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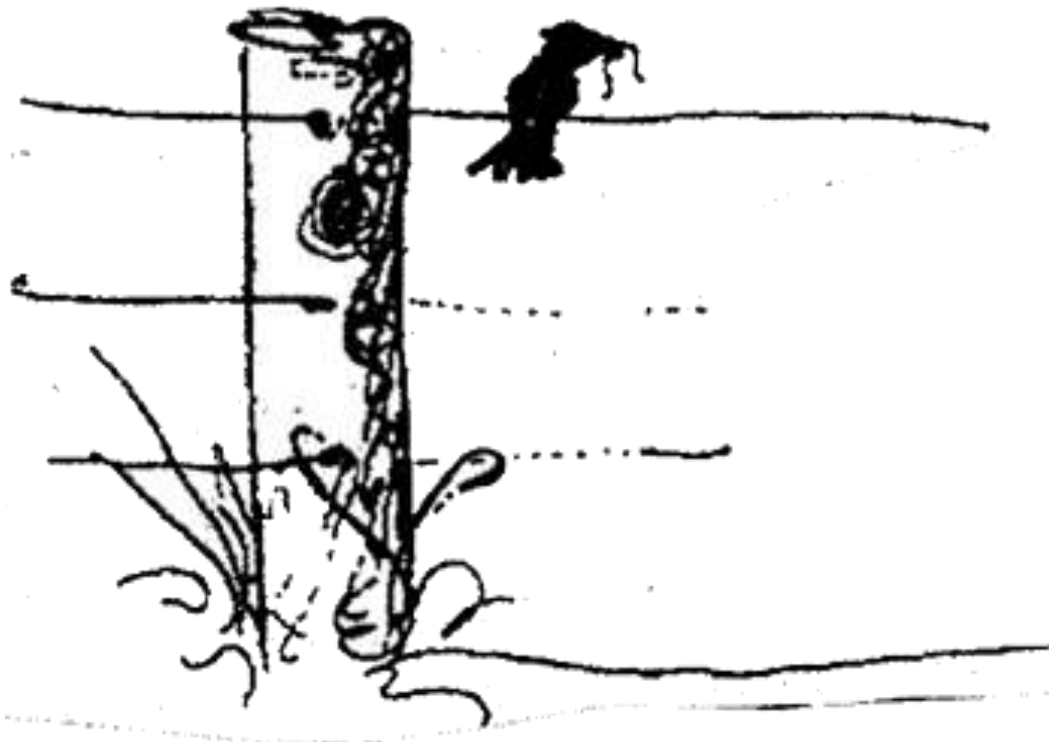
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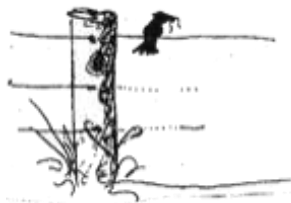

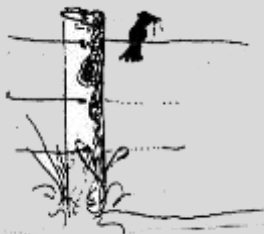

Q: What are you doing on the farm this week?
At the moment we are finishing up the seeding program and starting to look at the early seeded crops for weeds, pests and diseases.

Q: Are you trialling anything new on farm this season?
With decent rains and subsequent subsoil moisture early in the year we decided to deep band oats down the fertiliser tube and serradella at 8mm. We are trialling Callisto on a few paddocks after showing promise last year.

Milwaukie grease gun, Paslode nail gun or the coffee machine.

NAREMBEEN LOCAL LAWS - HISTORIC OCCASION

Council recently resolved to make the following new Local Laws:-

- Standing Orders Local Law 2020
- Dogs Local Law 2020
- Fencing Local Laws 2020
- Emu Hill Public Cemetery Local Law 2020

The affixing of the common seal and signing of the documents by the Shire President Cr Rhonda Cole and the CEO Chris Jackson was a very significant occasion with work that commenced back in 2016. The Shire since that time has repealed 15 old By-Laws, adopted the above four new Local Laws, Health Local Laws and Animals, Environment and Nuisance Local Laws. The Local Law procedure is very time consuming and a difficult legislative process. A big thank you to Sheree Thomas for many hours of hard work on this project.



Also of significance is the fact that the old by-laws dated back many years with the Emu Hill Public Cemetery By-Laws first being published in the Government Gazette way back on the 16 March 1928. See the copy on the following pages of the Government Gazette from this time, oh how things have changed!

