

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


Kerry Fricker on behalf of Rosemary Smoker thanked the Committee for allowing Dorcas and Rosemary to be involved in such an important project.

Hello.

Hope everyone is well.

On 27 May, we assisted Southern Cross Police with a Misuse of Drugs Act search warrant in the townsite. Police located a quantity of amphetamines, cannabis, smoking implements and unlicensed ammunition. An adult male and female were charged with various illicit drug related charges.

With a high volume of towed agricultural implements on the roads in the Wheatbelt Police District, please be aware of your responsibilities in relation to the the legal requirements for moving agricultural vehicles and implements based on width, length and height. The Towed Agricultural Implements Summary Reference Chart hasn't changed for some time.





Preparing Students for a Changing Work

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2023



This week all classes will be involved in activities to ensure that our students understand the aim of reconciliation to ensure a more just, equitable and reconciled country for all. We will be encouraging them to be a voice for reconciliation in tangible ways every day, where we live, work, and socialise. Hannah Chitty has organised another whole school art project and our teachers have accessed many activities to ensure the message is understood. We are a multicultural school, and one of our many aims is to ensure that we are culturally responsive and inclusive to all.

The National Reconciliation Week 2023 theme, "Be a voice for generations" calls on all Australians to act today to tackle the unfinished business of reconciliation. Generations of Australians have fought hard for meaningful change, but more effort is needed to create a just, equitable and reconciled Australia. Reconciliation is all about building a better nation. A more united Australia that respects and takes pride in 65,000 years of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, histories, stories, and achievements. An Australia that believes in the right of First Nations peoples to make decisions about their lives and their communities. An Australia that stands opposed to racism, inequity, and injustice. To be a voice for reconciliation today means the start of real change tomorrow. It means amplifying the calls of past generations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples that have fought hard and paved the way.

National Reconciliation Week, May 27 2023 to June 3 2023, is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for Reconciliation Week are the same every year as they commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey, the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

May 27 1967: On this day, Australia's most successful referendum saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census.

June 3 1992: On this day, the Australian High Court delivered the Mabo decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo's challenge to the legal fiction of 'terra nullius' (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. This decision paved the way for Native Title.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds, and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

CROSS COUNTRY 2023

What ideal conditions for a cross country afternoon! Most of our students committed themselves to our standard of working with heart and resilience to finish a tough activity, that many find quite difficult, our cross-country event. The smaller age groups certainly stole the show with some outstanding running, and great times, with not a single runner stopping at any stage. It was unfortunate that some runners, in the later girl's events stopped to walk, an indication that they did not commit to the event and the preparation prior to the day, and it has been a long time since we have seen this! The standard we set is for all our students and next year, perhaps we need to increase our preparation so that they are well and truly fit enough to complete the 2 or 2.5km courses. That said, there were many runners on the course who struggled but never once stopped or walked. Angela Andrews in Year 9 may be a gun in the netball circle as a shooter, however she doesn't love cross country, but she did it and she never walked and never gave up! How about Zayne Tyler, I rode with him the whole time and there was never a thought that he might stop. Mason Kuhne-Munroe will let you know that he really hates cross country, but he was doing fine, and then fell about halfway through, skinned knees and hands resulting. He got up, dusted himself off, and then finished the course. It is these moments that make the hard work worthwhile, these times that we know that this is building our students up for success, giving them the resilience to complete a tough assignment, to not give up, to not find excuses to not finish. There were of course, some outstanding runs, Noah Smoker continues to shine in all areas of sport and his 7.05 for 2km was amazing.

Congratulations again to Maroon on taking out the Stirrat Family Cross Country shield again, remaining the only faction to have their name on this particular shield .. but there were only 13 points in it this year.

For most of the students, that is it, cross country training for the year is done and they can start to do other activities in their PE and fitness sessions. For our interschool competitors, and they are the medallion winners (with some run offs to be done due to illness, injuries or educational absence to be done in some events), training will continue during TAG this week Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, and then next Monday and Tuesday.

The Combined Schools Cross Country will be on held on Friday June 9 2023 at Bruce Rock. Parents of team members will receive the paperwork for this excursion very shortly (after we complete the run offs – gold and silver medallists are definitely in, the third place getter in some events will be run off against those who were absent on the day.

DO YOU KNOW WHAT YOUR CHILD IS DOING ONLINE

Gaming, group chats, snap chat, insta, the list goes on. It is apparent that screens are here to stay, how you work your screen time out with your child/ren is obviously up to you. We have put lots of suggestions in the Newsletter over the years and there is an overabundance of really great information online for parents, and it is all evidence based and all says the same thing – keep your kids active and keep screen time down! Knowing what your child is doing online, what they are saying, how they are saying it and who they are saying it to, is something that you all, as parents, should know. Do we all know if our teenagers are actually getting off devices and going to sleep if we are allowing them to have connectivity devices in their bedrooms???

Some advice from my research, mainly from Susan Mclean, who was Australia's foremost expert in the area of cyber safety and young people, she was the first Victorian Police Officer appointed to a position involving cyber safety and young people. Her three key take home points are:

"Keep all digital devices out of the bedroom!"

"Be a parent, not a friend"

"Don't let your child do anything online that you wouldn't let them do offline"

Susan McLean's Top Tips for Cyber Safety

- ✓ Lead by example
- ✓ Be your child's best parent, not their best friend
- ✓ Get comfortable with saying, 'no'
- ✓ Understand the difference between 'need' and 'want'
- ✓ Keep all technology out of the bedroom
- ✓ Know your children's passwords (but don't stalk them)
- ✓ Do not share passwords
- ✓ Keep channels of communication open
- ✓ Have a 'family contract' so children understand boundaries
- ✓ Use all security settings
- ✓ Learn about technology
- ✓ Do not disclose personal information online
- ✓ Shoulder surf watch what your kids are doing
- ✓ Only let your children communicate with people they know in real life
- ✓ Know when your child is online and offline

We were not born into the era of tablets, smart phones ... or even mobile phones. Susan McLean makes it clear that we will, as modern parents, be challenged by our kids. "You don't know anything about this stuff", "But all my friends have their own YouTube channel!", "I don't want you invading my privacy" are the type of comments we should expect our kids to throw at us.

However, we should not be afraid to upset our children. It doesn't matter if they like you. "Be the parent. Make the important decisions," says McLean.

This includes knowing what they do online, controlling and restricting their access to digital devices and making sure what they see and do online is age-appropriate and suitable for them ... because nobody knows your child as well as you do.

Teenagers may try to get you to 'break the rules', give them access to apps they are too young to subscribe to, allow them to play on their iPad in their bed, "but if you don't hear them shout, 'I hate you', at least once or twice - or once a week - you're probably not doing your job properly," says McLean.

Don't give in to your children just so they will be 'liked' by you. Make the right choices to keep your child safe. Be the good parent not the good friend.



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

The young fellah bought what I was selling and moved on. As I sat having my beer after umpiring on the weekend it was a phrase that ran through my sizeable suede again. So, we don't make the same mistakes.

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
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
