundary of the Narembeen Townsite.

"Rural Land" means all land within the Narembeen District not defined as Townsite.

"Firebreak Period" means that time between the 1st day of November in any year until the 30th day of April in the year following.

"Firebreak" means ground from which flammable material has been removed and on which no flammable materials is permitted during the firebreak period.

All owners or occupiers of land within the Narembeen Shire shall have firebreaks during the firebreak period of the dimensions prescribed within this notice.

If it is considered impractical or undesirable to provide firebreaks as required by this notice, the approval of the Council must be obtained for any variation. Approval will only be granted up to or before the 15th day of October, and will not be granted unless prior consent of the appropriate Fire Brigade Officer has been obtained.

Fire Breaks

Rural Land:

Firebreaks 2.5 metres wide as follows:

 Immediately adjacent to and surrounding all cleared land subdividing all cleared land into areas no greater than 400 hectares. Surrounding each building, haystack, fuel dump or ramp.

Townsite Land:

Firebreaks 2.0 metres as follows;

- Vacant lots in excess of 1,025 sq metres as follows;
- All lots containing less than 2,025 sq metres on boundaries and immediately surrounding all buildings.
- Remove all flammable material from fuel dumps or liquid fuel containers to a distance of 15 metres.

In addition to the requirements of this Notice, you may be required to carry out further works which are considered necessary by an Authorised Officer and specified by way of a separate written notice forwarded to the address of the owner/s as shown on the Shire of Narembeen rates record for the relevant land.

TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to Section 33(4) of the Bush Fires Act 1954, where the owner and/or occupier of land fails or neglects to comply with the requisitions of this Notice within the times specified, the Shire of Narembeen may by its officers and with such servants, workmen and contractors, vehicles and machinery as the officers deem fit, enter upon the land and carry out the requisitions of this Notice which have not been complied with and pursuant to Section 33(5) of the Bush Fires Act, the amount of any costs and expenses incurred may be recovered from you as the owner and or occupier of the land.

If the requirements of this Notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

The **PENALTY FOR FAILING TO COMPLY** with this Notice is a fine not exceeding \$5000 and a person in default is also liable whether prosecuted or not to pay the costs of performing the work directed by this Notice if it is not carried out by the owner and/or occupier by the date required by this Notice.

Additional Bushfire Information

A. Restricted / Prohibited Burning Period

The following restricted and prohibited burning times are in place for the Shire of Narembeen.

- · Restricted (Permit Required) 19th September to 31st October
- Prohibited 1st November to 31st January
- Restricted (Permit Required) 1st February to 15th April

The following additional requirements for burning are also in place.

- 1st February includes grass and raked cereal stubble and header windrows of non-cereal stubble including canola and legumes.
- 1st March is header windrows and chaff dumps and cereal stubble fires.

Burning during restricted periods is allowed on Sunday's and Public Holidays with a permit.

Any questions about burning times should be directed to a Fire Control Officer or the Shire Office.

B. Harvest & Movement Bans

When Harvest Bans are instigated they are broadcast over Radiowest and ABC radio. A harvest ban can be in two forms:

- A Restricted Movement Ban means that vehicles are only allowed to move on paddocks to water stock.
- A Total Movement Ban means that there is to be no movement on paddocks at all.

The Shire of Narembeen imposes an automatic Harvest Ban on Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Harvest bans are gauged not only on the temperature, but also on humidity and wind velocity and are monitored using scientific methods.

Community members may call the Shire's **Harvest Ban Hotline on (08) 9064 7689** which will provide advice on whether or not a harvest ban is in force.

E. Key Dates & Information to Remember for Burning

Grass Burning

- Grass Burning is not permitted prior to 1st February
- · Grass Burning is subject to Permit Conditions
- · No time restrictions for lighting/burning
- Burning permitted on Sundays or Public Holidays under permit

Raked Windrows

Burning of stubble raked windrows is permitted at the commencement of the Restricted Burning Period, provided:

- No time restrictions for lighting/burning
- Subject to normal permit conditions

Cereal Header Windrows & Chaff Dump

- Burning of Cereal Header Windrows & Chaff Dumps is not permitted prior to 1st March under permit.
- Chaff Dumps shall be deposited/located no less than 50 metres from the edge of the crop within your property boundary.
- Chaff Dumps be pushed out to reduce burning times
- Consideration should be given to neighbours regarding wind and smoke directions.
- Non-Cereal Header Windrows

Non-Cereal Header Windrows

- Burning of Non-Cereal Header Windrows and Chaff Dumps is not permitted prior to 1st February under permit.
- Chaff Dumps shall be deposited/located no less than 50 metres from the edge of the crop within your property boundary.
- Chaff Dumps be pushed out to reduce burning times.
- Consideration should be given to neighbours regarding wind and smoke directions.

1st February includes grass and raked cereal stubble and header windrows of non-cereal stubble including canola and legumes

Stubble Burning

- Burning of Stubble is not permitted prior to 1st March in normal season conditions.
- No lighting times.
- Weather permitting.
- Subject to permit conditions.