PUBLIC CEMETERY BY-LAWS.

By virtue of all powers in that behalf vested in the Trustees of the Public Cemetery, Emu Hill, the said Trustees make the following By-laws:—

1. All fees and charges payable to the Trustees, as set forth in the Schedule A, shall be paid at the times and manner therein mentioned.

2. Any person desiring to inter any dead body in the cemetery shall make an application to the Trustees. Upon such application being approved by the Trustees, and upon payment of the prescribed fees, they shall cause to be issued to the person so applying an order for burial.

3. All applications for interment shall be made at least five working hours prior to the time fixed for burial. An extra charge shall be made for applications within such time. No free interment shall be allowed unless the application, together with the Justice's order therefor, be handed in in such time as to allow of at least five working hours as above.

4. The Trustees shall cause all graves to be dug, and vaults, brick graves, or graves to be re-opened as and when required.

5. Before any interment is allowed the "Order for burial" shall be handed to and retained by the grave-digger.

6. Every grave shall be at least six feet deep, and no interment shall be allowed in any grave with a less depth than four feet six inches from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the surrounding ground.

7. In the case of an application for interment in any private grave or vault to which the deceased had no claim during life, the written and verified consent of the grantee shall be handed in with the application.

8. No burial shall be allowed to take place in the cemetery unless a certificate from a District Registrar of Deaths that the death has been registered, or a Coroner's order for burial is handed to the Trustees.

9. The hours for burial shall be as follows:—

1st September to 30th April—Week days, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Sundays, from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.

1st May to 31st August—Week days, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Sundays, from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.;

and no burial shall be allowed to take place, nor any coffin allowed to enter the cemetery at any other hour except by written permission of the Trustees.

10. The time fixed for any burial shall be the time at which the funeral is to arrive at the cemetery gates, and such time shall be rigidly and punctually observed.

11. No hearse, mourning coach, or other vehicle shall enter the cemetery, or proceed except at and by such roads as directed by the officer of the Trustees from time to time. Any driver or other person failing or neglecting to observe such directions commits an offence against these By-laws.

12. Children under the age of ten years entering the cemetery must be in charge of some responsible person.

13. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke within the cemetery, or to discharge any fireworks therein.

14. No dogs shall be allowed within the cemetery, and any person taking a dog into the cemetery commits an offence against these By-laws.

15. Any person violating the rules of propriety and decorum, or committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any tree, shrub, flower, border, or any erection, commits an offence against these By-laws.

16. No person shall promote, or advertise, or carry on within the cemetery any trade, business, or calling, either by solicitation, distribution of circulars, by cards, or otherwise, or by any other system of advertisement whatsoever.

17. No person employed by or under the Trustees shall accept any gratuity whatever, nor shall he be pecuniarily interested in any work in the cemetery other than the remuneration he receives from the Trustees; and any such person proved guilty of accepting any gratuity or being pecuniarily interested in any such work shall be liable to summary dismissal.

18. Any person requiring an "Exclusive right of burial" in any part of the cemetery shall apply to the Trustees, in writing, specifying the location of the grave, and whether it is proposed to erect a brick grave or vault, and in such case submitting plans and specifications of the proposed work. Such application shall also state the names of any already deceased persons whose remains it is proposed to inter therein.

19. Subject to the By-laws, the Superintendent shall exercise a general supervision and control over all matters pertaining to the cemetery, including the conduct of all funerals and interments within the cemetery.

20. Upon being satisfied of the matters aforesaid, and of the suitability of the said work, plans and specifications, the Trustees may authorise the construction and erection thereof; or, if no work is to be done, may issue a "Grant" in the Form "B" in the Schedule.

21. Upon the completion of the work aforesaid, the Trustees may, if and when such work is done to their complete satisfaction, issue a "Grant" in the Form "E" in the Schedule.

22. Every "Grant" shall be subject to the By-laws for the time being, and no interment in any such grave or vault shall be allowed unless upon production of the "Order for burial" aforesaid, nor shall any such grave or vault be opened, unless with the written consent of the Trustees.

23. Every coffin placed in any such bricked grave or vault shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered with a slab of stone, slate, or iron, unless special written exemption be obtained from the Trustees.

24. If application be made for an "Order for burial" in any grave or vault of the remains of any person other than the person to whom grant was issued, or his registered assign, the written and verified consent of such grantee or assignee shall be produced.

