



Avoca Farm - Dispose or Retain

Background

The Shire of Narembeen acquired Avoca farm in 1996 and since that time the buildings have slowly deteriorated with some falling into disrepair. In recent years historical farm implements have been placed there on display but are also slowing deteriorating as they are exposed to the elements. Over the ensuring years several actions have been taken including:

- 1. Preparation of a Conservation Management Plan (2006).
- 2. An agreement to allow Go Narembeen to undertake its annual fundraising cropping program.
- 3. Preparation of a draft Structure Plan to allow for the development of small rural lots (1.0 to 1.6 ha) and future residential expansion north of the townsite.

Council recently discussed the future of Avoca Farm and potential options to maximise its benefits to the community, some of which could include:

- Leave the property as it is, fence off the buildings and remove items as they become dangerous.
- 2. Fix up the buildings.
- 3. Remove all the buildings and machinery.
- 4. Remove the buildings and machinery leaving a footprint and install signage recognising the site and the buildings.
- 5. Dispose of the property by public tender
- 6. Undertake a subdivision including the creation of some small rural holdings lots.

If you would like additional information/detail on the above proposals please contact the Acting CEO Ben Forbes at the Shire Office

Council is interested to hear from community members with their views on what you think should happen with Avoca Farm in the short to long term and members of the community are encouraged to provide comment on any of the above proposals or other alternatives or options for the property.

ENROLLING TO VOTE

You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the in-person local government election on 21 October 2023 if you live in or are an owner or occupier od rateable property in the district of the Shire of Narembeen.

Residents

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5.00pm 25 August 2023 for the district of the Shire of Narembeen If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll but meet the eligibility criteria to be on the Roll, a claim for enrolment can be made to any Divisional Returning Officer of the Australian Electoral Commission in Western Australia. Forms are available from all post Offices or the Western Australian Electoral Commission and must be completed and reach a Divisional Returning Officer by 5.00pm Friday 25 August 2023.

Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the district of the Shire of Narembeen and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote and should make an enrolment application to the Shire of Narembeen. If you are not on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the district of the Shire of Narembeen, you may be eligible to enrol to vote if you were on the Shire of Narembeen's last electoral roll prior to May 1996. Please contact the Shire for details. Owners of land who were on the last roll of the Shire of Narembeen continue to retain that status until they cease to own the rateable property for which the enrolment relates.

Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Narembeen to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next 3 months following the date of application to enrol.

Joint Owners and Occupiers

If a rateable property is owner or occupied by more than two people, a majority of the owners/occupiers may nominate two persons from amongst themselves who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Corporations

A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Enrolment Forms

Enrolment forms can be obtained from the Shire of Narembeen or Australian Electoral Commission offices and should be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer at Shire of Narembeen by 5.00pm Friday 25 August 2023. If you registered for the 2021 elections or since that time you do not need to register.

NATIONAL DAY OF ACTION AGAINST BULLYING AND VIOLENCE.


We have registered this year to be a part of this day, one that in the past has clashed with other events. We like to think that bullying does not take place at our school, but unfortunately, you cannot put 143 students in one environment and not have it! What we have strived to do in the past decade, is keep bullying to an absolute minimum and educate our students in actions to take against bullying and to remember, that if you standby and let it occur and take no action, you are guilty by association. We need all of our students to know that it is unacceptable and to continue to take a strong stance against it. We also need them to remember that telling an adult about bullying that may be occurring is NOT DOBBING, IT IS HELPING SOMEONE WHO IS IN TROUBLE. The NDA is Australia's key bullying prevention initiative for schools, encouraging whole-school communities to work together to implement evidence-informed positive and proactive solutions to prevent and address bullying. From this year onwards, the NDA is permanently moving to the third Friday in August. In 2023, this will be Friday August 18 2023.

The NDA is an opportunity to create a shared understanding of what is bullying and remind all about our bullying prevention policies. The NDA theme for 2023 is 'growing connections'. This theme supports research findings that strong school community connections and social skills are protective factors in the prevention of bullying and help enable positive, help-seeking behaviours.

The 2023 NDA theme, 'growing connections', promotes the importance of student connectedness and **sense of belonging**, **helping students to feel accepted**, **respected**, **included and supported**. Research has shown that strong school community connections are protective factors in the prevention of bullying and enable positive help-seeking behaviours in students.

On this date, every class will complete an activity from the school event tool kit, and we know it will be a timely reminder to all of our students that bullying is an insidious damaging action that can cause ongoing mental health issues. We as teachers, and you as parents, should also be doing all that we can to educate our youth about what is acceptable behaviour and what constitutes bullying. Online bullying is currently the big problem for children and adolescents and unfortunately, we in schools, can strive to educate regarding the use of online forums, but we cannot stop it, that is up to families and their rules regarding how much time and leniency is given to children on online forums. It would be great if everyone stuck to the ages the platforms say that adolescents must be to actually use them, but I know that isn't happening in many cases. It is hard for an 8 to 13-year-old to realise what can happen if they say inappropriate comments online, or get involved in online victimisation, they are too young to really understand the consequences or know what to say online, so the question really has to be; why do we let them be online?





FACTION ATHLETICS CARNIVAL FRIDAY AUGUST 25 2023 - EXCURSION PAPER WORK HOME THIS WEEK 😇

Yes, it is on again, the rivalry is simmering under the surface, will GOLD come back at MAROON after losing the Cross Country and the Swimming, I for one certainly hope so, because it has been a lean year for Gold so far in '23!! GET YOUR COLOURS OUT, GET YOUR VOICES READY, THE ATHS ARE HERE AGAIN!! The day will start with the jumps and throws at 9:00am and you will have all the information home later this week, including a lunch order, the proceeds from which will be going to the Year 5/6 Camp and high school Country Week. All competitors (6 – 16 years) are to go straight to the oval on the day of the carnival, buses will deliver directly to the oval. All students must be there 15 minutes prior to their first jump or throw event. A jump and throw schedule will be sent home with the excursion paperwork for your information, and it is also attached to this email. PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE AGE THEY COMPETE IN IS THEIR AGE AS OF DECEMBER 31 2023, so if they are 7 years old right now, but turn 8 any time between

now and December 31 2023, say in November, then they compete in the 8 years events, not the 7 years events. All students, regardless of ability will be involved in the set events:

6 - 10 year olds: long jump; 50m (for 6 & 7 year olds) or 80m (for 8, 9 & 10 year olds) and flag race.
11 - 12 year olds: long and triple jump; 100m and 200m.
13 - 16 year olds: long and triple jump; 100m; 200m, shot put and discus.

Students may also be involved in team events such as corner spry, tunnel ball and team flag races for our younger students, and passball and leaderball for our older students.

Students need to be in their school uniform, ready to compete with **shorts or a skort**, their **maroon or gold t-shirt** and **school jumper/jacket and track pants** for in between events. **PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD HAS THEIR NAME ON THEIR JUMPER, TRACK PANTS AND HAT.** They will need their recess, snack food and a water bottle, no cool drink or sports drinks will be allowed in the bays. Students will be able to join their parents for lunch ⁽³⁾. As already stated, the jump and throw schedule has been attached with the Newsletter (and will go home with the excursion paperwork) so you know exactly what time they need to be at the oval.


CHANGE OF DATE SCDHSSA INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS CARNIVAL






