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
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



HISTORICAL HIGH LIGHTS

It was great to see in the Fencepost on 10th June the first few pages of "Narembeen The First Hundred Years" it made very interesting reading. The historical society thank Kellie Mortimore, editor that day for keeping the people in Narembeen informed. We would love more stories like that to be published in our local Fencepost. It makes for very interesting reading and informative to the newcomers to our town.

We held our usual meeting on Monday 15th June 2020. This had to be held in the Shire Council Chambers again as the renovations to our History Centre in the old Road Board Building have not been completed. Maybe next meeting.... (we hope). The renovations have almost been completed but the enormous task of moving the display items back is almost daunting but not as daunting as moving all the historic papers especially the family history information. Several busy bees will have to take place. What has been done so far is looking most impressive and is a great improvement. The new chairs have been purchased, the cabinets moved, cupboards put into place and floors all newly surfaced. We are still awaiting the supply of some new cabinets.

During the meeting the main business matters discussed were as follows:-

The renovations – of course

- The Billericay signage should be completed now that seeding is finished. Relying on our farming community to assist with the necessary work to be done all depends on the weather and the seasons. We are used to that so we have the patience to wait. Without their assistance it would be no be done at all.
- The sign at the well at the bottom of Roe Lookout has been re attached. The well is looking in need of repair but that will have to be another day. We think we have located the directional signs that were at the top of Roe lookout. These were quite flimsy and did not take too kindly to our strong winds. Stronger signs need to be made to replace them.
- The Historical Society was represented at the Community Shed meeting on Saturday and expressed concern that items have been donated and deposited at the site for the Historical Society to renovate/display/house or whatever. We must remind the public that we would like to be approached before donations are made. Our members are few and funds are even fewer so if items are donated it is necessary that we record them, the cost of restoration, where they come from and where they could be housed. It is great to receive these items but the necessary channels must be gone through.
- Some items have been removed from the shed at the rear of the Community Shed. This is of concern as they have been donated to our society and cannot be replaced.
- The Wadderin Wildlife Reserve committee is hoping to install an information site near the reserve. Hazel Toovey was able to supply a lot of historical information to Michelle Fry for the notice board that will be erected there.
- The 100 years of Local Government "celebrations" need to be put into motion now and although we are busy with our moving the thinking caps are on and a plan is slowly being formed.
- THE MUSEUMS ARE NOT OPEN AT THE MOMENT DUE TO COVID 19 RESTRICTIONS BUT ONCE WE GET TO OUR NEXT LEVEL THEY SHOULD BE ACCESSABLE. WELL WORTH A VISIT. HELP MOVE BACK INTO OUR NEW REFURBISHED BUILDING.


The certificate is issued to services that are activity designed to bring people together who would not normally meet, to do things for others and advance goodwill and understanding.





Overhaul of entire transport network needed

WAFarmers welcomes the announcement by Transport Minister Rita Saffioti regarding the state government's decision to commission the proposed engineering assessment to determine the feasibility of the Tier 3 rail network.

WAFarmersGrains President Mic Fels said that while the Tier 3 engineering assessment is a good start, the engineering assessment should be in conjunction with the development of an overall strategy for the entire transport network in WA.

"Western Australia spans a massive geographic area, with an economy that is absolutely dependent on an efficient export freight network", Mr Fels said.

While the State Government released a draft *Revitalising Agricultural Region Freight Strategy* in 2018, Mr Fels said it is now time to actually get serious about the detail, while also looking out further than just the next 10 years.

"While we appreciate the state government taking these first steps, WAFarmersGrains has long advocated for the state government to actually develop a short, medium and long term transport strategy – not just agriculture, and not just rail, but all freight and transport avenues, to make sure the needs of business and the community are properly met, well into the future."

"It was the absence of any vision or strategy that resulted in the closure of the Tier 3 lines in the first place, when the roads were not even close to suitable for taking the extra truck sizes and weights that used to move on the rail lines", he said.