25. Any person desiring to place or erect any monument, tombstone, or enclosure in any part of the cemetery, must first obtain the written consent and approval of the Trustees, and otherwise comply with Section 23 of "The Cemeteries Act, 1897."

26. Every tombstone, monument, or enclosure shall be placed on proper and substantial foundations, which if required by the Trustees shall extend to the bottom of the grave.

27. The materials used in every such erection shall be subject to the approval of the Trustees, and any material rejected shall be immediately removed from the cemetery by the contractor for the erection.

28. All refuse and other rubbish remaining after any work is completed shall be immediately removed from the cemetery by the person causing the same.

29. Monumental masons and other tradesmen shall, before commencing any work within the cemetery, deposit with the Secretary to the Trustees the sum of ten shillings, which shall be forfeited if either of the two last preceding By-laws are not complied with to the satisfaction of the Trustees.

30. All materials required in the erection and completion of any work shall, as far as possible, be prepared before being taken to the cemetery, and all materials required by tradesmen shall be admitted at such entrance as the Trustees shall direct; and no vehicle conveying any such material with wheels less than 4in. broad shall be permitted to enter the cemetery.

31. No zinccomb shall be allowed.

32. All workmen, whether employed by the Trustees or by any other person, shall at all times, whilst within the boundaries of the cemetery be subject to the supervision of the Trustees, and shall obey such directions as they may find it necessary to give; and any workman permitting any breach of these Regulations and By-laws or refusing or neglecting to comply with any directions of the Trustees commits an offence against these By-laws.

33. Any person taking part in dressing or attending to any grave shall comply with the following rules:—

(a.) No rubbish, soil, sand, or other material removed in dressing a grave shall be placed on any other grave, and, if placed on any adjoining ground, shall be removed immediately the work is completed.

EMU HILL PUBLIC CEMETERY RESERVE.

- (b.) No sand, soil, or loam shall be taken from any portion of the cemetery for the purpose of dressing any grave, except with the permission of the Trustees.
 - (c.) The dressing of all graves and the wheeling and carting of all material shall be subject to the supervision of the Trustees.
 - (d.) Work in all cases shall be carried on with due despatch, and only during regulation hours.
34. Any person who commits a breach of or an offence against these By-laws shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.
35. Any person who commits a breach of or an offence against any By-law may be expelled from the Cemetery.

The foregoing By-laws, with the accompanying schedules, were duly framed and presented to a meeting of the Board of Trustees, held at their office at Narabeen on the 4th February, 1928.

NAREMBEEN COMMUNITY GYM UPDATE

Thank you to the Narembeen Community for working with the Shire regarding the ongoing closure of the Narembeen Community Gym due to current Phase 2 COVID – 19 restrictions.

The State Government regulations that are currently in place for fitness and recreation are:

- non-contact community sports up to 20 participants
- outdoor or indoor fitness classes with no shared equipment, up to 20 participants
- public pools (1 indoor and multiple outdoor) permitted to open under strict rules and up to 20 patrons per pool.

As such the Narembeen Gym has started to see some activity with the delivery of personal training and indoor fitness classes by Kasse from Move & Nourish with Kasse. It appears as though the major concern with Gyms revolves around the amount of people using equipment and the hygiene implications. The State Government has indicated that Stage 3 of their COVID-19 recovery plan is likely to include restrictions being further relaxed for gyms. As such the Narembeen CRC is preparing for the Narembeen Community Gym to re-open in the coming weeks pending the State Governments decisions.

Work will be undertaken to try and reduce the risks involved with equipment use at the Gym and restrictions will be in place to manage the amount of people in the gym as well. The Shire of Narembeen is also considering reduced annual gym fees next financial year for returning members to thank everyone for their loyalty during this uncertain period.

The website connects small business owners with information, programs and interventions that can help with planning, managing everyday business stressors and taking action for mental health challenges.