"So now we live in the frightening scenario of road trains sharing dilapidated roads with school buses, and families going to the shops or kids' sports, on a daily basis.

Mr Fels said that it is encouraging that rail is being revisited, but that there is also a pressing urgency for prioritised investment into the road infrastructure, particularly in the inevitable rationalisation of the CBH grain network, and he urges the state government to consult closely with CBH during this process.

Any transport analysis must consider both the economic and social outcomes of the various options. In cases where road transport is found to be the best option, a serious focus needs to be put on providing roads that are up the standard required.

"There is a desperate need for the state government to develop a long-term detailed transport strategy, to make sure all of these things are considered, and that significant investments are accurately targeted to meet the needs of all regional transport networks right across Western Australia.

"Developing a detailed state-wide transport strategy is a matter of cost, efficiency, reliability, and dependability. But most importantly, this is a matter of the safety of everyone in the regional communities that are literally the powerhouse of our export economy," Mr Fels said

Men's Health Week June 15-21 Employers and employees urged to learn more about workplace carcinogens



Graham started noticing spots on his skin and immediately knew something wasn't right.

Cancer Council WA is using Men's Health Week (June 15 – 21) to urge employers and employees in regional WA to learn more about carcinogens in the workplace as recently published data shows Australian men have four times the rate of death from cancers caused by exposure to occupational carcinogens compared with women¹.

Cancer Council WA's Wheatbelt Regional Education Officer Melissa Pickering said those working in the regional WA should be able to conduct their working life without adding to their risk of cancer.

"Data shows an estimated 2.7 million Australian men – 58 per cent of the male working population – are potentially exposed to one or more cancer-causing agents at work, particularly those who hold a trade and are residing in regional areas²," she said. "These are alarming and confronting statistics.

"Known carcinogens should, as much as possible, be removed from the workplace and where this isn't possible, all reasonable steps should be taken to minimise the exposure and the associated cancer risk."

Ms Pickering said in 2017, there were more than 30 male deaths per 100,000 population compared with almost 8 female deaths per 100,000 population caused by occupational carcinogens³.

"Occupational and environment cancers come in many forms including silica dust, diesel engine exhaust, fumes and UVR from welding, asbestos, solar UVR and environmental tobacco smoke," she said.

"We urge everyone who might be exposed to these at work to jump on to the kNOw Workplace Cancer website to see what they can do to reduce their risk."

Gascoyne resident Graham Jenkins knows all too well the dangers that come from not wearing protective gear when welding or working outdoors. "Many years ago, I was welding at a nursery up north and decided to take my shirt off because of the heat," Graham said.

"I was in my helmet and shorts, with no other protective gear on. I got severely burnt on my forearms and chest from the UV light from welding. I remember being so shocked that something like that could happen and worried this might cause skin cancer. I also used to spend a lot of time working outdoors without

covering up properly. Eventually it all caught up to me. I started noticing unusual spots on my skin and immediately knew something wasn't right.

"Over the years, I've had dozens of basal cell carcinoma (BCC) skin cancers and squamous cell carcinoma (SCC) cut from my skin. The majority of these have been on my forearms, which were regularly exposed to UV light from welding as well as from the sun."

"Back in the day I thought I was bullet proof and had no idea about occupation-related cancers. But nowadays there are no excuses. We have access to so much information and many workplaces are doing all they can to keep their employees safe.

"My advice is to always use protective work gear – long shirt, helmet, gloves, the lot. Even if you're only exposed for a couple of minutes at a time it doesn't matter, because exposure to UV light in the long run can lead to skin cancer.

"Take it from someone who has had dozens of skin cancers cut out over the years. Don't be a tough guy; do the right thing and look after your health, otherwise it could cost you your life."

A MARKYT Community Resilience Scorecard has been launched to map community resilience, local government performance and community needs. Local Governments would like to hear from 10,000 residents across Western Australia.

Early indicators from 2,300 residents are that COVID-19 has had a high impact on 1 in 5 residents and 1 in 3 residents continue to have high concerns about COVID-19.