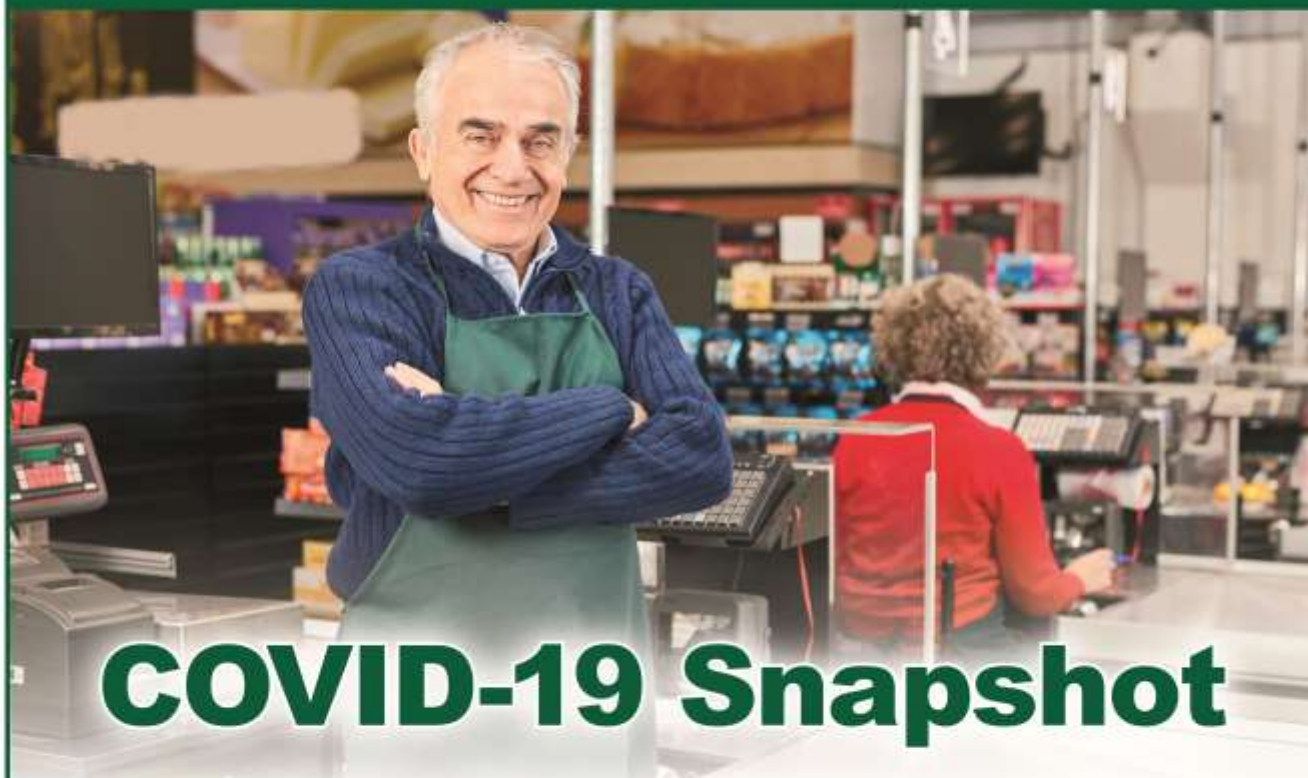

COVID-19 WA roadmap Phase 3

Phase 1

27 April 2020



- Gatherings limit raised from 2 to 10 people.
- Some additional non-contact public activities permitted.
- Soft start to Term 2 for public schools introduced.
- Home opens permitted in accordance with the limit on gatherings.
- Weddings and funerals, up to 10 people.
- Outdoor personal training (no shared equipment), up to 10 people.

Phase 2

18 May 2020



- Gatherings limit raised from 10 to 20 people.
- Public schools open.
- People encouraged to return to work, unless unwell or vulnerable.
- Weddings and funerals, up to 20 people inside or 30 outside.
- Some regional travel restrictions relaxed.
- Cafes and restaurants permitted to reopen with restrictions.
- Places of worship, libraries & community facilities, indoor outdoor fitness and dance classes may reopen, with a 20 patron limit and 4sqm rule

Phase 3

6 June 2020



- **Public gatherings**
 - Non-work indoor and outdoor gatherings increased to 100 people.
 - Indoor and/or outdoor venues with multiple, divided spaces may have up to 300 people, with up to 100 people in each space.
 - Weddings and funerals can have 100 people inside or 300 people outside (cannot have 100 inside and additional people outside).
- **Cafes, restaurants, pubs and bars**
 - Alcohol can be served without a meal but patrons must be seated.
- **Food courts can reopen.**
- **Cinemas, arcades and museums**
 - Galleries, museums, arcades and snooker/pool centres can reopen.
 - Cinemas, theatres and concert venues can reopen, but patrons must be seated.
- **Sport and recreation**
 - People can train and play full contact sport, indoor and outdoor.
 - Gyms, health clubs and other fitness studios can reopen, with no restrictions on equipment. Gyms must be started at all times and undertake regular cleaning.
- **Beauty and personal care services**
 - Nail, tanning and waxing salons, spa, saunas, bath houses and wellness centres can reopen. When providing beauty, therapy and personal care services there must be a distance of at least 1.5 metres between each set of client and staff.
- **Community facilities**
 - Playgrounds, outdoor gym equipment, skate parks and play centres can reopen.
- **Attractions**
 - Rottnest Island to reopen to the WA general public.
 - Zoos and wildlife parks can reopen.

Have your say on Mobile Black Spot Program

31 May 2020

Durack residents and organisations are encouraged to have their say on the design of the next round of the Government's highly successful Mobile Black Spot Program (MBSP) to ensure it continues to improve coverage for regional communities.

Federal member for Durack, the Honourable Melissa Price is encouraging you to have your say.

"I understand the importance of connectivity for Durack regional communities, so we're getting on with the job of building more phone towers to deliver more coverage. The Morrison Government is committed to delivering improved coverage and choice for Australians in regional and remote areas," Melissa Price said.

The Morrison Government has released a discussion paper on design options for Round 5A, to test a range of new approaches to the delivery of the Mobile Black Spot Program to ensure it continues to be fit-for-purpose.

The release of the discussion paper is a great opportunity for regional Australians to have their say on how the program can best deliver the mobile coverage they need into the future.

There is \$46 million on the table for Round 5A and a further \$80 million committed for Round 6, of the MBSP.

"In order to deliver this, it is vital we receive feedback on proposed changes from a broad regional audience," Ms Price said.

The discussion paper proposes a series of changes to the eligibility guidelines for the program so that it continues to deliver high-value outcomes to regional and remote Australia.

The paper proposes three main objectives for round 5A; to:

- Improve coverage in areas prone to natural disasters including bushfires;
- Improve coverage along major regional and remote transport corridors; and to
- Trial new technology solutions in areas where low population densities have discouraged applications in previous rounds.

Here are two articles that have been updated from the Historical Society museums

SEVENTH DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH NAREMBEEN

The first record of the activities of the S.D.A. Church in the 'Welcome Hill', Mount Walker area dates back to late 1926 to early 1927, when Mr Wally Martin, his wife, and Mr Rob Powell commenced contract clearing and shearing in the area.

Meetings were held in the Martin's tent from sabbath to sabbath where the Sabbath School lessons were studied.

During 1947, the late Joe Ashmore with his young family moved to the 'Welcome Hill' district onto a farm previously owned by Mr Syd Gardner.

In 1951, during a chance meeting with Joe Ashmore in a Perth store, the writer was urged to take up land in the Narembeen district. In 1952, I did take up land alongside the Ashmore farm and soon after that, cottage meetings were organised for the study of the Sabbath School lessons.

Others moved into the district – Risbey's, Twine's, Elston's, Carlsen's, Stanley's to mention some of them.

By this time, the homes were literally bulging at the walls and it was decided to hold weekly services in Ashmore's woolshed.

An aura of romance has built up over the years around the Australian woolshed. This aura was quite often patently evident, especially after crutching and shearing operations.

Pastor Vern Heise took over the care of the company and during 1957 plans were drawn up for a church building and forthwith a fundraising cropping program was organised.

1958 saw the church erected but funds ran out before the linings were purchased. Church services were held in the unfinished shell for about 12 months. Although hot and dusty in Summer and cold and draughty in Winter, the spirit of worship was very real.

1959 amid great rejoicing, Bro. Bob Elston, a plaster fixer by trade, finished lining the building. Pews and other furnishings were installed, ready for the official opening and dedication service on August 2, 1959.

1960 Over the next few years the church grew. People moving to the district were Lang's, Major's, Harders', Campbell's, Bagshaw's.

1965 The Hall was erected.

1975 The Community Health and Welfare rooms were added to the complex.

1978 Plans were made for a new building. Crop was planted for raising funds.

1980 March 23, the new Church is opened.



1995 The Hall had the old lining removed and replaced with brick and a new roof also

1999 Current number of members – 42.

THE SPOTTERS POST

In 1938, Frank Yandle was the Chairperson of the Narembeen Road Board when the Narembeen Road Board purchased the northern most portion of Latham's farm adjoining the townsite. Purnell's and Eddy's who also owned a portion of what was previously Latham's property, swapped land with the Road Board resulting in several acres in the area which now encompasses the Shire Offices, Police complex, St John Ambulance building, Infant Health Centre and the Memorial Park. The Road Board acquired the land with the view to establishing a town park.



By January 1939, the Road Board had decided to name the park 'Yandle Park', in recognition of Yandle's civic and community work. During the war, work was deferred on the park.

In 1942 a purpose-built Spotters Post was constructed in Yandle Park, and for the ensuing two and a half years it was manned twenty-four hours a day by Volunteer Air Observer Corps (VAOC) members. The VAOC had been established in July 1942 by Keith Gollan (State Commander of VAOC) and the Chief Observer in Narembeen was Constable McGeary who organised a roster of local people.

In March 1945, duties were relaxed, and passing planes could be reported from the homes of the Chief Observer and Deputy with no more rostered watches by the VAOC members. After the relaxation of duties watches continued to be kept on our own aircraft and as a result many aircraft and crews were saved.

In 1945, a Narembeen branch of the Sailor's Soldier's Airmen and Nurse's Father's Association of WA was formed. Popularly known as the Dad's Association, it met at the Spotters Post and was a highly active beneficiary organisation in Narembeen through until the 1950's.

On April 28, 1946, an Infant Health and Welfare organisation was formed by a few representative delegates from Corrigin, Narembeen, Quairading, Bruce Rock, Kondinin and Kulin districts. Arthur Latham, the foundation Chairman of the Narembeen Road Board, and Cyril Box, the Corrigin Roads Board Secretary, were instrumental in the establishment of the Scheme. With the purchase of a vehicle, on December 6, 1947 the Mobile Infant Health Clinic was officially launched in Corrigin. The travelling circuit began with Sister Nalda Wilson providing clinical services.

The scheme was so successful and demand such that Bruce Rock and Quairading established separate clinics. The first visit to Narembeen was in October 1947, in the foyer of the Road Board Office building. Soon after the vacant Spotters Post was converted for the specific use of the Clinic Sister. From 1947 to 1972 Sister Verna Thomas was a well-known person running the Mobile Infant Health Clinic from its base in Corrigin. The Mobile Health Clinic continued that function until 1996, when it was re-located to the corner of Ada and Wilfred Streets.

The Child Health Clinic continues today as a weekly service and is currently located at the Narembeen Hospital.

In 2015, the Spotters Post was opened as a War Museum to celebrate the centenary of ANZAC. Every ANZAC Day service held in Narembeen the building is open for those attending to walk through and look at the war memorabilia of those who have served.

Vinnies urges WA farmers to apply for new drought support

Much of our focus recently has not been on the devastating drought which continues in many parts of the country. Here in Western Australia, Vinnies is here to help farmers, farm workers and farm suppliers/contractors who are not forgotten as they experience hardship in drought declared areas.

As part of the current Round 2 Drought Community Support Initiative, Vinnies is distributing nationally a total of \$60 million of Federal government funding, who recently announced that 35 local government areas (LGA) in Western Australia are now eligible for the drought assistance.

The St Vincent De Paul Society and The Salvation Army are delivering the Federal Government program, dividing the LGAs between them.

Andrew York, Vinnies WA Executive Manager of Membership & Volunteer Services says that financial support is now available and Vinnies is ready to process their applications.

"Eligible farmers, farm workers and farm suppliers in specific LGA's can qualify for a payment of up to \$3,000 to help meet basic household expenses as the ongoing drought continues to bite."

Ben is young farmer that has recently been supported by Vinnies. Since 2011, he has had to sell off his cattle and change to sheep and goat farming to better survive the drought conditions. Further financial and emotional stress was caused when Ben ruptured one of his eyes so he was unable to complete all the farm work he was previously responsible for, with his wife needing to step in to help.

"My wife and I have been coping with drought conditions for several years now. But the medical bills were an added expense we simply couldn't afford on top of running the farm and providing for our two children. We're not ones to ask for help but it's gotten to a point where we decided we needed to accept some assistance from Vinnies."

Ben is just one of the hundreds of farmers that Vinnies is supporting through the drought.

Vinnies has created a National Call Centre with a team of experienced and empathetic staff to take calls and process claims quickly. The application process is simple and can be done online or by phone. A copy of your driver's licence, evidence to show where you live and proof that you are experiencing hardship. If you are an employee you will need a current payslip.

The specific LGA's which are officially drought-declared are listed here.

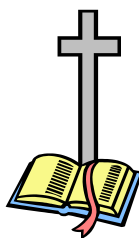
